

PROPERTY WORTH \$1,000,000 WILL BE SOLD BY CITY

One million dollars' worth of property owned by the city to pay delinquent bonded assessments for improvements will be sold at auction some time during the next two months.

The list includes property in all parts of the city. This condemned property has been accumulating for the past 10 years. The delinquent assessments were incurred for street improvements, sidewalks, curbing and paving, sewers and drainage improvements.

Preparations for the auction sale and all the necessary legal requirements are being completed by the city treasurer and the city attorney.

TO EXTEND FRONT STREET FROM NICOLAI TO YARDS

Front street will be extended north from Nicolai street to the freight terminal yards near Guide lake, according to the tentative decision of the city commissioners, who viewed the property which will be affected by the changes.

The commissioners decided not to use the first plan, which was cut diagonally across to Sherlock avenue. This plan would necessitate the moving of several buildings, entailing an expense of several hundred thousand dollars.

Resolutions embodying the intention to extend, widen and improve front street and instructions to the city engineer to prepare plans will be voted on at the next council meeting.

DIPHTHERIA AND SCARLET FEVER TAKE TWO CHILDREN

Two deaths Wednesday from contagious diseases were reported to the health bureau. Alvin Van Dehey, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Van Dehey, No. 19 Jessup street, died of diphtheria at the home of his parents. Mrs. Van Dehey is also reported to be suffering from diphtheria.

Jimmie Labadie, 2 years old, died of scarlet fever at the isolation hospital. He was taken to the hospital from his home at No. 834 Moody street Tuesday.

According to a report made by the health bureau, the father of the family has left home leaving the family in destitute circumstances.

MUNICIPAL PLANT MAKES LOWEST BID ON PAVING

The lowest responsible bid for paving East 27th street between Cork and Francis avenues, was made by the municipal paving plant, which bid \$6004 while the city engineer's estimate was \$7076. Other bids accepted by the city council Wednesday were for improvement of Monroe street, from Delany to North street, Hahnt & Rehnert at \$4411.80 for improvement of Phelps street from Linn to Ochoco avenues, John Greider & Co. at \$1885.84; for improving an alley in Holladay park addition, C. G. Handley at \$2136.79; for sidewalks and curbs on 62d street, John Greider & Co.

Wife Wounds Woman Found at Party in Husband's Company

Memphis, Tenn., May 18.—(I. N. S.)—Walking into a hotel dining room here today with a pistol in her hand, Mrs. Charles J. Walsh opened fire on a party in which her husband, Miss Corinne Frost, 23, and several other persons were dining. Miss Frost was wounded in the right leg.

Mrs. Walsh is said to have fired three times. She was arrested on a charge of shooting with intent to kill and was released on bond.

Miss Frost is recovering at a hospital.

TO AUCTION OFF LOTS

Tuesday, June 27, the city will sell at auction 5000 lots to raise money for delinquent assessments on the improvement of Foster road. The lots are in 68 districts and subdivisions.

River Data to Be Furnished Squadron Coming to Festival

The admiralty of the Pacific fleet will be presented with accurate data in regard to water depths and other navigation factors controlling shipping in the Columbia river so that definite information will be in its hands when a fleet is sent to Portland for the Rose Festival this year, according to decision made by the Chamber of Commerce following a special committee meeting Wednesday.

The special committee was composed of Admiral Mayo, Commander Kerr, of the navy recruiting service; Captain Jacob Speler, harbor master, and Frank Ira White, manager of the foreign trade department. Portland has been informed that Admiral Eberley of the Pacific fleet will dispatch a squadron of torpedo boats here for the festival. Naval authorities are of the opinion that larger ships should be sent to the port.

LUMBER OUTPUT IS GAINING STEADILY

business for delivery by rail amounted to 2776 cars.

Thirty-three per cent of the week's lumber shipments, including water, this amounted to 25,900,211 feet, of which domestic clearances accounted for 17,298,705 feet, and overseas clearances, 8,601,506 feet. Exports amounted to 1993 cars.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 11,807,475 feet, and unfilled export orders 75,162,032 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders total 6839 cars.

The nineteen weeks' production was 1,483,967,764 feet; new business, 1,608,638,533 feet, and shipments, 1,426,707,402 feet.

Young Postoffice Robbers Will Serve Time in Missouri

The Missouri reformatory at Booneville, Mo., was designated by Attorney General Daugherty as the place of confinement for Roy Ralston and John Paris, according to a wire received Wednesday by United States Marshal Hotchkiss. Paris was sentenced to 12 months and Ralston to 18 months, after they pleaded guilty to a charge of postoffice robbery.

Because the defendants are under 21, Federal Judge Wolverton ordered them to a reformatory, rather than to McNeil island. The young men will be held here until May 26, to save expenses for the government, as the summer railroad excursion rates are effective then. Another deputy marshal will leave the same date for Rockwell City, Iowa, with Pearl Vargas, convicted drug peddler, who has been ordered to serve 18 months in the women's reformatory at that city. Elizabeth Moorad of the Women's Protective bureau has been selected by Marshal Hotchkiss as special guard.

Forest Airplane Patrol Depends On Size of Army

Forest airplane patrol in the Northwest this summer depends largely upon the size of the army, and this has not yet been fixed by the military committee of the senate, Senator C. L. McNary has telegraphed C. S. Chapman, secretary of the Western Forestry and Conservation association.

Congress recently voted down an appropriation for airplane patrol, but Northwest foresters and timber owners are still fighting for this measure of forest protection which is estimated to save many thousands of dollars of timber annually and to furnish valuable training to air service men.

GOOD SAMARITANS ROBBERS' VICTIMS

It was a bad night for the good samaritans, according to the police records today which show reports of the two kind-hearted men who awoke to discover their benevolence rewarded with desertion and robbery.

C. W. Dearmond, 19, learned this morning when he awakened that the man whom he had clothed, fed and befriended for three weeks was gone from the room they shared in common, with \$150 which the boy had left in his pockets when he retired.

Dearmond told police he first met a man named Elmo Burch, 30, three weeks ago at Reedsport, Or. Burch had only 40 cents. A friendship sprang up between the two and Dearmond, who had savings of several months' work, agreed to help out until Burch could find work.

Together the two came to Portland. Dearmond paid for his friend's board and lodging and lent him \$70 with which to buy a new outfit of clothing.

Wednesday Dearmond sold a little automobile which he owned. He pocketed the money and thought nothing about any risk when he retired in the evening, leaving it in his clothing.

But this morning he awoke and found that he alone occupied the room in a hotel at First and Morrison streets. The man he befriended was gone. On a suitcase in plain view the missing man purposely had left a \$50 bill—to show "appreciation" for the kindness he had received.

P. J. Geary, resident of the Home hotel on Third, near Ankeny street, reported to police that \$85 which he had in his room was missing when he awoke after a drinking bout with a friend whom he knew as "Blackie." He said he met the friend Wednesday afternoon in the north end and took him to his room. He said Blackie disappeared with the money while he was asleep. Detectives watched the north end for some time with Geary, but the missing man could not be found.

Drainage Work Is To Be Investigated To Protect Fish

An investigation of drainage work on the Columbia river between St. Johns and Troutdale and its effect upon the game fish in sloughs and lakes which will be reclaimed, will be made by the state game commission. During recent drainage operations thousands of bass, croppies and catfish were destroyed when the lakes and sloughs were drained. An attempt will be made to formulate some plan for saving the fish in the new drainage operations.

This territory, which is embraced by Multnomah drainage district No. 1, contains about one third of the bass, croppies and catfish in the state, according to Captain A. E. Burghdurf, state game warden.

May Open Season on Band Tail Pigeons

Band tail pigeons are becoming so numerous on the Pacific Coast that the biological survey will make an investigation this summer to determine whether the season for shooting might be opened immediately. These pigeons are protected under the federal migratory bird act until 1935. E. H. Clark, deputy district game warden for Multnomah county, reported today that following an investigation along the western edge of the city he had encountered a band of these pigeons numbering approximately 250. Similar bands are reported from various places in the western part of the state.

KLANSMEN INITIATED

Seattle, May 18.—(I. N. S.)—The "invisible empire" has 268 new members here today as a result of a Ku Klux Klan initiation held Tuesday night. P. M. McFarlane, who claims to be Northwest klan chief, officiated. Business and professional men made up the bulk of the class.

SUNDAY TRAFFIC HEAVIEST

Sandy, May 18.—The annual traffic census was completed by E. D. Eason, resident engineer, Monday night at 10 o'clock. Saturday 175 vehicles passed through town, Sunday 342, and Monday 148.

200 Physicians Are At Clinics; Lecture Series Is Popular

About 200 physicians are attending the clinics and lectures given at the 19th annual meeting of the Alumni association of the University of Oregon Medical school. Sir Thomas Lewis of London, who is giving the Jones lectures every night at 8:30 at the Multnomah hotel, is the chief attraction.

Clinics are conducted each morning. On Tuesday the clinic was at the free dispensary. Fourth and Jefferson streets, and Wednesday it was at Good Samaritan. Each afternoon papers on technical subjects have been read at the Portland hotel.

The banquet and business meeting will take place tonight at the Portland hotel at 8 o'clock. Officers will be elected for the ensuing year.

Lectures of Sir Thomas will continue through Friday night.
