

TO ARGUE MOTION FOR RECEIVER FOR ICE HIPPODROME

Motion for appointment of a receiver to handle the Big Ice Hippodrome building, 21st and Marshall streets, will be argued in circuit court following a decision of the supreme court that although Mary E. Couch owns the land on which the building stands, she does not own the building, even though the company that built it is defunct.

Those who invested their money in the Hippodrome company charge about \$150,000 in income from it, while they, whose money built it, have received nothing. They ask an accounting.

The structure was erected under a contract with Miss Couch which called for a 15-year lease and removal of the structure at the end of that time. When the company went bankrupt the lease was forfeited and a bond for removal of the building was foreclosed, setting Miss Couch free.

Miss Couch then took her case to the circuit court and won a decree giving her the building, although the Scandinavian-American bank held a mortgage given to those who invested in the building.

The bank and the investors appealed to the supreme court and the lower court's decision was reversed. The high court said "she asks a court of equity by forfeiture to give her a good title to a building worth \$50,000, in spite of the fact that she has no money invested in the structure and notwithstanding there are many creditors who should be paid. She is not in a position to seek equity."

The case is now back in the circuit court for an accounting from Miss Couch and Bryan, City Commissioner. Barber condemned the building August 20, 1920, stating that the roof had spread. The creditors want a receiver named so that the roof can be repaired and the place made safe for use.
