

DESTROYERS DUE AT PORTLAND ON SUNDAY, JUNE 18

Six destroyers will steam up the Columbia and anchor in Portland harbor Sunday afternoon, June 18, to be present for the Rose Festival.

The battleship Connecticut, stationed at San Pedro and ordered to the Rose Festival, may meet the destroyers at the mouth of the river. Rear Admiral Chase of the Pacific fleet will accompany Commander G. L. P. Stone, who has charge of the Connecticut.

The forest service will have four floats in the Rose Festival parade. Shirley Buck of the forest service announced Tuesday. One of these will be a decorated fire fighting truck; one will be a truck depicting the grazing and lumbering activities on the national forests; the third will show the recreational features of the national forests, and the fourth will be a comparison between natural wooded hillsides and fire devastated areas.

The forest service is also planning to have a small pack train in the parade.

At the sportsmen's and tourists' show the forest service will have a booth.

Under the supervision of Clay S. Morse, Maurice E. Crumpacker, Fred W. German, H. W. Kent and James Forbes of the Rose Festival board of governors, decoration of the downtown sections was begun Tuesday.

The festival center in the park blocks from Taylor to Madison streets will be converted into a fairland of flowers, greenery and colored electric lights. "Alfalfa Rex" of the Crook County Irrigators, writes: "Be sure to station us just behind a good band with plenty of pep and jazz, because we will be there in our blue jeans and sun hats, just as strong as ever, and we'll be stepping high."

Eagles of Oregon Indorse Federal Old-Age Pensions

Eugene, June 7.—The state convention of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, which closes a two day session here today, adopted resolutions strongly endorsing the movement for old age government pensions, similar to those paid in several European countries. The order intends to cooperate with other organizations in educating the public to the desirability of a federal old age pension law.

The national organization of Eagles will be asked to send an organizer to Oregon to visit cities which do not have aerie and endeavor to form new lodges there. Many candidates were initiated into the local order last evening and officers were installed. Officers of the state aerie are to be chosen today, an excursion taken up the McKenzie river and a dance held in the evening.

HOOD RIVER SAFE ROBBED
Hood River, June 7.—Burglars last night broke open a safe in a warehouse of the Apple Growers' association, securing about \$10 in change. This is the second burglary of its nature in Hood River within a month.

SEABECK DRIVE AIDED
University of Oregon, Eugene, June 7.—A party of students spent Tuesday evening at Coburg bridge enjoying a program given for the benefit of the campus Seabeck drive. About 30 students plan to attend Seabeck summer camps.

3000 Rotarians in World Convention Dedicated to Club

Los Angeles, June 7.—(I. N. S.)—Declaring that no two-edged sword ever will cleave asunder the idea of fellowship and service, Rotary's two fundamental, Joseph A. Turner, Roanoke, Va., today voiced the purposes of the organization before a packed audience of approximately 3000 delegates attending the 12th Rotary international convention here.

With adoption of the modernized constitution, the name of the organization automatically was changed from International Association of Rotary Clubs to Rotary International. The new name was applauded by members who declared it was a relief to have a concise but equally expressive term for the world-wide coterie of clubs.

COMMISSION TO STOP ROAD WORK

Construction work on the west side Pacific highway in Polk county will be discontinued unless Polk county can provide means for financing its share of the cost through legal sources. This decision was reached by the state highway commission Tuesday after considering the recent decision of Circuit Judge Kelly which prohibits the county from applying market road funds on the work or incurring an obligation in excess of the constitutional limit of indebtedness.

Judge Kelly held in substance that the state highway commission had the authority to establish the location of the road from Mogmouh south, but that the agreement between the commission and the county whereby the county obligates itself to a debt of \$118,000 was illegal. He also held that the county had no authority to designate a section of the road as a market road and apply market road funds thereto, as it is a state road.

The decision of Judge Kelly that state roads cannot be designated as market roads will have an effect outside of Polk county. A number of other counties, including Lane and Gilliam, have resorted to this expedient to raise funds for state road construction. In view of the decision in the Polk county case it is probable that the state highway commission will cause a test case to be initiated to test the constitutionality of the proceeding.

WILL TRY HECKER WITHIN 3 WEEKS

Oregon City, June 7.—The trial of Russell Hecker, youthful prisoner charged with first degree murder for the alleged slaying of Frank Bowker, Portland musician, April 16, will open here on June 27. Hecker formally pleaded not guilty yesterday.

Following his plea, his attorneys, Gale S. Hill of Albany and Thomas G. Ryan of Portland, conferred with District Attorney Stipp regarding the trial date. Judge Campbell and Stipp are both anxious to speed up the trial they said. Hecker will be tried here, as circumstantial evidence is said to indicate that Bowker was killed on East 22d street in Clackamas county and his body taken to Albany, where it was thrown into the Catapooya river.

MILLAGE LAW IS DEFENDED IN NEW PLEA TO GRANGE

McMinnville, June 7.—Opposition to the repeal of the millage law supporting higher education in Oregon and a stand for an anti-alien land leasing or ownership were two of the main resolutions introduced at the State Grange session here. The Grange has not acted upon them.

Return to the old system of electing State Grange officials from the floor of the convention is asked in another resolution and still another calls attention to use of oleomargarine in the Oregon Agricultural college dining rooms.

JAIL TERMS DEMANDED
The committee on temperance proposed a resolution, which was unanimously adopted, demanding jail terms upon conviction of Volstead liquor law violations.

Dating of seed packages, opposition to cigarettes, formation of more surrounding and membership drives, complete restriction of immigration for three to five years and opposition to single tax were among resolutions offered.

FINANCES ARE SOUND
Finances of the state grange were reported to be on a sound basis, according to the annual statement read by H. Hirschberg, treasurer. Mrs. Bertha J. Beck of Albany, state secretary, reported that there are at present 10,228 members of the grange in good standing distributed among 170 granges.

There were seven subordinate granges and one juvenile grange organized during the year. It was reported. Park grange of Hood River county has the largest membership, with Russellville grange of Multnomah county a close second. The delegates will make an inspection trip through Yamhill county Thursday as guests of the McMinnville Commercial club.

The opening session was attended by 500 delegates. Local homes were thrown open to the visitors and all were well cared for. Many of the delegates are making their stay at the auto camp grounds.

TO ELECT OFFICERS
Election of officers is scheduled for this evening, followed by a lecturer's program. Tomorrow evening a memorial service will be held. In the morning choice of next year's meeting place will be a feature.

Mayr W. S. Houck welcomed the Grangers at a meeting in the city park last night, with a response by State Grange Master C. E. Spence of Oregon City. Dr. H. L. Toney, president of the McMinnville Commercial club, spoke and the Walnut City band gave a concert.

**Trappers Told to
Get Wild Animal
Life for Festival**
Stanley Jewett of the United States predatory animal service, has sent instructions to the 20 government trappers in this district to capture all the live animals possible during the next 10 days so that a variety of wild life may be exhibited in connection with the first annual sportsmen's and tourist show in Portland during the Rose Festival.

Arrangements for the various exhibits to be made at the show are complete in almost all details. Advice has been received from Spokane that the show committees of that city will have delegates present at the exhibit during the entire week.

Centralia Business Houses Are Burned

Centralia, Wash., June 7.—Three wooden buildings were badly damaged by fire yesterday, which threatened destruction of an entire business block, and a fourth caught fire in several places on the roof. The American Sheet Metal works and a small office building, used until a few days ago by Elmer Smith, acquitted in the Armistice day massacre case, were most seriously damaged, loss in the former instance being estimated at \$5000. The Eubanks Automobile & Upholstering company suffered loss from fire and water. The Hawley rooming house roof was damaged. Grover Troth owned two of the structures.

Dangerous Blaze in Cowlitz Reported

Chehalis, Wash., June 7.—District Deputy Fire Warden V. O. Wallace left this morning with a force of fire fighters to take charge of a dangerous fire burning in green timber in Cowlitz county near the Coweeman river, east of Kelso. The fire is said to be spreading over several sections and to show indications of having been set.

Salesman in Poor Health Kills Self

Edward Sams, 35-year-old salesman, No. 388 Glen avenue, died at midnight from poison which he took about 6 o'clock Tuesday night. Poor health, which had handicapped him since an automobile accident a year ago, is believed to have been the cause of his action. Sams was single, and lived with an uncle. He was employed by the Glidden company, paint dealers.

War on Bootleggers Is Planned at Scio

Scio, June 7.—Following a closed session of the city council, it is understood that a prohibition officer is to be employed to end bootlegging, which, according to complaints, has been carried on outside of dance halls at public dances here. Control of public dances is also proposed.

PICKERS' BUREAU OPENS
Centralia, Wash., June 7.—The Centralia Chamber of Commerce has established a registration bureau at the Community house for berry pickers, co-operating with the growers. Fifty persons registered yesterday within two hours after the bureau opened.

Fruit Buyers From East to Be Guests At Hood River Fete

Hood River, June 7.—At a meeting of fruit growers and shippers of the mid-Columbia district, held here Tuesday afternoon, it was decided to hold a two-day celebration at Hood River July 31 and August 1 when several hundred Eastern fruit buyers and their families will be entertained, following the convention at Seattle.

Extensive plans are being formulated and local organizations will co-operate with growers and shippers of Underwood, White Salmon, Rasmus, Mosier, The Dalles and Hood River in making the event memorable. Trips through the valley to Mount Hood and visits to refrigerating plants will be features. The committee in charge is P. F. Clark, chairman, Hood River; Ira E. Hyde, White Salmon; C. W. Gibbs, Underwood; F. S. Gunning, The Dalles, and R. D. Chatfield, Mosier.

HUNT FOR BODY OF DRIVER FAILS

Bend, June 7.—The body of Henry May of Portland, who was drowned in the Deschutes Sunday afternoon, has not yet been found. Mays was a chauffeur employed by the Warren construction company, working for that concern for the last 10 years, according to A. J. Hill, former Northwest manager for the Warren company, a member of the party. Hill, with the other members of the party, R. M. Gillis, C. A. Labarre, and A. T. Keller has returned to Portland. May is survived by his wife and mother, living in Portland. It was stated.

The accident occurred two miles below Mecca, where the river is deep and narrow and the current swift. The boat dashed through a stretch of swift water, then checked suddenly, and May, sitting in the stern, lost his balance and fell out. He was never seen again. A. J. Hill dived in an attempt to rescue May, but recovered only his hat. Blasting in the river Monday and yesterday failed to bring the body to the surface.

Henry May was 36 years old. His wife, Mrs. Alice May, is at the home of her parents at No. 108 16th street north, waiting word from Bend, where her husband's body is being sought in the swift waters of the Deschutes. They have no children. Mr. May was with the Twin Falls, Idaho, branch of the Warren Construction company as driver for A. J. Hill, until Hill recently left the company, when Mr. May went with him.

Portland Dentist Going to Europe

Dr. N. Stuart Reingold, Portland dentist, will leave the city Friday for Europe to spend three or four months traveling through France, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Belgium, Holland and England. In England and Germany, Dr. Reingold will conduct post graduate courses in dentistry. He has been invited to attend. His subject will be the latest American methods of dentistry. He will conduct research work in oral surgery at the University of Berlin. Nat Keller of Chicago will be his companion on the trip.

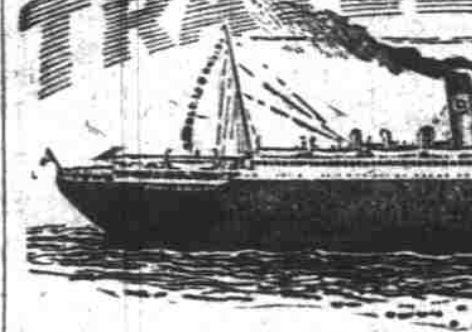
SEEKS COUNTY POST
