"PORTLAND 1923" will be the slogan of the Northwest delegation to the national convention of Business and Professional Women's Clubs in Chattanooga, Tenn., July 15 to 20. The heartiest cooperation has been assured by Washington, Idaho and Montana in boosting for Portland as the hostess city for next year's convention. Minnesota, Nebraska, Colorado and many other states have wired their approval and support.

The second annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs in Portland, Wednesday, will have as the important issue the national convention. A large number of delegates throughout the state are expected at the state meeting and it is hoped that the impetus imparted at the convention will inspire a large number to join those planning on the eastern trip in July. Wednesday's program includes an informal reception at headquarters in the Central building for delegates and visitors in the morning, a business meeting in the afternoon and a dinner at the Chamber of Commerce to finish off the day. Buland, chairman of the committee on legislation, gave an interesting report touching upon the work of the committee in connection with the alien narcotic bill which has recently been passed by the Oregon legislature. Mrs. Buland, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, is the Oregon housewife to Oregon industries. E. H. Whitney spoke of the coming school bond issue and Judge George Rossmann gave a comprehensive talk on the narcotic evil.

A lively discussion followed the report of the special committee appointed to investigate the recent carfare issue. These on the committee were Mrs. Carlos Unna, Mrs. Ida H. Boyer, Mrs. Luther D. Narcotic Evil Is Discussed By Mayor Baker

FOR the sake of humanity the public must take an interest in the narcotic traffic in the United States, Mayor Baker said today, in a speech before the luncheon at the Hotel Benson, Monday. There are between 1,000,000 and 3,000,000 drug addicts in this country today, he continued, and over 1000 in Portland. There must be a rigid control of anything which is so detrimental to the welfare of the general public as the drug traffic. Over 50 per cent of the crime committed by addicts, who will stoop to the lowest degree of degradation to obtain money to purchase the drug they crave. Not only is the crime completely destroyed, but their mental system wrecked, and the penal institutions, insane asylums and charitable institutions are full of them. The public, he said, must demand more laws and the enforcement of those laws to curb the drug peddler, who is worse than any murderer. The White Cross continued, was organized to stamp out this insidious evil, and is in need of the loyal support of every citizen in Portland.
