

GUARD CAPTURES MANY PRISONERS IN ENGAGEMENTS

Camp Lewis, Wash., June 28.—"Tenting Tonight on the Old Camp Ground" was the slogan for all units of the Oregon National Guard at Camp Lewis last night.

Shortly at 1:30 yesterday afternoon the entire regiment, under command of Colonel Creed C. Hammond, moved out from Camp Lewis, with full field paraphernalia, which included machine guns, combat wagons, hospital equipment, rolling kitchens and other military wares, to a point six miles from camp and went into position on the shores of American lake. The first battalion, under command of Major William White, formed the advance guard, and Major West, commanding the Third battalion, acted as the rear-guard of the movement.

LINES ESTABLISHED
The second battalion, under command of Major Drake, established a pup tent camp between the First and Third battalions, and acted as the reserve. Cossack posts and sentry squads were immediately established by Colonel Hammond. The intelligence section, under command of Captains Rilea and Alexander, made a record in establishing lines of communication between all field telephones in operation. All battalions headquarters within 30 minutes after camp was struck.

One hour after bivouacking for the night, Colonel Hammond announced that he was satisfied with the preparations for an attack on any flank. At 6:20 last evening the attacking force, which was comprised of the First battalion of the 186th Infantry under Major Eugene C. Libby, was sighted by the outpost of the 162nd Infantry. Shortly after that hour a simulated conflict was taking place.

For the purpose of instruction 15 or 20 men from both the defensive and offensive commands were ruled out as seriously wounded and carried back by stretcher bearers to the field hospital company, under command of Major Joel C. Booth, where diagnosis of wounds and care of the sick was engaged in.

Among the first casualties reported were those of Captain Tom Hille, intelligence officer, and acting adjutant of the 162nd Infantry, and Captain William Ellenburg, commanding the machine gun company, from Corvallis. It was stated that these officers had been wounded in the line of duty. The 162nd Infantry, which had been supposed to exist when the two humiliated companies were taken to the rear and brought before the imposing presence of Major Libby.

PRISONERS ARE TAKEN
True to the character of that officer, all prisoners captured were immediately disarmed of shoes and leggings to prevent their escape and confined to a bull pen under heavy guard. At a late hour last night both sides had taken many prisoners, and many simulated encounters were engaged in.

Competition and rivalry between the opposing forces is very keen, and more interest is being shown in the maneuvers than in any of the events pulled off in camp heretofore.

Colonel Creed C. Hammond at his regimental post, camped under a large fir tree on the shores of American lake, said last night that he was well pleased with the manner in which the movement had been executed. Colonel Hammond stated that the pup tent camp would be broken up at 6 a. m. today and all units would return to Camp Lewis in time for breakfast.

1500 GUARDSMEN TO BE IN HOME-COMING PARADE
More than 1500 members of the Oregon National Guard will be in line for the home-coming parade and review at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The men are to arrive from their two-weeks' training at Camp Lewis, Wash., at 2:30 o'clock, at the union station, and immediately thereafter the parade will be formed.

Mayor Baker has issued a request to business houses to suspend business while the parade is passing, and he urges citizens of Portland generally to turn out and give the guardsmen a cordial welcome home. In his statement the mayor says:

"In order that the people of Portland may demonstrate to the Oregon National Guard that the work and purpose of that organization are appreciated, the public is urged to co-operate in a celebration to be held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, at which time the guard companies will return to Portland for a review parade as the culmination of two weeks of intensive military training at Camp Lewis. These men have given their time and their energy to prepare themselves for the country's defense and the organization should have every encouragement.

Business houses and others throughout the city, and particularly along the line of march of the parade, are urged to display patriotic flags and to arrange so that employees may be let off work between 3 and 4 o'clock in order that they may view the parade and help make the home-coming a success.

The line of parade follows:
Form at Union station; south on Sixth street to Morrison street; east on Morrison to Fourth street; south on Fourth to Jefferson street; west on Jefferson to Fifth street; north on Fifth to Broadway; north on Broadway to Flanders street; west on Flanders to the Armory, where the parade will disband.

The reviewing stand will be at the Old Postoffice block. Among those who have been invited to occupy places in the stand are:

Taft Talks Before British Union of Self Government

London, June 28.—Chief Justice Taft, who yesterday listened to the Irish debate in the house of commons, today talked significantly of the responsibilities of self government. Although he carefully refrained from mentioning Ireland in his address to the English speaking union, he said: "There is a theory abroad among those charged with the responsibilities of government that if one can early get a constitution or a machine and fasten it on the government, one has the freedom of self government and everything will work well."

"There is nothing so far from the fact. It is a question of developing a people into a self governing state, of how you shall deal with them to enable them to practice self government and not have too much at once."

"If you give them too much without any restraint and without regard to the rights of the minority, it is likely to produce anarchy. The American flag, governmental and privately owned, for the first year would amount to about \$15,000,000."

Dock Strike Cost City of Portland More Than \$40,000

Expenditures for special police salaries and new equipment necessitated by the longshoremen's strike recently concluded, cost Portland's police department \$32,345.65, according to a compilation made Tuesday by H. T. Blakenlee, chief clerk.

This figure does not include special police salaries paid by the dock commission, which amounted to a trifle more than \$8000. A number of special police were working for the dock commission up to the end of the strike.

For special police stars alone the city paid \$175. Items in the cost to the department are as follows:
Salaries.....\$29,978.65
Special police stars.....175.00
High powered automobile.....2,000.00
Automobile rent.....30.00

These figures do not include additional overhead caused by the strike, or extra expenditures for gasoline, tires and repairs on police vehicles which were in constant operation on account of the strike.

A total of 162 names appear on the special police payroll. The dock commission, whose men were paid from the commission's funds, hired as many as 30 men at one time.

Flyer Runs Into Ditch; Many Hurt

Lincoln, Neb., June 28.—(U. N. S.)—The engineer and fireman were fatally injured and a score of passengers were hurt when the Rock Island flyer, west-bound, went into a ditch near Prairie Home today.

Spreading rails are believed to have been the cause of the accident. The passenger cars followed the locomotive in toppling down the embankment, all turning completely over. Physicians and nurses were rushed to the wreck from Lincoln and Chicago.

Several of the injured are said to be Chicago passengers.

FARMER TO HEAR ADVANTAGE FROM SHIP SUBSIDIES

Washington, June 28.—At the dinner to be given by President Harding on Thursday night to representatives of the farm bloc in congress, members of the United States shipping board will explain exactly what the proposed ship subsidy will cost in comparison with the \$50,000,000 deficit of the board this year.

Commissioner Meyer Lissner who is an expert on ship subsidy, today addressed these questions to those who are now opposed to the subsidy plan: "Would you spend \$6.50 to save \$50?"

"Do you believe that your government should spend \$3,500,000 to save more than \$50,000,000?"

QUESTIONS ARE ANSWERED
Proceeding to answer them, he said: "That is what the administration on the subsidy plan proposes to do."

"Today the shipping board is operating 437 ships and losing nearly \$50,000,000 a year in doing so. This does not take into account any reserve for depreciation, or interest on the Liberty bonds which paid for these ships, or full insurance. If the charges were considered, the loss would be much higher."

"Under the plan now before congress the annual subsidy payments to private operators for running those same 437 ships would amount to \$8,500,000. The total subsidy payments for the entire present fleet under the American flag, governmental and privately owned, for the first year would amount to about \$15,000,000."

OTHER NATIONS CITED

"Every maritime nation has used subsidy to build up its merchant marine. Before the war France spent over \$12,000,000 a year, Japan \$7,500,000, Great Britain over \$4,000,000 and altogether the shipping board estimates that in 1913 nearly \$42,000,000 was paid out in direct subsidies by the principal nations."

"These sums were spent to obtain shipping services. The administration's plan will not only give us a merchant marine, but it will save to the United States its present heavy loss."

Motorboat Taxes Reduced by Rules In Effect July 1

At least one class of taxpayers will have a concrete demonstration of the tax reduction promised by the administration, according to Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue.

"For several years," said Huntley, "there has been an annual special tax of \$10 upon all motor pleasure boats of

not over five net tons, and a heavier tax upon boats of greater tonnage, but commencing July 1, this tax will not apply to boats except those of more than five net tons and 32 feet in length."

Most of these taxes paid in this state have been on boats of less than five net tons, and their owners will now be relieved of the \$10 tax. There are only a few motor driven pleasure boats in Oregon that will now be subject to the tax, and their owners must, of course, make return and pay the tax.

Collector Huntley states that several hundred Oregon people will be relieved of the \$10 tax burden, and also that the owners of work and fishing boats of not more than five net tons, who have heretofore been required to make returns and secure exempt cards, will no longer be put to that trouble.

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NOTORIOUS DENS GO UP IN FLAMES IN MEXICALI, MEX.

Calexico, Cal., June 28.—(U. P.)—Incendiary fires swept Mexicali for a second time within the week last night and destroyed property valued at \$500,000, while snipers, believed to be Mexican rebels, raked the blazing area with rifle fire.

The famous Owl cafe, one of the best known resorts on the border, and the Stockade, a resort occupied by 32 women, were destroyed.

Gambling was in full swing when the Owl took fire about 9:30 and gamblers and patrons of the bar fled the building as it started to fill with smoke. Within a few moments the sun-parched boards were a crackling mass of flames.

Almost simultaneously fire broke out in the Stockade, on another block in the town.

The women occupants of the resort, some wearing nightgowns, other clad in kimono, ran into the streets.

Low pressure of the water system made futile the efforts of firemen to check the blaze, which was given even wider range when shooting began and the sing of bullets caused panic among the crowds.

The El Centro fire department was called upon to help fight the flames. An station and several other buildings were burned in addition, but the Mexicali hotel, which several times had been saved.

BODY FOUND
If there were casualties none had been reported early today, but it was

thought possible victims may have been dragged from the scene in the same manner as the eight murdered persons whose bodies were found yesterday.

Recurrent firing on the Mexicali side of the border during the past week has given rise to reports of serious revolutionary activities, which the discovery of the bodies yesterday is believed to confirm.

One body found on the Calexico side of the border in the canal east of town has been identified as that of an American citizen, Juan Calahan by name.

Unofficial report of casualties across the border sets the death list in the past two weeks at 21.

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
