

HAYNES ORDERS BONDED LIQUORS CONCENTRATED

Washington, June 18.—(U. P.)—Orders for the concentration in a few warehouses of all liquors now held in 304 warehouses throughout the country were issued today by Prohibition Commissioner Haynes.

Haynes' order was the first move to carry out legislation recently passed by congress to make the nation really bone dry. Other drastic orders and regulations are to follow.

Haynes acted under authority recently granted by the treasury department appropriation bill.

TO BOTTLE LIQUORS
Regulations permitting the bottling in bond of liquors before their concentration in order to have more sales by cases instead of barrels, and thus making it more difficult to "tap" liquor shipments, were also issued.

Persons desiring to have their warehouses made a "concentration depot" were asked to file applications with the bureau and after a complete hearing the places where the huge liquor hoards would be stored will be selected. A bond of \$100,000 for the safety and protection of the liquors will be made and a bond of \$2,200 per gallon, the present tax rate, must be given before the transfer can be made.

A concentration order eventually is expected to result in a high saving to the government of \$40,000,000 GALLONS.
Out of the 304 warehouses in which liquor is now stored, 124 contain less than 2000 gallons each and "in many instances the government is paying \$300 a month to guard and guard the spirits in these small warehouses," said Haynes.

Approximately forty million gallons of liquor are affected by the order. "The concentration warehouses," said Haynes, "must be of large capacity, with good railroad facilities available and backed by men of unquestioned integrity so that the owners of the spirits will in every way be protected."

"Unusually strong guard forces, 'armed to the teeth,' will be placed around these warehouses."

Lord Northcliffe, Keeps Whereabouts Clothed in Mystery

London, June 19.—An element of mystery seems to be surrounding the recent movements of Lord Northcliffe, the British publisher, who is reported to be ill.

Dispatches from Paris said he passed through there Sunday on his way to London from Switzerland where he has been resting under his doctor's orders. But his business associates here deny any knowledge of their chief's movements since he left Switzerland. The report from Paris that Lord Northcliffe was being accompanied by H. Wickham Steed, editor of the London Times, and a close personal associate, were contradicted by members of the Northcliffe organization here, who said they had luncheon with Steed in London Sunday.

So far no trace of Lord Northcliffe has been found here, although it was reported from Paris he was due here Sunday.

John Walter, whose family has long held an interest in the London Times, declined to comment on the report published here that Lord Northcliffe had bought out his holdings in the Times for 200,000 pounds.

"I have told all questioners that I am unable to comment on the subject, no matter what any one says," Walter told the United News.

ABRAHAM T. HESFORD
Centralia, Wash., June 19.—Abraham T. Hesford, 73, died Saturday, following an extended illness. He was a member of the G. A. R. His wife and three children survive.

HERO'S FUNERAL HELD

The Rev. Daniel Staver preached the sermon and Mrs. Hazel Carmack sang. Dixon is survived by his mother, Mrs. A. L. Cannon of this city, five brothers, including Lawrence S. Dixon, U. S. naval hospital, Great Lakes, Ill., and Frank E. Dixon, in the army in the Philippines; and five sisters.

Premiers Playing Careful Game in Political Situation

London, June 19.—The Lloyd-George-Poincare political situation today is a battle of etiquette. Although important issues will be discussed the French insist that the visit to London is purely social and the British that the French invitation is purely ceremonial. Both are seeking to avoid the appearance of asking favors.

Premier Lloyd-George invites the whole British government to lunch, leaving a short time for settling the world's affairs in a private conversation before Premier Poincare's departure for Paris tonight. However, the British government has tried to create an atmosphere of good will toward France, while suggesting that any political decision discussions will be entirely on M. Poincare's initiative.

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MAINE, MINNESOTA ARE VOTING TODAY

Washington, June 19.—A strong personal equation enters into the Maine and Minnesota primaries today. Senators Kellogg, Minnesota, and Hale, Maine, running for renomination, are intimate associates of President Harding.

And in the third of the primaries this month—that in North Dakota, June 28—there is a legislative equation of almost equal interest, in the bitter fight of Senator McCumber, chairman of the powerful finance committee, for renomination.

Thus during the next 10 days results in these three primaries will be looked upon as politically significant, and in McCumber's case, at least, may prove an important bearing on the administration legislative program.

NEWBERRY ONLY ISSUE
It so happens that Kellogg and Hale, next to Senator Frelinghuysen and Speaker Gillett, have been the most intimately associated with the president on a personal basis of any members of congress. Both are frequently called upon to be in Harding's golf foursome, and at special limited social events at the White House. The defeat of either would be received by Democrats as a pointed rebuff to the president.

In none of the three primaries are there any outstanding issues of particular note, unless it be the fact that all three voters for the seat of Senator Newberry and this issue has played its part in the three primary campaigns.

HALE MAY LOSE
In Maine, Senator Hale is opposed by Howard Davies, state senator, and former Representative Frank E. Guernsey. Davies and his wife have used the issue of Hale's bachelor status as a foreigner, while also playing the more radical vote. Guernsey has based his campaign mainly on geographical lines. Because of the unsettled political situation in 1917, when the Indiana, Iowa and Pennsylvania primaries it may be stated that intimates of the president would not be surprised to see Hale defeated.

Of course the Republican nomination in Maine is equivalent to election. Kellogg is confident of winning the nomination in Minnesota against his two opponents, former Congressman Ernest Lundeen and Richard E. Titus, so confident, in fact, that the eve of the primary found Kellogg aboard the president's yacht, with a limited party, down Chesapeake bay.

LIKE IOWA FIGHT
Nevertheless, the Minnesota fight is somewhat similar to the Iowa and Pennsylvania primary contests in that both Lundeen and Titus are Progressives. Lundeen has made his campaign case on alleged dissatisfaction with the administration. As the leading opponent of Kellogg, the vote of Lundeen will be of particular interest. While in 1917 he was against the declaration of war, opposed the draft and the espionage acts. His support, it is said, rests largely among the Germans and Swedes of Minnesota.

The first woman senatorial nominee will probably come out of the Democratic primary of Minnesota in the person of Mrs. Peter B. Olsen, who is running against Thomas J. McElghen, former Populist, farmer and banker, and Home Morris, of Minneapolis. Mrs. Olsen, endorsed by the Democratic state committee, is a member of the Democratic national committee, and regarded as the foremost woman orator in the West.

McCUMBER FACES FIGHT
In North Dakota, Senator McCumber faces the stiffest fight of his career. Held by the tariff and bonus legislation, he has been unable to make a personal campaign while Governor Lynn Frazier, endorsed by the Non-Partisan league, has made a sweeping canvass of the state, aided by Senator Ladd and other elements friendly to McCumber. A third candidate is Ormsby McHugh, former Bull Moose leader in New York, who moved to North Dakota a year or so ago.

McCumber's fight is interesting primarily because of the effect of his possible defeat on senate organization. As chairman of the senate finance committee, his defeat would leave Senator La Follette second in line for the chairmanship, too close to please administration leaders. McCumber has double barreled worry in that, even if he wins the primary, Frazier may run as an independent, thus materially increasing the already strong possibility of a Democratic senatorial victory in the fall. One Democratic senatorial nominee will be J. E. T. O'Connor, very popular throughout the state, who lost the gubernatorial election in 1920 by only 4000 votes, whereas Harding carried the state by 125,000.

G. A. R. Men to Meet At Aberdeen; 1000 Delegates Expected
Aberdeen, Wash., June 19.—More than 1000 delegates will be here the coming week to attend the annual encampment of the department of Washington, Oregon and Alaska, G. A. R. The official train bringing the delegates will reach here this afternoon. In the evening the council of administration will meet for explication work and ritual.

Tuesday will be for business meetings with a camp fire in the evening. Wednesday will be for session sessions, with a reception in Hoquiam in the evening. Business sessions will continue through Thursday and Friday with election and installation of officers Friday.

A program of entertainment has been prepared during hours when the delegates will not be in session. The members of the Women's Relief Corps also will hold sessions daily.

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Coil Turns Out to Be Congo Snake; Police Get Shocked

Chicago, June 19.—Natural history and chemistry got tangled up in the Chicago police department today. A coiled object, resembling a vital part of a home-made still, was discovered by Patrolman Edward Gleason, while walking his beat.

Instead of being a chemical apparatus, the object turned out to be a six-foot Congo snake. The officer brought it to police headquarters coiled on the end of a long pole.

"It's a rare variety of Congo snake," it was said at the Lincoln Park Zoo, where the reptile round a home. "It must have escaped from a circus while a baby, as Congos usually get about 12 feet long when full grown."

SIDETRACK BONUS FOR TARIFF BILL

Washington, June 19.—(U. P.)—Soldier bonus legislation will not be considered until the tariff measure is disposed of, it was decided at a conference of Republican senators today. By a vote of 30 to 9 the conference defeated a motion by Senator McCumber, North Dakota, chairman of the finance committee, to lay aside the tariff and take up the bonus for immediate consideration.

After defeating McCumber's motion, however, the conference passed a resolution, 27 to 11, pledging to consider the bonus as soon as the tariff was completed.
