

RAIL WORKERS AND MINERS MAY JOIN FOR PEACE

Conference Will Be Held in Hope of Reaching Agreement That Will Settle Labor Difficulties.

Cincinnati, June 17.—An agreement for joint action by the coal miners and the railroad workers would force a speedy showdown in the controversy over wages and working conditions, in the opinion of labor leaders here. They frankly acknowledged tonight that the chief value they see in the forthcoming conference on joint action is the likelihood that it will cause public opinion, the employers and perhaps government agencies to bestir themselves to bring about industrial peace.

There is not now any concrete program of joint action in the minds of those responsible for the conference. They may work out some such program, they said, but the psychological effect of united action by two such powerful groups of labor organizations is what they are really counting on.

LEWIS ACCEPTS
The first formal conference will be held here next Tuesday evening. The invitation made by E. M. Jewell to the United Mine Workers to confer was formally accepted today by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

Lewis announced from the floor of the American Federation of Labor convention that he was glad to accept on behalf of the miners the offer of the only authority prescribed for the conference was that it should discuss ways and means of "getting for the workers the essential justice that is necessary."

Lewis referred to the wage reductions ordered by the railroad labor board and affecting 1,200,000 rail workers as "unwarranted and unjustifiable."

BALLOTS SENT OUT
Strike ballots were sent out tonight to the stationary firemen, oilers and water tenders affected by the labor board's latest wage cut.

Officials of the clerks and signalmen's unions notified the organizations formally of the order and instructed them to forward the decision of the men on each separate railroad as to striking.

P. H. McCarty of San Francisco told the convention today that in his opinion the members of the chamber of commerce have no right on unionism, but that all "the trouble is stirred up by managers and secretaries of those bodies who must do something to hold their jobs."

The main development in the convention today was the decision of several nationally prominent labor leaders to give their views on what steps can be taken to annul the supreme court decision in the Coronado case. These attorneys will give their opinions to a special committee appointed to frame a program for dealing with supreme court decisions.

**Young Radio Fan
Breaks Arm in Long
Fall From Aerial**

Gerald Shimmel, 17-year-old radio fan, fell from the roof of his home Saturday afternoon while he was tinkering with his aerial outfit, and suffered a compound fracture of the left arm. At St. Vincent's hospital it was reported that he might also have internal injuries.

Shimmel's bicycle was recently stolen and, when he reported the theft to the police, he was provided with one of the bicycles that sometimes find their way there—lost or stolen machines recovered by the police, but whose owners have not been found. Patrolmen Smith and Hirsch had gone to Shimmel's home to notify him that the owner of the bicycle had been found and to ask him to return the wheel.

Values Fixed by Service Body as Tax Basis Urged

Salem, June 17.—Assessment of public utility corporations in Oregon upon the valuation fixed by the public service commission for rate making purposes is provided for in a proposed amendment to the state tax laws, being initiated by the Law Enforcement club, with headquarters in Portland. The letter of transmittal, accompanying a copy of the proposed amendment, filed with Secretary of State Koser today, is signed by Charles P. Church, president, and J. E. Simmons, secretary.

The amendment proposes that money deposited in banks and banking institutions shall be considered the personal property of the depositors or owners thereof and as debts of the banks, and as such are not to be deducted from the assessed value of banks.

The measure also provides for a more efficient enforcement of the laws on assessment and taxation already on the statute books.

**Deputy Goes to
Mail Libel Notice
On Wrecked Ship**

Although a worthless hulk at the bottom of the Columbia river, federal laws demand that service of the libel action filed against the wrecked steamer Welsh Prince must be made "on the vessel."

To comply with the red tape, which so entwines government business affairs, Everett T. Stretcher, chief deputy United States marshal, left Portland Saturday afternoon for Astoria to nail a libel notice to the mast of the vessel. So long as a piece of the craft appears above water even at low tide, service is required by law. It Stretcher finds the hulk has slipped into deeper waters and is out of sight, he is contemplating trying the process to a rock and dropping it on the deck.

In order to libel the vessel Stretcher must go to Astoria by train and then hire a launch at government expense to take him up the river to Altona, where the ship was sunk May 28, following a collision with the S. S. Iowa.

The libel was filed by Konrad Kolm, injured sailor on the Welsh Prince, who has asked \$10,000 general damages and \$250 for medical expenses. Both vessels were attached in the suit.

**Bridge Toll Suit
In Vancouver Set
For Trial July 17**

Vancouver, Wash., June 17.—The date of hearing on the appeal to the supreme court of the suit of George W. Hopp against the county commissioners has been set for July 17, according to County Attorney Joseph Hall. This suit is to determine the authority of the county commissioners in the matter of disposing of surplus income from the bridge tolls.

The original bridge act provided that the surplus tolls above interest charges and operating expenses should be placed in a sinking fund for the retirement of the bonds issued to build Clarke county's share of the bridge. Later an amendment was passed allowing the surplus tolls to be used, up to June 1, 1921, in paving county roads. The McCoy bill, passed by the legislature in 1921, continuing the amendment, was vetoed by Governor Hart and the suit brought by Hopp was a friendly effort to determine the use of the fund, which has been accumulating since.

Judge Simpson ruled that when the time provided for in the amendment lapsed, the original bill again became effective and the commissioners could only use the fund for the purpose of retiring the bonds. Delay in setting the date of hearing was due to an error by the clerk of the supreme court, according to County Attorney Hall, who is counsel for the county commissioners.

H. F. McCormick RECOVERING FROM GLAND OPERATION

Chicago Millionaire Cables Message to Ganna Walsky Cochran, Reported to Be His Fiance

Chicago, June 17.—(U. P.)—Harold F. McCormick, multimillionaire, was recovering today from an operation performed last week.

The operation was performed by Dr. Victor D. Lespinasse, specialist, who has become famous by transplanting glands to restore youth and vitality. McCormick was operated upon amid the greatest secrecy last Monday shortly before midnight.

Word of the operation leaked out today and was verified by Dr. Lespinasse. Immediately after the operation, performed in a secluded and walled-off wing in the hospital, from which all persons were barred except nurses and physicians sworn to secrecy, McCormick is reported to have sent the following cable to Ganna Walsky Cochran, opera singer, now in Paris.

DRIVEN BY DAUGHTER
"Operation successful. Recovering rapidly. Much love." The singer recently secured a divorce from her millionaire husband. Reports here today were that McCormick would sail to marry her as soon as he recovered.

Two weeks ago McCormick, after resigning as president of the International Harvester company, visited the hospital and picked out the isolated wing where he was to be confined. McCormick rolled up to the hospital Monday chauffeured by his daughter Muriel in her Royal Blue automobile. Howard Colby, family friend, accompanied the party. Colby went to the operating room with McCormick and was constantly in his company for three days.

DENIES IDENTITY
No relatives were allowed to visit the patient until today when the news of the operation leaked out.

Dr. Lespinasse at first denied he had a patient by the name of McCormick. Later he admitted having performed an operation, but said "it was a matter in which the public had no interest." The attention of the whole medical world was attracted recently to a dispute between Dr. Lespinasse and Dr. Veronoff, famous surgeon, as to who really discovered gland transplanting surgery. Physicians in this country generally believe the Chicago surgeon should have the honors.

The surgeon has performed in recent years over 500 gland operations on animals and humans.

DAUGHTERS CALL
Muriel, the eldest daughter of the harvester king, was his first visitor today. She stayed for an hour, but refused to discuss the case when she left.

Later Mathilde, 17-year-old daughter who is engaged to Max Oser, Swiss livery stable proprietor, three times her age, came to the hospital with Colby. Colby has been the family friend in taking care of matters with the press whenever the McCormicks were in the spotlight—which has been frequently of late.

SMOKES CIGARETTE
Colby said he tried to get McCormick to make a statement while he was visiting him, but that the harvester king refused. As Colby left

he was asked about the condition of McCormick.
"He's feeling fine," said Colby. "The patient is sitting up in bed smoking a cigarette and dictating letters."

**Applications for
Bonus Loan Must
Be In by July 20**

Salem, June 17.—Initial applications for the state bonus loan must be filed by June 20. This warning to Oregon ex-service men was issued from the headquarters of the state bonus commission here today by Captain Allen

Hopkins, deputy secretary, who is in charge of the department during the absence of Captain Harry Strumbaugh, who is attending encampment of the national guard at Camp Lewis. The time for filing the loan applications, originally set for May 20, was extended by the commission to give all ex-service men a chance at the state bonus. No further extension of time is expected.
