

DEFEAT OF NEW PUTS BOMB UNDER G. O. P. WARRIORS

"Fight to Finish, With No Quarter!" Battle Cry of Leaders Who Are Facing Other Contests

Washington, May 6.—It is now war to the death between the old political parties for victory in the congressional election. Republican leaders here, apart from the defeat of Senator Harry New in the Indiana primary last Tuesday, are determined to give no quarter to opponents of the administration, either within or without the party, but to put forth every effort from this time on to win in all the contested states.

New's defeat has started a seemingly lethargic campaign into one of brooding vitality with both sides eager to be "up and at 'em" in real old-time fashion. The disaster to New caused administration leaders to be shaken to the very marrow of their bones with regard to retaining control of the house and maintaining a good working majority in the senate.

TROUBLE IS AHEAD
With at least a dozen Republican incumbents facing contests in their respective states fully as dangerous as the fight which beat New in Indiana, the leaders realize that heroic measures must be taken if large gains in the senate are not to be made by the Democrats. The senators most in danger are: Lodge in Massachusetts, Calder in New York, Frelinghuysen in New Jersey, Kellogg in Minnesota, McCumber in North Dakota, Hale in Maine, Townsend in Michigan, France in Maryland, DuPont in Delaware and Sutherland in West Virginia.

Of all the 17 Republicans whose terms expire only twice—Johnson of California and La Follette in Wisconsin—are considered practically sure of re-election. Neither will have opposition of any consequence.

All of the others in the list given above voted for the League of Nations and the four power treaty, except France. All of them voted to seat Newberry from Michigan. These were the issues in the Indiana campaign which contributed to New's defeat.

LODGE'S FIGHT KEEN
Lodge's fight in Massachusetts is particularly alarming to the party leaders. Permissible opposition is being aroused and plans are under way to seat a Democratic candidate who will make the most of Lodge's support of the league with reservations, the treaty and the seating of Newberry. It is generally believed that Sherman Whipple will be the candidate against him.

The revulsion of sentiment in Michigan against Newberry is reflected in the fight on Townsend and his defeat is not improbable. Kellogg has won the nomination in his state, but will be opposed in the election by Mrs. Peter Olson, who has demonstrated remarkable ability as a campaigner.

Frelinghuysen's opponent probably will be Governor Edwards on the Democratic side. A fight between Frelinghuysen and G. T. Record, the Republican nomination is in progress with the chances apparently favoring the former.

McCUMBER IN STRAITS
McCumber is regarded as being in desperate straits. His only opponent thus far is former Governor Lynn Fraser, the candidate of the Non-Partisan league, but within the last few days petitions have been put in circulation in behalf of Ormsby McHarg, who was the Taft and Roosevelt manager in North Dakota and has a large following. He may win the nomination away from McCumber.

McHarg's entrance into the fight is interesting. McCumber has been secretly the Non-Partisan league and has the backing of Alex. McKenzie, who represents large financial interests in the state. Recently the impression gained around that McKenzie was planning at the last moment to force Fraser out of the fight, thereby giving McCumber a clear field for the nomination. McHarg's friends, getting wind of this move, prevailed upon him to allow his name to be used and petitions for his nomination are now being actively circulated.

OUTCOME UNCERTAIN
McCumber is hoping that his support of the tariff bill and soldier bonus measures will pull him through, but the outcome is too uncertain to give administration leaders much comfort.

The next primary will be one week from Tuesday when Pennsylvania will nominate two senators and an entire state ticket. It is conceded that the senatorial nominations will go to George Wharton Pepper, incumbent, and Major Daniel Reed, a war veteran. Who their Democratic opponents will be has not been determined.

For the gubernatorial nomination, Gifford Pinchot, friend of the conservationists and foe of private exploiters, is leading the fight against Attorney General, nominee-designate of the old machine.

Shipping Interests Of Philippines Are Against Section 21

San Francisco, May 6.—(U. P.)—American shipping interests in the Philippines are strongly opposed in section 21 of the merchant marine act of 1920, which provides that the commerce between the United States and the Philippines be confined to American vessels, according to a report received in shipping circles here from the Philippine-American Chamber of Commerce.

The Philippine shippers are extremely anxious to avert actual enforcement of section 21, and to that end are forming a special committee for the purpose of securing for the American merchant marine the greatest possible amount of cargo and passengers. The committee believes by thus turning shipping patronage into American channels, it can forestall the rigid enforcement of the merchant marine law.

The attitude of the Philippine shippers is understood to be that the enforcement of section 21 at the present

or any other time would be likely to create a false impression with regard to the policy of the United States toward the Philippines.

The Philippine-American Chamber of Commerce is planning an appeal to President Harding to postpone the extension of the coastwise laws to some future date when circumstances will permit its consideration upon the basis of commercial or economic merit.

Airman Proposes to Flight Dash in Four Planes Around Globe

London, May 6.—(L. N. S.)—Major W. T. Blake, famous British airman, will begin an around the world flight on Empire day—May 24—the Daily News announced today. Major Blake will use four planes, as follows:

Dh-9 between London, Paris, Rome, Athens, Crete, Alexandria, Bagdad, Delhi and Calcutta; a Fairey seaplane between Calcutta, Rangoon, Bangkok, Hongkong, Japan, Peking, Vladivostok, the Aleutian Islands, Alaska and Vancouver; a Dh-9 between Vancouver, Winnipeg, Chicago, New York and St. Johns, and a 13-flying boat between St. Johns, Greenland, Iceland, Faroe Islands, Scotland and London.

Mrs. F. Harkness To Wed R. Schuette

According to the information the ceremony will be solemnized in New York May 30, and the couple will leave the United States immediately after the ceremony for a three months honeymoon in Europe.

Hopes to Win Derby And Become Father Of Son in One Month

London, May 6.—Lord Queensborough declared today that he hopes to bring off the greatest double event of his life this month—he expects to become the father of a boy who shall be heir to his title and to win the derby with his wonderful horse, St. Louis.

Lord Queensborough, who is 51, last year married Edith Starr Miller of New York and the visit of the stork is due before the Derby is run on the last day of May.

If it is a boy he will be named Louis and if a girl the name Louise will be bestowed upon her to celebrate the achievements of the famous colt.

Lord Queensborough was first married to Pauline Whitney, daughter of former United States Secretary of the Navy Whitney in 1895. He was then Almeric Page. She died in 1916, leaving two daughters.

St. Louis leaped to fame on April 26 when he won the 2000 guinea race at Newmarket and immediately became the favorite for the derby, which position the colt still holds at odds of 9 to 2 against.
