



Portland-Period of 1893 to 1908



THE death, in 1893, of William S. Ladd, president of Ladd & Tilton Bank, came at the close of a very successful career. Many of the banks of his day throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho,

indebted to him for either financial or moral assistance, thus lost a true friend. Quoting from the Oregonian:

"William S. Ladd was the most conspicuous figure of the Pacific Northwest * * his individuality was mingled with almost everything of a business, religious or social character. * For more than a whole generation he has been the foremost man in Oregon."

Among the late public activities with which Mr. Ladd was identified was the securing of a 25-foot channel from Portland to the sea and the completion of the splendid Bull Run water system.

Among the important events of the next 15 years were:

The Spanish-American War, in 1898, in which the Second Regiment Oregon U. S. Volunteer Infantry distinguished itself by being "first in the Philippines," and by its valorous service in that war.

In 1905, the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition.

In 1908, the beginning of a period of prosperity. During that year Ladd & Tilton remodeled the bank to meet growing needs, and was incorporated under the state laws as "Ladd & Tilton Bank," with a capital of \$1,000,000 and surplus and undivided profits of \$400,000.
