

AMERICAN LABOR WILL RUN TEXTILE PLANTS IN RUSSIA

Project Capitalized at \$2,000,000 Launched, Following an Agreement Signed With Lenin.

Chicago, May 13.—Soviet Russia's entire textile and clothing industry will soon be taken over and operated by American labor and with American funds, it was announced Thursday at the biennial convention of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America. A society of American workers to be known as the American Russian Trade Industrial Workers' Association, with a capitalization of more than \$2,000,000 will handle the project. The convention voted enthusiastically to authorize the officers of the union to form such a concern, to appropriate \$10,000 for initial expenses and to buy \$50,000 worth of stock in the new company.

AMERICANS SHAREHOLDERS

American workers, through the purchase of ten dollar shares, will become the principal stockholders and owners. It was said, although others interested in Russia's economic reconstruction may also buy shares.

Sydney Hillman, of New York, president of the clothing workers' union, declares that the project is the outcome of a discussion he had with Nikolai

Lenin in Russia last summer, and that Lenin is fully satisfied of its practicability and usefulness.

"The enterprise is to be cooperative," Hillman told the United News, "with all earnings over 10 per cent applying to the work's extension. The necessary factories, equipment and raw material will be furnished by the soviet government and the capital and technical skill by our company. Both parties will be represented on a central board to control the management."

SEE ECONOMIC HOPE

"In the industrial revival of Russia lies the economic reconstruction of Europe. It is a sad commentary on the spine attitude of organized labor in this and other countries that it has not already taken the lead in the economic reconstruction of Russia."

"No more fitting activity for working men and women can be conceived than that they lend their moral and material resources to the more hungry millions of Russia, who so recently crawled from under the heel of autocracy and oppression and emerged a free people."

HARDING LIKELY TO HAVE ACTIVE PART IN PRIMARY

Candidates Who Have Been Loyal to Administration Will Get His Support, It Is Declared.

Ashecon, N. J., May 13.—President Harding, now that he has made one departure from his previously announced policy of standing aloof from Republican primaries by strongly endorsing Senator Joseph Frelinghuysen for re-nomination as the Republican senatorial candidate in New Jersey, may also come out openly in support of congressional candidates in other parts of the country who have been loyal to the administration.

This was the belief prevailing here in circles close to the president as Harding took the opportunity today to reiterate to a gathering of Atlantic City Republicans his personal endorsement of Frelinghuysen, unexpectedly made a member of the Republican Women's club of New Jersey at Atlantic City last night.

NO FORMAL ADDRESS

The president did not formally address the Atlantic county Republican leaders, but personally assured them when they called at the Seaview Golf club that he desired Frelinghuysen's re-nomination. The senator is out for re-nomination against George L. Record of Jersey City.

Harding's reiteration of his endorsement of the senator indicated his action was deliberate and strengthened the belief that he was embarking on the new political policy of openly supporting his most loyal friends in the primaries.

Believing strongly in party government, the president feels that his administration can accomplish much more by having strong administration backers in congress.

RESTORES HARMONY

Another outstanding feature of his trip here, planned originally to enable him to obtain a brief vacation, was the restoration of complete harmony in the Republican organization. Reports had been current that William N. Runyan, Republican candidate for the gubernatorial nomination, would not actively support Frelinghuysen. Runyan at the political pow-wow at the golf club today, assured the president the reports were untrue.

Outside of his brief appearance at the pow-wow, Harding spent the day on the golf links. Tomorrow he plans to attend Baptist church in Atlantic City and leave at 2 o'clock for Washington. Barring delays, he should reach there about 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Harding, accompanied by several other members of the party, "invaded" the board walk at Atlantic City today. She attracted considerable attention as she rode down the walk in a roller chair.

Accompanying her were Secretary of War and Mrs. Weeks, Attorney-General Daugherty, Charles Dawes and Dr. C. E. Sawyer.
