

TARIFF BILLS SENT TO SENATE FOR CONSIDERATION

The tariff bills are the price at which such or similar merchandise is offered in the foreign country in which the goods are produced, plus cost of containers and coverings and all other charges incident to preparing the goods for export.

MAJOR PROVISIONS

The bill's basic provision—the method of fixing values on which duties shall be assessed—broad and elastic and includes revolutionary grants of authority to the president to meet changing world economic and business conditions by altering the tariff law to conform to such changes.

The president is authorized to:

1. Increase or decrease duties or change classification of merchandise so as to equalize differences in competitive conditions as between American and foreign producers, such increase or decrease not to exceed 50 per cent of rates specified in the present law.

2. Apply protective duties from 10 to 50 per cent or by excluding such goods entirely from the United States.

TO MEET DISCRIMINATION

3. Meet tariff discrimination by other countries against American products by changing tariff rates on such goods.

4. Prevent dumping of foreign goods, either by increasing duties from 10 to 50 per cent or by excluding such goods entirely from the United States.

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leaves, according to present indications, leaves heretofore have been free, but now they will be taxed. Examples of this provision claim the packer-tanner will reap a harvest and that shoes will cost 40 cents or over per pair more.

Raw or unworked hides, green or pickled, were duties at 5 cents a pound; dried, 4 cents. Compensatory duties on leather were, therefore, levied with respect to gloves, shoes, harness and other leather goods. Sole leather carries 3 cents a pound and 5 per cent ad valorem; tanning and harness leather, 4 cents and 5 per cent ad valorem; salt skins, 15 per cent; patent, 7 1/2 cents a square foot and 15 per cent ad valorem. If made of bovine hides, if not, 8 cents a square foot and 15 per cent. Leather cut into shoe soles, vamps or uppers, bears a duty the same as provided for the same class of leather in other forms and in addition, 5 per cent ad valorem.

BOOTS AND SHOES

Finished boots and shoes, made of bovine leather, take 12 cents a pair and 5 per cent; all other boots and shoes, 5 cents a pair.

The committee regards the lace section of the bill as one of the chief revenue producers. The house rate of 45 per cent ad valorem was doubled on laces themselves and the 47 1/2 per cent levied on unworked articles was made 15 per cent.

Finished films will come in at 7 cents a foot; raw films at 1 1/2 cent per foot.

The sugar schedule is destined for a sharp fight. Cuban sugar rates are placed at 4 cents per pound, and the so-called full duty sugars at 2 cents. Louisiana growers want a high protection. Certain molasses used for feeding cattle comes in free. The senators knocked out the house clause giving sugar refiners and manufacturers using domestic beets or cane the right to import at 4 cent duty two pounds of sugar for each pound of domestic used in a month.

Duties are levied on intoxicating liquors in addition to the tariff on spirits; but it is pointed out that the law does not in any way alter the Volstead law provisions, the rates cited applying only for legal allowed provisions.

LONG STAPLE COTTON

The long staple cotton is protected with a 7 cents a pound duty; other cotton is free.

Cotton gloves, a product graded cheaply, are duties at 25 to 35 cents a dozen, according to grades. Hosiery and half hose, another branch in which German competition is sharp, received increased duties ranging from 10 cents on hose valued at 21 or less a dozen, to more than 125 per cent on those valued above 25 a dozen.

Chemicals, including soda, were substantially increased; duties on magnesia, a product used in the steel industry, were increased.

To the list of the house the senators added:

Bananas, maps, music, engravings, photographs, certain old books and prints, brooms, brushes, brass, Chinese nuts, curly oil bearing seeds and nuts, including cora, hemp seed, palm nuts, rape seed, pigeons, sugar beet seeds, alfalfa, and other church paraphernalia, including incense, rosaries, candles and lignum vitae.

Northern California rice growers will oppose the action of the senate committee in reducing the house tariff schedule on Paddy or rough rice from 12 cents to 5 cents a bushel; brown milled rice to 4 cents; milled rice, 3 cents; and milled rice, 2 cents.

The olive schedule includes dry and stuffed olives, 20 cents the gallon; dried olives, 10 cents; and olives, 5 cents. Almonds were raised from 10 cents to 15 cents the pound, and shell almonds from 15 cents to 20 cents.

Quicksilver, at which 95 per cent of the country's production is mined in California, was reduced from the house schedule of 25 cents to 15 cents the pound.

Sugar beets are listed at 80 cents a ton, the house rate, and other beets 17 per cent ad valorem.

The lumber schedule is destined for a contest. Logs of fir, spruce, cedar or Western hemlock, coming from a country which has had no export duties on the United States, will be dutied at \$1 per 1000 feet board measure.

U. S. Shipping Board Hearing to Be Held in Portland in June

Shipping board hearing on section 29 of the merchant marine act of 1920 will probably be held in Portland, according to word received here. The date has not yet been determined, nor have other Pacific coast cities been designated in which hearings will be held, but it is anticipated that the hearings will be held sometime in June. Former United States Senator George E. Chamberlain is one of the three shipping board commissioners who will conduct the hearings. Tentative selection of cities for shipping board hearings on the Atlantic seaboard are New York, Boston and Savannah. The Atlantic hearings will be held this month. Portland preparation for the hearing is in the hands of a committee jointly representative of the Chamber of Commerce, port and dock commissions.

Stanley Myers, district attorney, was notified this morning that a delegation from the peaceful element in Portland's Chinatown was leaving today to wait upon national officers of the Big Sing and Bing Kong-Bow Leong gangs in Seattle, Spokane and San Francisco and ask them to make Portland permanent neutral ground.

This action was taken following a meeting held in the club room of the Chinese Peace society between Myers, members of the society, leading merchants of Chinatown and long leaders Monday afternoon.

About 125 Chinese attended the meeting. Myers addressed them, saying it was time for the Chinese who favor peace to assume the whip hand and quell the warring factions. His address was interpreted to those who could not understand English. Several Chinese then talked in their native language. One said Daniel Webster would drop a bombshell, for when he sat down the whole convulsion of yellow men began chattering excitedly among themselves.
