

DAUGHTERY ASKED TO MEET FISHERMEN

Chicago, June 2.—Kenesaw M. Landis, former federal judge and now high commissioner for organized baseball, may play a leading part in the prosecution of the government's war fraud cases, as a special assistant to Attorney General Daugherty.

Landis has been offered the job, Daugherty declared here Friday, and is now considering acceptance. Daugherty believes he will accept.

If Landis agrees to help in going after the war fraud cases, his friends declared following Daugherty's announcement, the country can expect to see more action in these cases than would be likely to occur in the appointment of any other one man.

TOP OF ALL SLACKERS

Always an implacable foe to all classes opposing the government's conduct of the war, the noted jurist has practically filled Fort Leavenworth with war slackers and patriots in the same manner. During his long term as United States judge here scores of ex-service men arranged before him were treated with marked leniency upon display of honorable discharge papers from the army or navy.

Major Reed Landis, the judge's son, was an ace in the air service during the war, and Landis has been extremely bitter against those who thought failed to do their part in the war.

Daugherty's plan to enlist Landis bears a strong resemblance to the action of American and National league club owners when they made Landis the all-powerful head of organized baseball and the acquisition of former Postmaster Will Hays by the motion picture producers.

TO CREATE NEW BRANCH

Landis, if Daugherty's plans go through, will be the principal figure in a new branch of the department of justice to be known as the "war control division," which will devote itself exclusively to investigation and prosecution of alleged defrauders of the government during the war.

"I have already engaged ex-Senator Thomas of Colorado and Congressman Harvey of Nebraska and they will be in charge of the personnel of the new branch of the department of justice," Daugherty said.

In addition to Landis, Daugherty said, he is also trying to get Francis E. McGovern, former governor of Wisconsin and one of the most prominent lawyers in that state, to head the new branch.

Announcement of Landis' acceptance or refusal of the tendered post will also have to come from Daugherty, the judge told the United News over the long distance telephone from his summer cottage at Burt Lake, Mich., Friday night. Landis refused to make any statement or comment on the matter, but the trout at Burt Lake were biting eagerly.

ACCEPTANCE EXPECTED

"Some time ago," Daugherty said, "I had a conference with Judge Landis in Washington. While he gave me no definite answer, I am convinced that he looks upon my proposition favorably and that he will be one of the special prosecutors representing the government when the cases come to trial.

"The undertaking of prosecuting war frauds will be one of the greatest, if not the greatest, ever confronting the department of justice. I have engaged 50 lawyers in a building in Washington to handle the investigation, experts and prosecutors. There were more than 150,000 contracts entered into by the war department alone. These transactions are being taken over now, and as fast as the cases are found, cases are prepared. We have found material so far for 256 cases.

"I am sure that the best legal minds in the country. These cases are going to be tried and pushed to the limit, and the best men in the country are required to try them."

Cooperative Buying Saves \$25,000 for O. A. C. Fraternities

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 3.—A saving of \$25,000 has been effected in the last year in the purchase of supplies by the 46 fraternities and other organizations forming the cooperative managers' association. Five-year contracts have been signed by the houses, placing the organization on a permanent basis.

The cooperative enterprise is original at the college, started two years ago as an experiment. All the organizations on the campus are members.

Approximately 700 persons were served by the association when it was first incorporated. It now serves more than twice that number, ordering meats, warehouse, carrying supplies of groceries, furniture and hardware. Contracts are negotiated for the college, from such items as wood, milk, meat, bread, etc.

During the college year 1930-31, a sum in excess of a million dollars was spent under the direction of the association, an estimated saving of \$25,000 to the organized students. In addition to supplying commodities, the association acts as an employment agency to furnish cooks and other help for the houses.

A prominent member of the national inter-fraternity council, after a thorough investigation, said the association is probably the most successful buying organization for college organizations in the United States.

Cannery Operators To Meet Fishermen On Price Revision

Astoria, June 3.—Salmon cannery operators of the Lower Columbia river district will meet with the fishermen of the Columbia River Fishermen's league to discuss a possible revision in the prices being paid the fishermen for their raw salmon.

The fishermen feel that the price of 10 cents a pound, being paid under the agreement reached with the packers before the season started, should be increased as independent buyers are paying from 12 to 15 cents a pound cash. Many of the fishermen are obligated to the packers who have backed them and are morally obliged to sell them the fish which they catch.

The fishermen feel that, as independent buyers are able to pay high prices, the packers should equalize the difference by raising the price paid to the fishermen with whom they have understandings.

BARBER SUGGESTS TWO PLANS FOR SENATOR PROCTOR

Because of the magnitude of the project and the importance of obtaining the most favorable construction offers possible on the improvement of five streets in the east side districts is scheduled for next Wednesday's session of the city council.
