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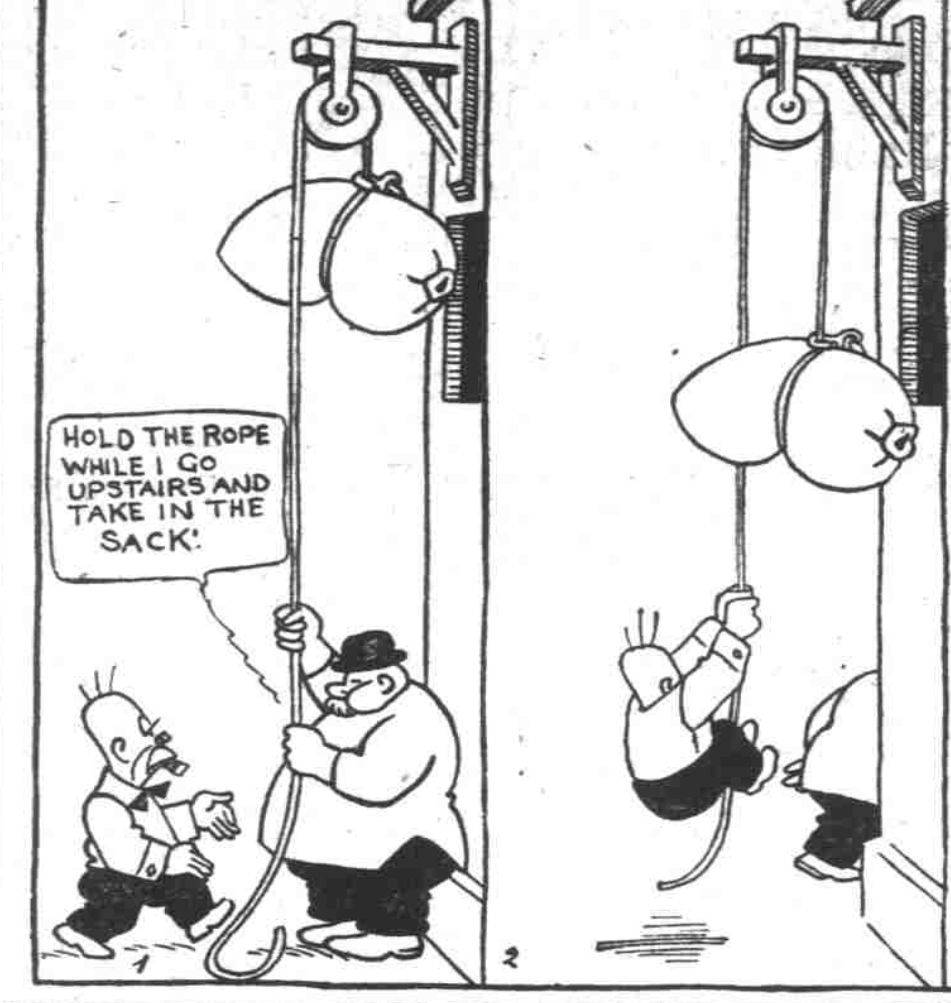

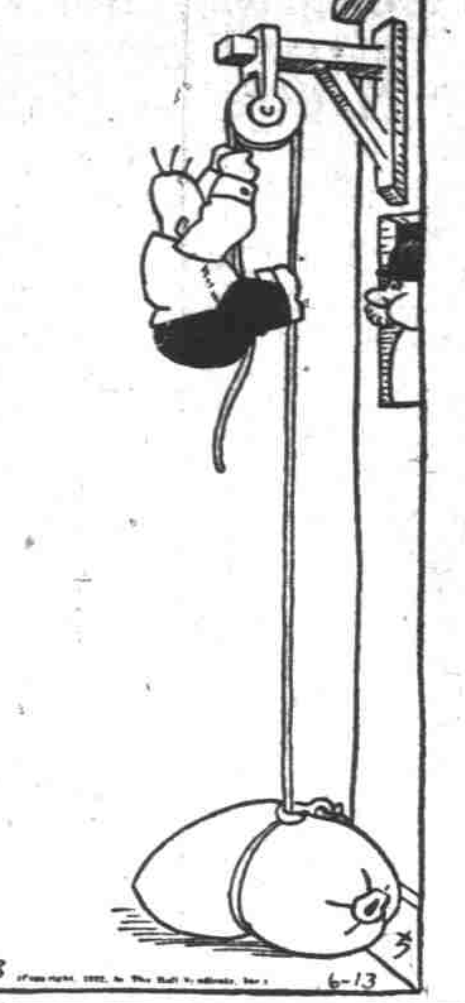
Every dark cloud has a silver lining. This was the case for a boy who has watched one-legged Stanley Kutumba play baseball declares Stanley Kutumba is right.

FOLLOWER FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS

For months this little lad labored—paching behind a pair of balky mules of his father's mine. When cars rolled down the branch, Stanley heard the rumble but couldn't side-step. He was caught like a rat against the wall of the main tunnel. Fire and workers rushed to his side: they picked him up unconscious and hurried the little form to the hospital. Amputation of his limb was the only means of saving his life. The member was severed. For days he hovered between life and death, but that spark of life soon kindled the sunshiny hope. He improved and after many weeks of confinement behind hospital walls was sent to his little home.

"I am big, I am strong," he cried to his mother. For he wanted to play with the other kids in the patch. So he took on an artificial limb. No more mines for him—he was a cripple, and a cripple was a little weak about the mine diggings. "Stan" was ambli-

TWO letters came to hand today which may prove of general interest. One reads:

"I was an athlete in college a score of years ago, and now, although exercising, am fit, except there is a tendency to gain what is called a nice little corporation. It is unbecoming. What shall I do to get rid of it?"

"Occasionally, in order to make my train, I have to run 100 yards or so. I am a commuter, 42 years old, I take no other exercise. Isn't what I'm called upon to do in the line of catching my train enough in the way of keeping fit?"
