

REPUBLICANS OF CLARKE COUNTY NAME DELEGATES

Resolutions Are Passed Approving Harding Administration and Hart Administrative Statute.

Vancouver, Wash., May 20.—A convention of Republican precinct committeemen held in the superior court room Saturday afternoon was, on emotion, turned into a mass convention in which all Republicans present were invited to take part. W. G. Drowley, chairman of the county central committee, was elected chairman, and Fred Tempes, secretary. A committee on resolutions, composed of A. L. Miller, G. Y. Moody and Gus Homer, was appointed. The committee on delegates was composed of A. W. Calder, J. P. Kiggins and H. E. Apperson.

Among the speakers were W. W. Sparks, George McCoy, state senator; Joseph Hall, county attorney; Fred Brooker and Arthur Thayer of Canas.

The following resolutions were adopted: "We believe that better administration of public affairs can be had through party organization, and we renew our faith in the general policies of the Republican party. We congratulate the people of our state and nation on the efficient administration of President Harding and on the progress that has been made toward a solution of the many problems growing out of the World War."

"We commend the administration in its endeavor to systematize the administration of public affairs and consequent reduction in the burden of public expense. We commend the chief executive of our state for the adoption through his recommendation of the administrative code which has materially reduced state expenses."

"We realize that we have reached a period where property values are impaired and business handicapped by reason of excessive taxation, and that reforms must be made and changes effected reducing expenses before there can be a return to normal conditions. We are opposed to any law that will put it within the power of district, county or state officers to increase the tax levy and thereby place additional burdens on the taxpayers."

PRIMARY LAW HIT
The primary election law has proven expensive and unsatisfactory and we believe that changes should be made in the law which would bring about the nomination of officials in a less expensive way and result in the nomination of more competent officials. We pledge our party to support men for public office whose experience and qualifications justify the belief that they will devote their best efforts to filling the duties of the office they are elected to."

The Dalles Will Have Film Studio For Scenic Comedy

The Dalles, May 20.—Harold J. Binney, head of the Josh Binney Motion Picture corporation of Portland, signed contracts today for concessions from the city as the result of which his studio will be located here in the near future. Binney was guaranteed stock subscriptions of about \$10,000 here, and a free site for the studio and other buildings.

A complete plant will be installed, Binney said, including the studio and a laboratory for the finishing of the films.

Binney said he was especially attracted by the weather conditions, which give more sunshine days and clearer atmosphere here than in Portland. About \$40,000 will be spent by the company in plant construction, he said. He plans to specialize in a new type of picture, which he calls scenic comedies, and will draw upon the natural wonderland of this locality for his settings.

He plans, the producer said, to seek locations for his pictures along the Columbia river, on the slopes of mountains, Adams and Hood, at the Celilo falls and other places in the vicinity.

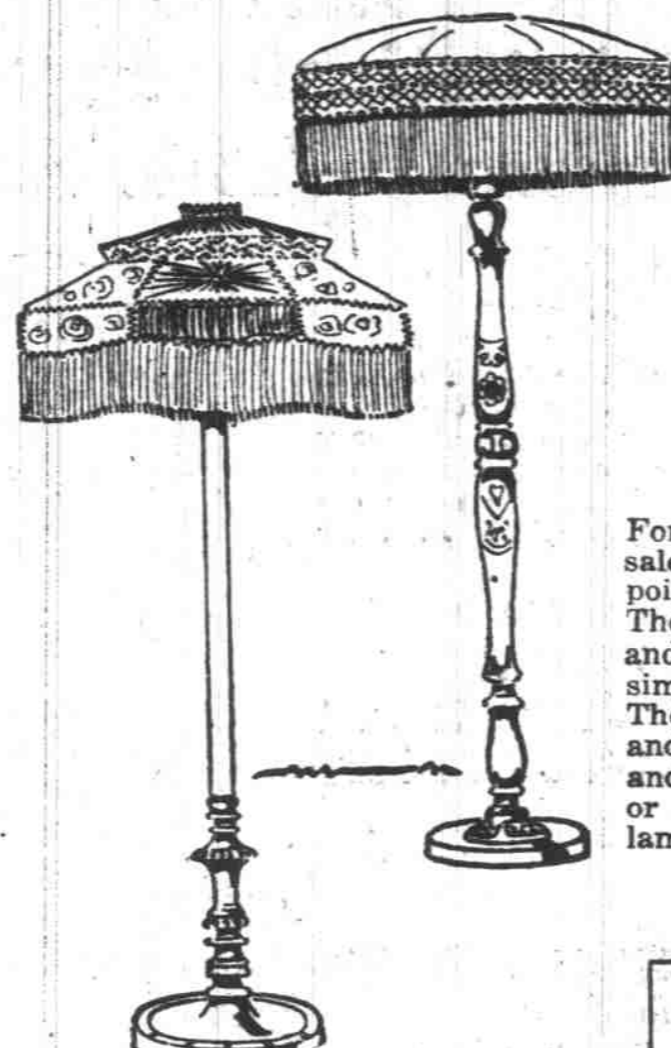
