

Jiu Jitsu Grapplers Lock Horns in Match Tonight in Heilig Theatre

Santel Ready for Bout With Miyake At Heilig Tonight

WITH both men wearing jackets, no hold barred and both contestants ready to fly at each other, the Ad Santel-Tarro Miyake jiu jitsu match scheduled for the Heilig theatre tonight promises to be filled with plenty of action. Santel, who is the champion of the light heavyweight catch-as-catch-can wrestling championship of the world, will not be handicapped tonight as much as some people imagine, for the San Francisco grappler has taken part in no less than 45 jiu jitsu matches in Japan and he has yet to meet his master in that style of prize.

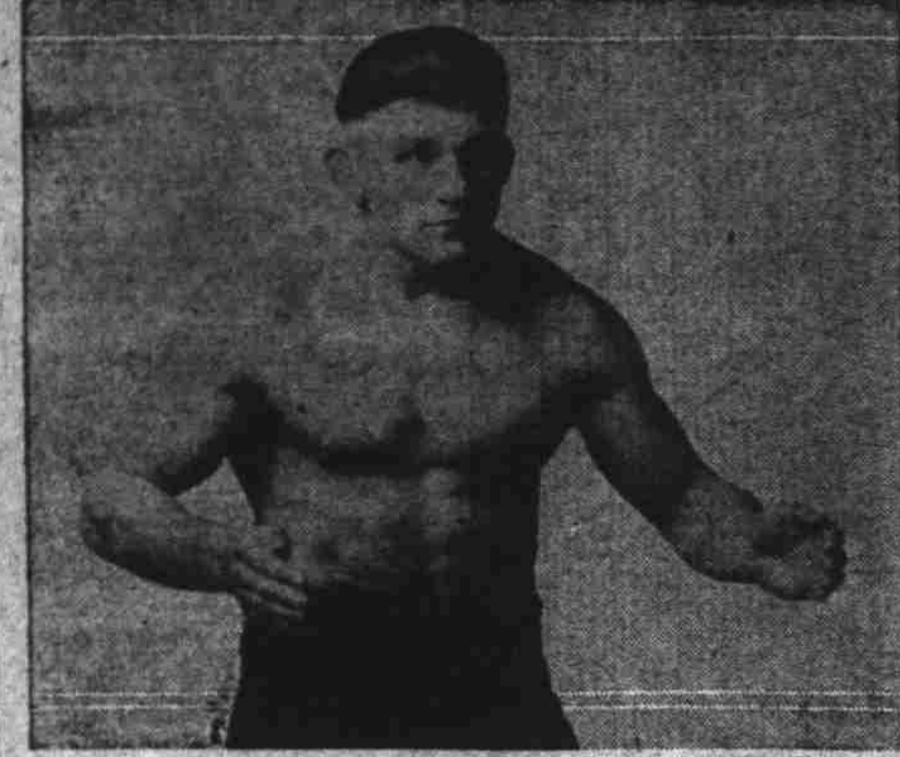
Santel is confident that Miyake will find himself running up against the stiffest opposition he has ever encountered in the United States or elsewhere, but the Japanese expert does not seem a bit worried over the outcome. When he threw three heavyweights in less than an hour here last month, Miyake gained a lot of followers who are anxious to see him in action against a man of his own weight and who has more than a working knowledge of jiu jitsu.

Three 15-minute periods are on the program and the men agreed that the first one to force his opponent to give up twice would be declared the winner. A 15-minute intermission will be held between periods.

Rasanta Sing and Paul Amort will meet in the 15-minute preliminary bout which will start promptly at 8:20 o'clock. Amort is coaching the Benson Tech catch-as-catch-can matmen and he formerly held the Pacific coast intercollegiate and Pacific Northwest championship 115-pound title. Sing, who is a former heavyweight, has lost weight and he will enter the ring tonight tipping the scales at 160 pounds.

A 15-minute preliminary is billed between Oscar Butler, the Woodmen of the World favorite, and Pete Brown, a newcomer from Omaha, Neb. Butler, with one exception, has been the winner in throwing the middleweights around Portland, and he will be given an opportunity to take on some outside talent.

Welsh has taken care of himself since he quit fighting, and if he shows anything like his old form, may pick up a comfortable fortune as a career pugilist of the ring, fighting local celebrities for small purses, but fighting often.

Law Tandler, the Philadelphia lightweight, and his manager, Philo Glassman, have been suspended by the New York state athletic commission until an investigation is made of Tandler's conduct in the fight which he lost on a foul to Charlie Pitts at Astoria, Monday night.
