

BULLET IN LEG MERE BAGATELLE FOR GIRL HIKER

A bullet in her leg is no impediment to Miss Althea Currier, who, accompanied by Miss Anne Bender, is returning to New York on the last lap of a double transcontinental hike. Miss Currier acquired her souvenir bullet at Alturas, Cal., where someone in a hunting party mistook her for a jack rabbit. It was quite aggravating to be laid up four days in a little town like Alturas, but it has now been a whole week since the accident occurred, and Miss Currier has almost forgotten about it. She still carries the bullet—the doctor said it would be better left in than removed—and in her khaki coat and breeches are two neatly mended bullet holes, which she is already to show to all doubters.

USED TO ROUGH STUFF

But little things like being shot are of small moment to Miss Currier. For while Miss Bender seems to bear a charmed existence, Miss Currier is quite used to being laid up here and there along the road. There was the time, for instance, when she fell down the cliff in the Rocky mountains. The rock upon which she was standing suddenly rolled down the canyon, and Miss Currier went along with it, striking a little projection that stopped her. Some young men who were in that party rescued her, and then had to chase after the horses that had run away in fright.

Another time she was thrown from a wild horse and "knocked out for a day."

STARTED LAST JULY

Miss Currier and Miss Bender left New York last July and hopped cross country to San Francisco, where they spent the winter. They are stenographers and obtained work for the winter. While in California, they hiked pretty much over the state. They are leaving today for Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., and will return to New York through Glacier and Yellowstone national parks.

They carry 25-pound packs, containing their bedding, although they usually make towns at night.

Mrs. Roosevelt Is Appreciative of Use Of Husband's Name

Acknowledgment by Mrs. Edith Kermit Roosevelt, widow of the late Theodore Roosevelt, of appreciation of the school board's action in naming the new high school in St. Johns district after her husband, has been made in a letter to R. H. Thomas, school clerk and business manager.

"Please express my thanks to the board of directors for having chosen my husband's name for their new school," wrote Mrs. Roosevelt. "It shall be glad if you see fit to read the enclosed quotation at your opening." The quotation was from the last public statement of Roosevelt as follows: "There must be no sagging back in the fight for Americanism. If an immigrant comes here, he shall be treated on equality with everyone else, regardless of his creed or birthplace or origin. This is predicated upon a man becoming ever after an American and nothing but an American. There cannot be divided allegiance at all. We have room in this country for but one flag—the American flag; we have room for but one language—the English language; we have room for but one soul loyalty, and that is loyalty to the American people."

Driver of Freight Team in Early Day Dies at Age of 72

Elgin, June 6.—Arie Rydam, 72, for more than 45 years a resident of the Elgin country, died at Hot Lake sanatorium, Saturday. At an early age he crossed the plains with his parents and was educated in the public schools in the vicinity of Island City.

As a young man, Mr. Rydam was a freighter, driving freighting teams from Umatilla county into the Eastern Oregon country, reaching points as far east as Malheur county.

Mr. Rydam was married in 1873 to Miss Cruikshank and the family resided on a homestead on Cricket Flat, eight miles east of Elgin, until 1909, when they moved to Elgin.

The funeral was held Sunday at the city hall, and was under the auspices of the Elgin Masonic lodge. His wife and eight children survive.

SUNDAY BASEBALL IS CONDEMNED BY MINISTERIAL UNION

Professional Sunday baseball games were condemned this morning at the monthly meeting of the Portland Ministerial Union, and a resolution introduced by Dr. T. H. Gallagher, pastor of Sunnyside Methodist church, thanking the management of the Portland team for the free clergy passes issued to the games, failed to be seconded and was tabled without a vote.

The Rev. W. L. Riley, pastor of Highland Baptist church, vigorously protested against the motion. He said that its passage would be tantamount to the approval of Sunday baseball games.

Dr. Edward H. Pence of Westminster Presbyterian church, suggested that the matter be left to each individual man to settle for himself. He suggested that those who had no scruples against accepting passes thank the management individually.

The association took a decided stand against the circulation through Portland newspapers of improper pictures and questionable reading matter, and appointed Dr. Charles MacCaughy of Centenary-Wilbur Methodist church as chairman of a committee to cooperate with a general committee from the civic clubs in stamping out the sale of this material in Portland.

The annual election resulted: President, Rev. W. W. MacHenry of Mount Tabor Presbyterian church; vice president, Rev. W. E. Brinkman of St. James English Lutheran church; secretary-treasurer, Rev. Ray E. Close, executive secretary of the Portland Council of Churches. The next meeting of the union will be September 5.

Following a presentation of the needs of the Portland school district by A. C. Newell of the board of school directors, the clergy voted to endorse the bond issue and to urge its people next Sunday to support it at the polls on June 17.

Judge Jacob Kansler named the benefits to be derived from the citizen's training camp, after which the clergy unanimously passed a resolution endorsing it. They also favored the creation wherever possible of Sunday night church forums for the discussion of social and economic questions.

Urge Temperance But Denounce Laws For Prohibition

Paris, June 6.—Prohibition has been denounced and temperance recommended as conducive to good health by the parliamentary representatives of 24 nations gathered in Paris.

"A regime of complete prohibition should never be adopted save as an exceptional and transitory measure," reads a resolution passed by the inter-parliamentary conference as it finished.

its deliberations at the Luxembourg palace. The resolution recommends the use of wine as conducive to good health in the following words: "Considering that the interdiction of wine does not accord with the principles of the real fight against drunkenness and consideration that wine should not be treated as an article of luxury the conference expresses the wish that the erroneous ideas about the harmfulness of wine shall be combated all over the world and that no special restrictions shall be imposed on the production or trade in wine."

The delegates to the conference have promised to urge the adoption of this policy in their respective countries. Thus Canada, Brazil, Argentina and other parts of the New World may go on record as opposed to prohibition.

Senate Engages in Free-for-All Debate

S.)—An old-fashioned "give and take" debate was staged in the senate this morning when Senator Pat Harrison, Democrat of Mississippi, charged the Republicans with "filibustering" against the McCumber bill to prevent its passage. A dozen senators plunged into the debate and for more than an hour charges were hurled back and forth.
