

JUDGE BEAN TO EXCUSE JURORS TO DO SPRING WORK

Mrs. Minnie Smith, Ex-Portland Artist, Dies in California

News of the death of Mrs. Minnie (Reggie) Urdahl Smith in San Francisco Saturday has reached Portland. Mrs. Smith is the daughter of Mrs. Lena Urdahl of No. 323 Ross street, and has three brothers in this city, Halvor H. Lott and H. P. Urdahl. She spent her early school days in Portland, and after her marriage studied art in Europe, and on her return was unusually successful with a line of work which she designated as art furniture, a reproduction of portraits in miniature, fashioned of woven silks and human hair. Mrs. Smith did some special work in sculpture, one of her last pieces, Pegasus, the winged steed of mythology, reflecting wide comment. Pegasus was unveiled with much ceremony in San Francisco in November, 1920, by the Pen-women's club of that city. Later Mrs. Smith continued her work along artistic lines, doing portraits in bas relief and interior decoration. She was about 34 years of age at the time of her death, which followed an operation in a San Francisco hospital.

Fossil Woman Dies While En Route to Portland Hospital

Daisy Lee Brinkley, wife of Walter E. Brinkley of Fossil, died Wednesday afternoon, as she was enroute, in company with her husband and nurse, Mrs. Mack Huntington of Fossil and Miss Cathy of Condon, from Fossil to a Portland hospital. Mrs. Brinkley was born February 12, 1883, and had lived near Fossil until her marriage in 1905, when for four years she lived on the old Brinkley place in Benton county. In 1909 she and her husband took up a homestead near Fossil, where they resided until the present. Besides her husband, Mrs. Brinkley is survived by her son Harry and daughter Margaret, her mother, Mrs. Ellen Lee, and brother, Frank Lee of Fossil; her sisters, Mrs. Rosie McCoy of Castle Rock, Wash.; Mrs. Bessie Gage of Mitchell, Mrs. Fannie Hicks, and an uncle, George Bawley of Fossil. The funeral services will be held Friday at Fossil.

FOUNDERS' DAY TO BE OBSERVED

The twenty-second annual celebration of Founders' day will be held at Champeeg with a picnic, Saturday, May 4, under the auspices of the Oregon Pioneer association and the Oregon Historical society. Judge P. H. D'Arcy, pioneer of 1857, and past president of the pioneer association, will be president of the day. Pioneers, their children and citizens generally, will leave Portland on the steamer Madeline from the foot of Alder street at 7:30 a. m., and arrive in Oregon City at 9:30, and at Champeeg by 11 a. m., according to schedule. Above Oregon City only one stop will be made, at Wilsonville, to accommodate those taking the electric train to this point. From noon until 1:15 p. m. the pioneers will have a basket dinner at Champeeg. At 1 o'clock the program will begin with "Star Spangled Banner," led by Mrs. Carrie B. Adams, who has had considerable experience in leading community singing. Invocation, information addresses limited to five minutes and patriotic singing will make up the program. The boat will leave for the return trip at 4 p. m. and make dock connection with the electric cars at Wilsonville, north and south. Boat tickets may be secured from George H. Himes, curator and assistant secretary of the Oregon Historical society, room C, The Auditorium, not later than Thursday, May 4. The boat's capacity is limited to 250.

Burns Prove Fatal To 2-Year-Old Tot

Salem, April 21.—Evelyn, the 2-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Hunt, living two miles east of Salem, died at a local hospital Thursday as the result of burns received when her clothing caught fire from sparks from the kitchen stove Wednesday afternoon.
