Fined for Killing Pheasant—Eight months after Frank Hickman of Pendleton killed a Chinese pheasant out of season he thought the dim and distant past had covered his misdeed, so he told a friend. The friend thought it a good story and told another friend. On May 25 W. H. Albee, district deputy game warden, heard the story, filed a warrant and June 2 Hickman paid a fine of \$25 after admitting his guilt. The pheasant was killed September 20, 1921.

Stay Granted—At the request of Assistant United States Attorney Veatch an additional 30 day stay of execution was granted Angelo H. Rossi Tuesday by Federal Judge Wolverton. Rossi is endeavoring to secure a presidential pardon. He was convicted on an indictment charging a conspiracy to defraud the government by having altered and stolen war savings stamps in his possession and sentenced to 18 months at McNeil island.

Ceremony for Cornerstone Laying—The cornerstone of the new Roosevelt high school will be laid with appropriate ceremonies on July 4, as a result of action taken by the school board Wednesday night. The properties committee, composed of Directors George B. Thomas and J. E. Martin, was delegated to arrange details of the event.

Headed Surveys Made—George Root of the office of engineering of the forest service has returned from Baker and Walla Walla counties where he has been making final surveys on homesteads on the Whitman and Walla Walla national forests. This survey is made just before the homesteader is ready to file patent upon his claim.

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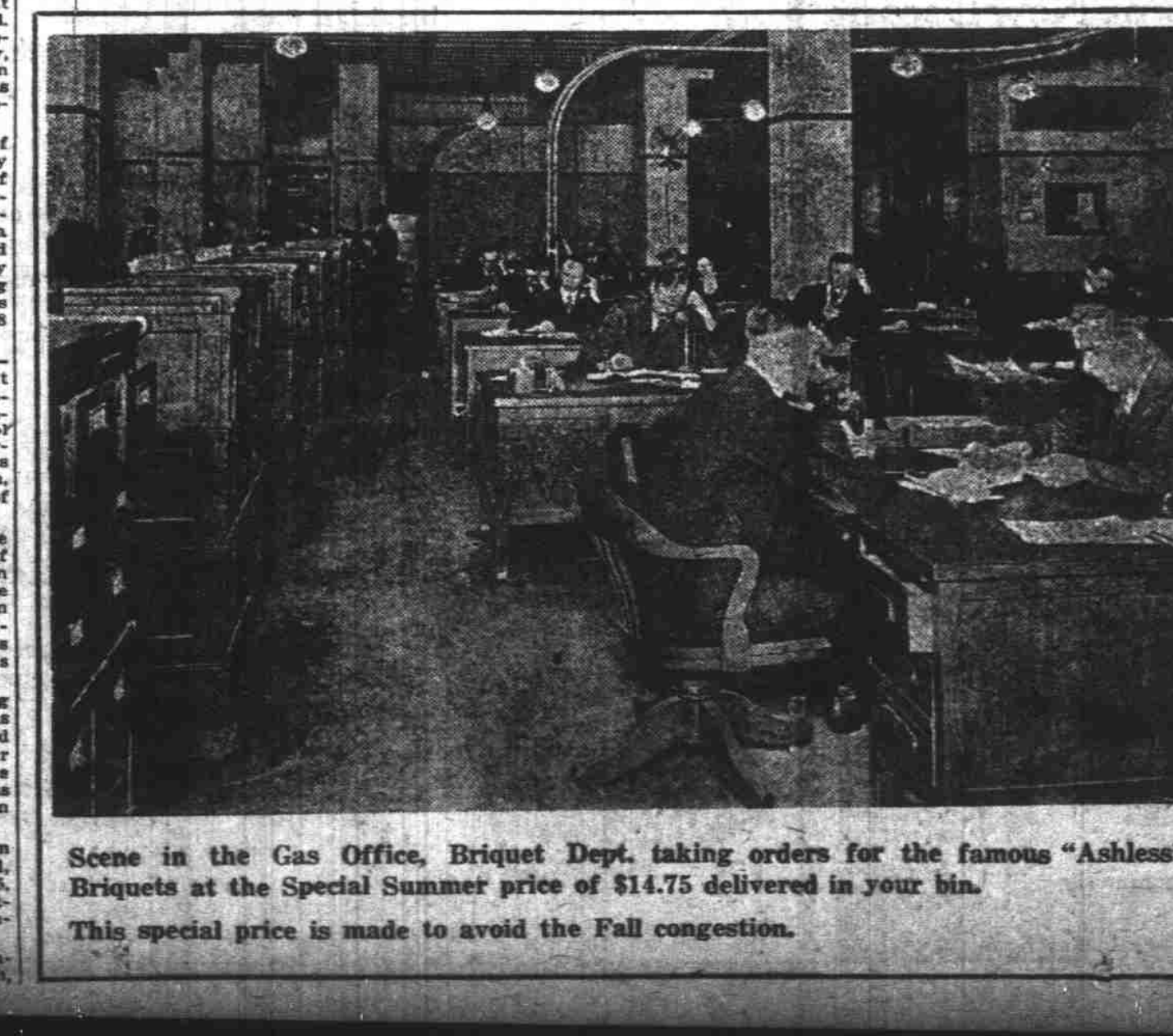
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
