Mrs. Ellen McCormick Daughter of One of City Founders, Dies

Mrs. Ellen McCormick, daughter of Patrick Raleigh, one of the founders of Portland and owner of the first mercantile store in this city, died Monday night at her home in San Francisco, following a long illness. Mrs. McCormick was the widow of Frank McCormick whose father was also a pioneer of this city and who, during his lifetime, was editor of the Monitor, the first Catholic newspaper printed in Portland. She is survived by one daughter, Louise, who lived with her in San Francisco, and was a sister of Mrs. M. M. Gearin of Portland. Mrs. Alfred R. Kelly of San Francisco, the late Mrs. Patrick Trimble of Portland, and of William T. McCormick of Tillamook.

Mrs. McCormick spent her girlhood in

Portland. The old family home of the Raleigh family then occupied the block bounded by Washington and Stark, Broadway and Sixth streets.

One of the streets and an office building of Portland now bear her father's name. Mrs. M. M. Gearin and her daughter Grace left the city Friday evening to be with Mrs. McCormick in the South. Final services and interment will take place in San Francisco which had been her home since her marriage in Portland.

Highwaymen Rob Portland Co-eds Driving to Eugene

CANNON ESCAPES OREGON CITY JAIL

Oregon City, May 15.—Edward C. Cannon of Portland, arrested Saturday night due to the quick wit of Mrs. Amy Downey, telephone operator, escaped jail between midnight and 1 o'clock this morning. With him went Leslie B. Chase of Milwaukie, who had but four days of a 25 day larceny sentence to serve.

The two men sawed through two bars on the north side of the jail, a job which must have taken them many hours of work. Outside help from friends of Cannon in Portland is believed to have made the escape possible. Robert McGinnis, awaiting trial on a larceny charge and the only other prisoner in the jail, declined to take advantage of the opportunity to flee.

Cannon was to have been tried Wednesday in justice court. He was arrested after he had given the name of Eddie Shannon, Seattle pugilist, to the telephone operator, who knew Shannon.

Funds have been provided for a new jail and construction is to begin soon. The present jail has been broken many times.

brought strong objection from Flynn, employers' member of the board. Fourteen vessels were in port today. Carpoes were being worked on all but two. These are the shipping board carriers, idle since the board objected to the employers' hiring hall.

Presiding Circuit Judge Tucker today appointed Judge G. R. Bagley of Hillsboro to hear the contempt proceedings against strikers under the temporary anti-picketing injunction.

Seneca Fouts, attorney for the strikers, had filed an affidavit of prejudice. The union, Fouts stated, indorsed a rival candidate when Tucker ran for office, while the employers indorsed Tucker.

The contempt hearing was scheduled for this afternoon. It is a case against two strikers charged with having violated the picketing order by attacking and harassing strikebreakers.

Hearing on the picketing injunction will be held Wednesday.

One week of quiet, unmarred by a single instance of violence in the longshoremen's strike, passed on the waterfront.

A week ago the last strike disorder occurred at the Eastern & Western Lumber company dock, when 16 strikebreakers working on a ship were attacked by more than twice their number of strikers, in the absence of police. One man was badly beaten before the assailants abandoned the attack.

Miss Fern Hobbs, who has been serving the Y. M. C. A. at Coblenz with the American Army of Occupation, is expected to return to Portland July 1, according to information received by former Governor Oswald West.

Miss Hobbs severed her relations with the Y. M. C. A. April 24 because of the scattering of the American soldiers and is traveling about Europe for recreation before rejoining the Atlantic. She visited the Passion Play at Oberammergau May 7.

Miss Hobbs became nationally known as secretary to West while he was governor and later as an official of the War Savings Stamp and other patriotic drives. She was executive secretary of the American Red Cross in Paris during the war, and went back to Europe for Y. M. C. A. work with the army of occupation in Coblenz.

Immediately after leaving Coblenz she visited Carlsruhe, Heidelberg and Frankfurt; the week of May 1 she was in Berlin and Dresden; the week of May 7 she spent at Munich and Oberammergau and on May 13 she was at Antwerp and Brussels. She will be in London June 1, in New York June 10, and after a short visit in Connecticut and Salt Lake, she will arrive in Portland July 1, according to her schedule.
