

BOY IS DROWNED; MEMORIAL DAY'S TRAFFIC URTS

Memorial day accidents resulted in the death of one person and injury of seven, according to police reports. The death was an accidental drowning of a boy in swimming. The injuries were all the result of mishaps which were more numerous on account of the heavy street traffic resulting from the combination of a holiday and good weather.

Thirty traffic accidents were reported before 9:30 this morning at the police traffic bureau. Officials, judging on the number of accidents already reported, estimate that Memorial day mishaps will run well over 50.

Adelbert Reynolds, age 16, was drowned in 12 feet of water in Sullivan's gulch near East Seventh street, Tuesday afternoon while paddling around the slough clinging to a board.

BOY COULDN'T SWIM

Reynolds and several other boys were swimming in the muddy backwater when the lad lost his hold on the board. He was not able to swim without the help of the plank and went down. The other boys were so badly frightened they did not give assistance.

The body was recovered at 8 o'clock by Hugh Brady, grappier of the harbor patrol.

Adelbert Reynolds, an orphan, lived with his uncle, George W. Reynolds, at No. 850 East Davis street. There has been one death by drowning in this slough each year for the last three. The water ranges up to 30 feet in depth, and owing to the fact that there is so much entangling weed and rubbish in the gulch, it is regarded as an especially dangerous swimming hole.

Ray Manning, 27, No. 695 Water street, is in the Good Samaritan hospital with serious internal injuries to his stomach, unable to give attendance an account of the accident which befell him late Tuesday night on the Linnton road.

TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

He was taken to the hospital by Walter Hadfield, deputy sheriff of St. Helens, who said the man was struck by an automobile while fixing a tire on his own machine. Further than that, police have as yet been unable to get information regarding the accident. Manning was knocked unconscious and remembers nothing of what happened.

Henry Katz, living at the Globe hotel, was struck to the pavement at Broadway and Flanders street late Tuesday night by an automobile driven by C. B. Flanders, No. 922 Fourth street. A wheel of the machine ran over Katz's body. He was taken to the emergency hospital, where it was found that two ribs were broken. He was later transferred to the Emanuel hospital, where this morning it was reported he was feeling badly. An X-ray examination will be made to determine if he has internal injuries.

BICYCLIST IS HURT

George Armitage, 16, No. 725 Tillamook street, was bruised and scraped in a crash Tuesday afternoon when a bicycle he was riding was struck by a motor car at East 10th and Burnside streets. The automobile, driven by W. J. Welch, No. 48 East 43d street north, dragged the boy five or six feet after he was knocked to the pavement. Armitage was not severely injured.

In an effort to avoid a collision with a Mount Scott car at Grays Crossing on East 32d street yesterday, M. C. Eaton, Empress hotel, and H. C. Todd, Hunter, No. 42 East Third street, collided. Eaton and Todd were riding into a ditch, severely bruising themselves. The machine turned over onto Eaton, bruising and scratching his back and shoulders. Toddunter was thrown against the streetcar and suffered painful injuries to his leg and foot.

CHILD BADLY BRUISED

The three year old child of Mr. and Mrs. J. Gumbert, No. 405 East 12th street, was badly bruised Tuesday afternoon when it was struck by an automobile at East 11th and Harrison streets. The car was driven by T. H. Greer, No. 611 Inlay avenue, who stated the child ran directly in front of his machine and the accident was unavoidable.

Thomas Dempsey, 44, No. 201 Jefferson street, was run over and severely injured late yesterday afternoon by a Japanese delivery truck at Third and Davis streets. The truck was driven by Topykichi Isaura, No. 222 Front street. According to the police, the Japanese was speeding south on Third street. Dempsey, a picture salesman, was crossing the street, and became confused when the car approached. Examination of the injured man at St. Vincent's hospital showed that the back of his head was badly cut. Isaura was held under \$2000 bail on a charge of reckless driving.

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Woman Principal of School Kills Herself Following Dismissal

Elgin, Ill., May 31.—Disaster from the service after she had been a school teacher here for 27 years meant so much to Miss Mary Elizabeth Long, principal of the Sheridan school, that she committed suicide on Memorial day by drinking poison.

Miss Long had held the principal's post for 14 years.

Feeling against the board reached a torrid heat Tuesday night when more than 50 other principals and instructors also removed or placed on probation by the school board held a crowded mass meeting at which many prominent business men and women who had been pupils of the dead teacher long ago assailed the board's action as un-American and even charged it with the murder of Miss Long.

Meanwhile the school board was passing a resolution of regret. The teachers are in a hot water and have engaged an attorney.

Miss Long and the other dismissed teachers were members of the Elgin Teachers' association, which at the municipal election two months ago, backed the Rev. Frank D. Adams of the United Church for president of the school board against Dr. Edward H. Abbott. Dr. Abbott won.

Beneath the boiling rays of the sun, Portland was given only one source of gratification. That was the absence of moisture in the air. The heat of Tuesday and today is dry heat and, according to the weather man, is not felt nearly as much as the damp heat.

In the air Tuesday there was only a humidity of 13 per cent. At 5 p.m. at 8 a.m. today the humidity was only 50 per cent, this being unusually low for such an early morning reading.

SUN KILLS SNOW

The heat wave comes itself mostly to Western Oregon and has resulted in the run-off of much snow water in the Cascade mountains which has kept the river level at the high point of 17 feet, despite the slight fall in the Columbia river flood waters.

Average temperatures still control in the Columbia river watershed near its source, with the result that the Columbia river rose only one foot at Wenatchee Tuesday and the Snake river remained stationary at Lewiston. A slight fall in the flood waters at Portland is expected until Saturday, when a new rise will bring the level of the river up to the same point as that recorded today.

HOT AT RIDGEFIELD

Ridgefield, Wash., May 31.—The hottest day of the season was experienced Tuesday afternoon at Ridgefield, when the mercury went to 87.

AT EUGENE

Eugene, May 31.—The mercury rose to 52 degrees here yesterday, breaking all heat records for this time of the year. Slight frosts occurred here a week ago.

Winner of Rhodes Scholarship Will Depart This Week

Tom Brockway, winner of the Oregon Rhodes scholarship for 1922, leaves for the East this week preparatory to sailing for England late in August. Brockway was graduated from Reed college last June, and has since been taking further graduate study under Dr. R. F. Scholz, president of Reed, who was a student at Oxford from 1904 to 1907. Brockway has been appointed to Lincoln College, Oxford, where he will join Stephen Smith, Oregon's Rhodes scholar in 1920.

Other Oregon Rhodes scholars now in residence at Oxford are Roy Miller, Balliol college, Lloyd Haberly, Trinity college, and Frank Flint, Balliol.

Maniac Attacks His Room-Mate, Tries to Kill Another, Flees

Eatonville, Wash., May 31.—C. Romani is in the Eatonville hospital near Rome in the room of a murderous attack by Pete Bini this morning at 5 o'clock. Bini had acted queerly for some time, but was not supposed to be dangerous. This morning he became suddenly insane. The two men occupied the same room. Romani was asleep when attacked. He is still unconscious and has a fracture of the base of the skull. Bini then attempted to kill G. Romani by shooting him. The latter managed to get the gun away from the maniac. Bini then made for the woods in the direction of the mountain road.

MRS. LOUELLA KYLES

Telegraphic information has been received in Portland by members of the African M. E. Zion church, announcing the death Sunday night at St. Louis of Mrs. Louella M. Kyles, wife of Bishop L. W. Kyles. Bishop Kyles is well known in Portland, he being the presiding officer of the fourth Episcopal diocese, which covers the Pacific coast conferences of that denomination. For the past six years he has made annual and occasionally semi-annual visits here. Last spring Mrs. Kyles accompanied him on his visit to Portland. Mrs. Kyles will be taken to her old home in Winston-Salem, N. C., for interment.

G.O.P. COMMITTEE WRECKS PLAN TO SUPPORT TICKET

In about a week from now it will be known whether the Stanfield faction of the Republican party, aided by an alliance with the Klan influences with which the Stanfield managing men are now in negotiation, will gather the Republican county central committee of Multnomah into its keeping and control. Ten days later it will be determined whether the same group will take over the conduct of the state committee.

Saturday night last the preliminary steps necessary to gather in the county committee was taken at a secret meeting called in Judge Taswell's court room by A. A. Bailey, which was attended by some 53 members out of the total membership of 426 of the county committee.

RESOLUTION WRECKED

An inkling of what those who attended the meeting have in mind was given when a resolution was introduced setting out, in substance, that, with the primary fight over and the ballots counted, the county committee should pledge itself to support the Republican ticket from top to bottom. This resolution was walked from all sides and went down to defeat.

Senator Stanfield, who is against reported to have left for Washington and his duties there as United States senator, was in Portland for the greater part of last week making his headquarters at the office maintained by Ferdinand Reed in the Oregonian building.

NOTABLE VISITORS TO ATTEND MEET

Newberg, May 31.—The thirtieth annual session of Oregon yearly meeting of the Friends church will convene in Newberg, June 15, the meeting on ministry and oversight meeting the previous day. The sessions will continue until Monday, June 20, and perhaps a day longer.

This year, in addition to the regular business of the yearly meeting, the yearly meeting will appoint its representatives to the various boards of the denomination, and will name its representatives to the quinquennial meeting of the five years meeting of Friends in America, the national organization which holds its session this year in Richmond, Ind., in September.

Two notable visitors are to be present at the annual meeting here in June. One of these is Dr. Walter C. Woodward, general secretary of the American Friends, the national organ of the church. Mr. Woodward is a graduate of Pacific college, and formerly a member of Oregon yearly meeting. Another notable worker who will be present is Arthur B. Chilson for many years head of the Friends of the World work in Africa, and now in the field for the American Friends Board of Foreigners.

REASON GIVEN

When the resolution pledging support of the Multnomah committee to the party nominees was under discussion at the secret Bailey meeting on Saturday night the main reason for its defeat, according to the story that has crept out of the meeting place, was that the coming campaign was not to be fought on Republican and Democratic lines, but those of Klan and anti-Klan.

Apparently those who were in control of the gathering did not want to be tied up by any party lines or pledges of party loyalty for the coming general election campaign with Governor Olcott as the Republican nominee at the head of the ticket.

H. A. Day of the Fulton precinct was picked as the candidate for county chairman, in opposition to Jack Day, present candidate and a candidate for reelection.

SUPPORTS BAILEY

The official call for the organization meeting of the county committee in Multnomah, and all other counties, must, under the law, fall within 20 days of the date of the primary election. The state committee must meet and organize within 10 days of the county organizations.

The state committee is composed of state committee members elected by the county committees, one from each county. A. A. Bailey, who called the Saturday night meeting, is slated by the Stanfield-Klan group for support as state committeeman from Multnomah county.

Business Improves; Auto Output Leads

Washington, May 31.—(U. P.)—Business is making steady progress toward recovery, the department of commerce reported today following a report of conditions for April. Building construction and automobile production are setting the pace, the department stated. Automobile production increased approximately 30 per cent during April over March, while building increased an even greater extent, reports show.

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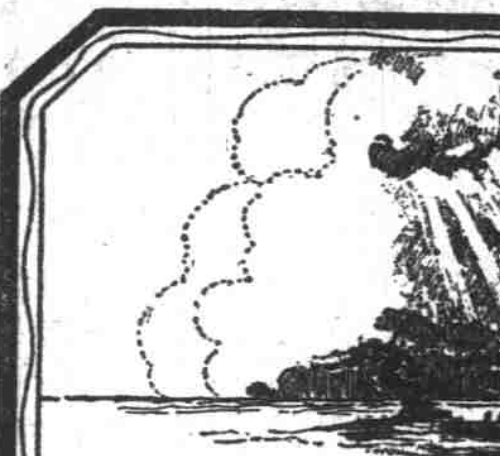
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Palmer Lumber Co. Wants Arbitration

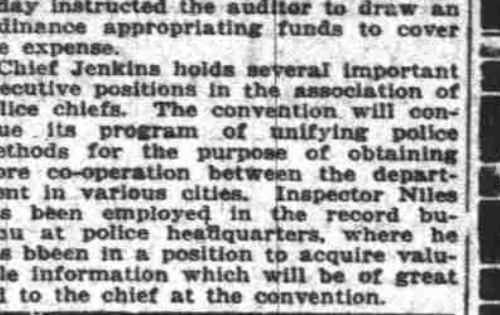
CHIEF JENKINS AND NILES TO GO TO CONVENTION
