

**THIRD SMUGGLED
CHINAMAN TAKEN
BY U. S. OFFICIALS**

**Bonham's Wit Saves Day When
He Finds He Has Wrong Pic-
ture; Gang Is Uncovered.**

Salem, June 10.—Louis Hauk, Chi-
nese, was taken into custody on the
Hop Lee ranch, northwest of here,
Thursday, by R. P. Bonham, federal
immigration inspector. Hauk, it is
charged, was smuggled into the United
States, and his deportation will be at-
tempted.

Bonham returned to Portland with
his prisoner Saturday night. This com-
pletes the capture of the trio of Chi-
nese smuggled into this country by an
organized ring, which extracted large
sums for services. Bonham, a few
weeks ago, captured the other two,
who told willingly of the money they
had paid to be smuggled into the
United States.

Louis Hauk's case was unusually
difficult, Bonham said Saturday night.
The captain of the vessel, whether pur-
posely or by accident, gave Bonham
the wrong photograph. Bonham went
to the hop ranch, remotely located at
the end of a long lane, where nobody
would have occasion to pass unless he
had definite business with the ranch.
When he arrived, he discovered the
photograph would fit none of the Chi-
namen, so he picked out Hauk, the
greenest of the men, and in his room
found letters to New York smugglers
arranging for Hauk's care there. All
three Chinamen were headed for New
York. Hauk could speak but two words
of English.

**Homes and Store
Destroyed by Fire
In Eugene Section**

Eugene, June 10.—Fire of undeter-
mined origin destroyed S. W. Chap-
pel's house and contents a half hour
after he and his family left by auto-
mobile for Klamath Falls at two o'clock
this morning.

The Stevens-Farris Lumber company's
store and stock of merchandise and
a dwelling house were destroyed by
fire of undetermined origin this morn-
ing at one o'clock. The post office
was located in the store, but it is
not believed that any valuable mail
was lost.

James Wilson's dwelling house and
contents at Elmira were destroyed by
fire, caused by a defective flue Thurs-
day evening.

leging that facilities for furnishing
water are inadequate and insufficient.
An investigation and hearing are
asked.

25 cents per day for all men employed
in the sawmill industry in Bend was
announced today by managers of the
Brooks-Scanlon and Shovel-Hill
mills, making the minimum wage \$2.25.

ness warrant an increase, they said.
