

BIRTH CONTROL IDEA IS SCORED BY CONGRESSWOMAN

The Auditorium was packed with eager women and not a few men to hear the Honorable Alice Robertson address a mass meeting Wednesday afternoon. Complimenting with her request, when invited to be the honor guest at the Rose Festival, that she meet and talk with a large number of Oregon women, the women's committee appointed by the Rose Festival board arranged for this mass meeting and heartily did the women of the city respond.

Mrs. O. W. Mielke, chairman of the special committee on arrangements, introduced Mayor Baker, who made a short address, outlining Miss Robertson's position in the house and what she stood for. He in turn introduced Mrs. Frank McCrillis, second vice president of the Rose Festival board, who with a few brief remarks introduced the speaker of the day, Miss Alice Robertson, who was greeted by prolonged applause on the part of the audience.

WORDS NOT MINCED

The characteristic thing about Miss Robertson is her straight-from-the-shoulder manner and her utter simplicity. She did not leave the audience long in doubt as to the fact that she was a Republican and a former anti-suffragist. She spoke of her early childhood in Oklahoma, her work among the Indians and finally her political campaign. In her own words she sailed into congress on a sea of soup, alluding to the fact that prior to her position in congress she had managed a cafeteria in her home city. She forcibly told the women that they must use their franchise and called all those who don't vote yellow slackers. "They have no right," she said, "to criticize the local, state or national

government." She said it was the tendency of women to take as actual facts insidious propaganda and warned them that they must get to the root of things and learn the truth. "I am glad," she said, "I am not a member of the General Federation of Women's clubs, as I consider their action in advocating birth control an unspeakable horror." They are bartering the noble heritage of motherhood, she continued, for ease and more clothes.

FOREIGN IMMIGRATION

She declared herself as being opposed to foreign immigration, and suggested that we give our present foreign population a good scrubbing before allowing any more to enter. She is also opposed to the Shepherd-Towner bill and the cutting down of the army and navy.

During the singing of "Beautiful Oregon Rose" a large American flag was released at the top of the proscenium arch and a shower of rose petals fell on the honored guest. At the reception which was held later on the stairs in front of the Auditorium, the members of the audience tossed roses at her feet as a tribute. Mrs. Rose Courten-Red led the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the audience.

Lenin Gets Leave of Absence From Duty

Copenhagen, June 22.—(U. N. S.)—Nicolai Lenin has been granted an indefinite leave of absence from his position as president of the council of people's commissars, according to word received here today from Moscow. It is expected that his successor will be Commissar Tsytryupa, a Bolshevik official of whom little is known in the outside world.

SHULL CHAIRMAN OF SCHOOL BOARD, LINEUPS SHIFTED

Realignment of the dominant forces of the school board and preparation for a strenuous campaign of constructive work were the principal features of a meeting of the board at the courthouse Wednesday night. The meeting was the first since the election of last week, in which A. C. Ney-III, former chairman of the board, was defeated for reelection by F. S. Pickering. Frank L. Shull, as senior member of the board in term of service, was chosen to succeed Ney-III as chairman.

Announcement of new committees to guide the destinies of the schools through the period of Shull's chairmanship was greeted with a laconic, "Here comes the axe," by George B. Thomas, who has headed the properties committee for a long time.

LINEUP IS SHIFTED

The new lineup placed George P. Eisman and W. F. Woodward on the properties committee; W. J. H. Clark and George B. Thomas on the education committee, and J. E. Martin and F. S. Pickering on the business committee. The matter of employing an architect to prepare plans for proposed new school buildings, made possible by the passage of the \$3,000,000 bond issue and the \$1,000,000 tax levy at the recent school election, was brought up by George B. Thomas and action postponed to next week's meeting of the board. Thomas had previously stated that he favored the employment of an eastern architect to handle all school construction work in district No. 1, while other members of the board favor the employment of Portland firms for the work.

The amount of bonds to be issued to meet immediate needs, together with their denomination and interest rate, will be suggested by the finance committee at the next board meeting.

BOND ISSUE NEXT

It is probable that the initial issue of bonds will aggregate about \$1,000,000 and W. F. Woodward suggested that they be issued in denominations as low as \$500.

Director Martin proposed that George B. Thomas be sent as a delegate to the annual meeting of the National Education association to be held at Boston, July 1 to 8. Thomas had submitted a letter from the secretary of the association asking that he prepare a paper on Benson polytechnic school to be read at the Boston convention. W. F. Woodward suggested that it would be better to advertise the advantages of Benson polytechnic in Multnomah county than in Boston. E. H. Whitney, assistant superintendent of schools, was finally named as delegate to the convention.

The board adopted a recommendation of the committee on education that the departments of manual training, domestic science, music, physical education, gardens and club work, domestic art and other special branches ordered discontinued on March 29, be restored and the teachers reinstated.

Continuance of the special departments was made possible by passage of the bond and tax measures. It was announced that Captain George S. Edmondstone, superintendent of properties of the board, would represent the grand master of Oregon grand lodge, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons at the laying of the cornerstone of the Roosevelt high school, at 2:30 p. m., Saturday. The ceremonies would be in charge of various Masonic orders of the city it was stated.

Meetings of the school board will be held Wednesday of each week, until further notice, in order to handle the extra work involved in the new building construction program. Meetings are held at the courthouse and are scheduled for 7:30 p. m.

LA FOLLETTE PUTS ATTACK ON HIGH COURT IN RECORD

Washington, June 22.—The senate listened Wednesday to a repetition of the speech delivered before the American Federation of Labor in Cincinnati by Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin, in which he severely criticized the supreme court for its decision against the child labor law and declared his intention of fathering a constitutional amendment to give congress veto powers over supreme court decisions.

Goaded by criticisms of the speech by Nicholas Murray Butler, president of the Columbia university, and by Senators Edge of New Jersey and Kellogg of Minnesota, La Follette read the entire speech into the record. He explained that he did this because the text had never been published and that Butler's remarks were based on an incorrect version.

La Follette was bitter in references

to Senators Kellogg and Edge, the latter of whom he charged with bad faith and unethical conduct in having had Butler's speech inserted in the record without having first notified La Follette of his intention to do so. He scathingly referred to Kellogg as "the famous 'trust buster' because of a speech made earlier in the day by Kellogg in defense of the supreme court.

La Follette charged the supreme court with having departed from its constitutional functions and having assumed "legislative" duties instead of confining itself to the mere interpretation of law. He announced that he would offer the proposed constitutional amendment in the senate and would accompany it with a review of supreme court decisions to show how far that body had ceased to perform its proper judicial functions.

Paying his respects to Dr. Butler, La Follette had this to say:

"He is the handy man of privilege, who happens to be at the head of Columbia university, sustained by private contributions, a bootlicker, as his whole career shows him to be, of men of fortune in order that he can continue endowments to that institution to serve privilege."

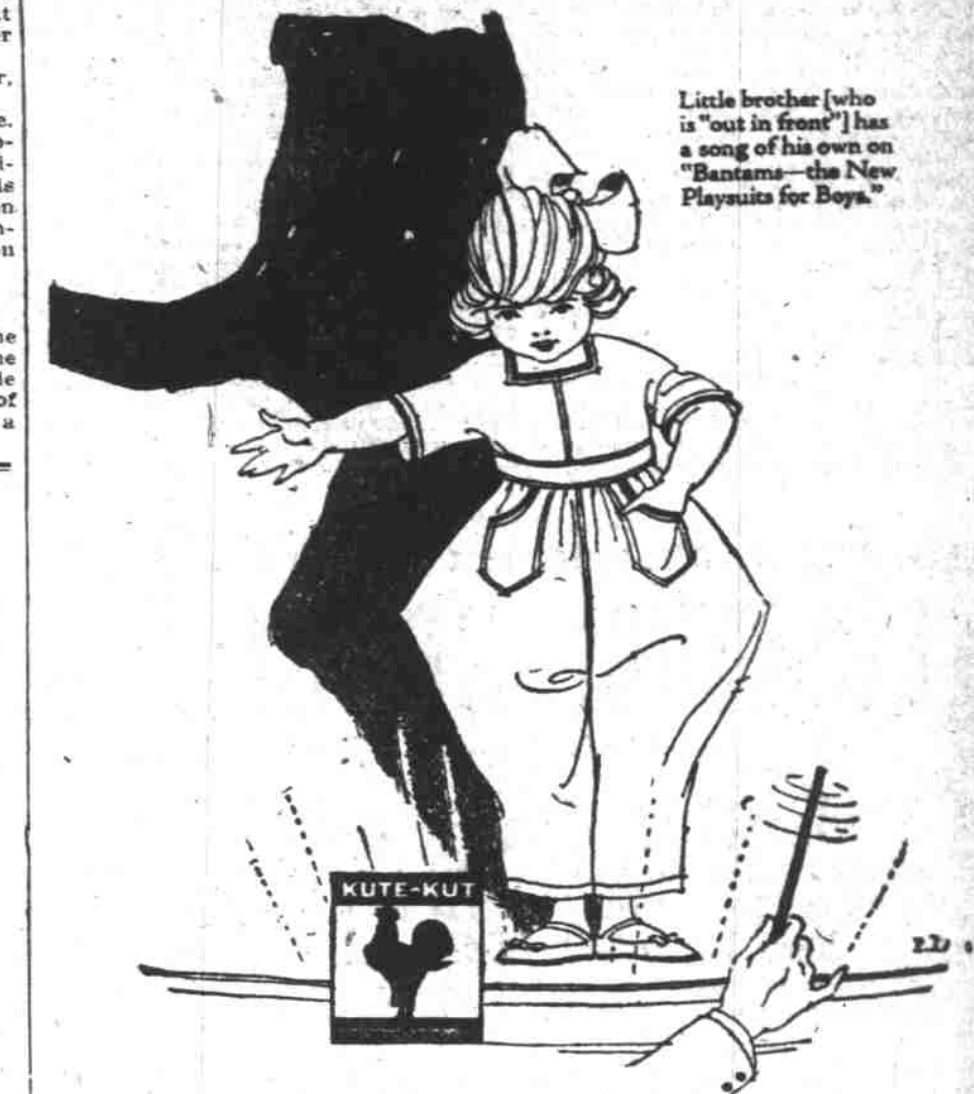
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Gallantry Will Not Lull Senator's Gun
