

22 INDICTED FOR VIOLATING DRUG AND LIQUOR LAWS

Violation of the Harrison narcotic and the Volstead acts were charged against 22 persons in indictments returned to Judge R. S. Bean Tuesday afternoon by the federal grand jury. The report included 21 general, four secret and 10 not true indictments. Following the report the body retired for further deliberation.

T. Takamato, Japanese sailor on the steamer Meiwa Maru, was indicted for the alleged sale near Astoria of \$100,000 worth of narcotics. His partner, S. Hango, was not joined in the narcotic indictment, but was charged with the sale of a large quantity of liquor at the same time.

Lorenzo E. Dolis of Heceta, famed through his efforts several months ago to escape a jail sentence by hiding in the woods of Southern Oregon, is charged with fraud and impersonating a federal officer. He is alleged to have swindled Stinson D. Fomeroy out of \$25 by representing himself as a government land agent.

DRY VIOLATION ALLEGED

H. Hogall, until recently a deputy constable and before that a member of the police moral squad, and E. H. Carpenter are charged in two indictments with violating the prohibition law, with impersonating federal officials and with attempting to extort \$500 from an Italian wine maker.

The remaining Harrison act indictments are against Charlie Pitts, Gertrude Lyons, Lou Dock, Shelley Mitchell, Albert Corley, Homer Eise. The liquor indictments are against Manuel Rivers, Pete Roko, E. J. Van Horn, John Lusby, Gus Oslund and Martin Sanderson, all of Klamath Falls; K. Rinne, Astoria; Bill Burnett and Gus Johnson, Reedsport; C. A. Coffin, East Gardiner; Nick Zorich, Astoria, and Henry Miller, Portland.

CHARGE POSTAL ROBBERY

Wilson Carl and Lewis Alexander are charged with robbing the post-office at Garibaldi, and Harry Wilson, alias Harry Jackson, with stealing an automobile in Los Angeles and transporting in to Heppner, Or.

One of the longest indictments is against Frank Baker, Klamath reservation Indian, for alleged attempt to kill his wife and her sister.

Not true bills were found for Frank Terlan, John Boren, S. Sakai, S. Takamato, S. Miyano and George Loneyer on liquor charges; Theodore Larsen of Oneco, use of the mails to defraud; Thomas Murphy, violation of motor vehicle theft act; S. Miyano, Robert Ward and H. Q. Smith, violation of Harrison act.

Capturers of Baby Deer to Be Sought By Game Deputies

Complaints of the capture and mutilation of fawns are being received almost daily from scattered sections of Oregon, where farmers and sportsmen have picked up the young deer and are attempting to take care of the animals.

Three years ago the state game commission attempted to break up the practice of domesticating deer, and succeeded by arresting the people who took the wild animals into captivity. F. M. Brown, chief deputy game warden, said today that another drive would have to be made on the captors of the baby deer. He said only crippled or starving wild animals can be taken into captivity and that in such an instance the game commission should be informed immediately.

Woman Fined \$250 For Sale of Booze To Police Officer

Mrs. May Billings, No. 244 College street, was fined \$250 for maintaining a nuisance and selling intoxicating liquors. According to the testimony, she sold whiskey to Officer Chamberlain when the latter visited her place during the Rose Festival.

Senate Increases Grant Land Fund

Washington, June 28.—The senate appropriations committee has responded to a request by Senator McNary and adopted an amendment to the deficiency bill allowing \$17,500 cover outlay for protection of Oregon and California and Coos Bay wagon grant lands. This bill as it passed the house authorized only \$5000 and covered only part of the year's deficiency.

MOTHER-SLAYER FALTERS IN COURT

In a state of near collapse Tuesday Walter Weir, charged with hacking his aged mother, Susan Weir, to death a few weeks ago, stood before Presiding Circuit Judge Tucker and heard an inter-plea of not guilty uttered in his behalf by the jurist.

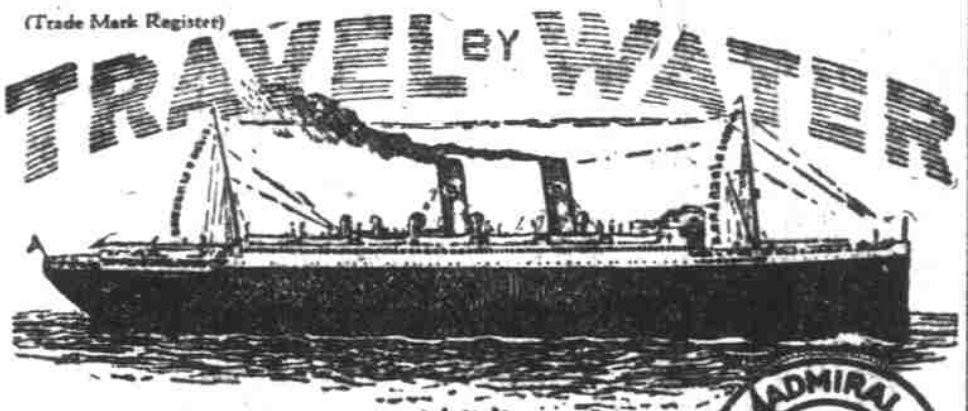
Weir was trembling like a leaf and could not make a sound when the judge demanded that he enter a plea to the grand jury indictment which had just been read.

The judge, when the indictment was read, refused to entertain a motion of Weir's attorneys for the appointment of a commission to examine into the man's sanity.

Wrong Man Is Jailed; Judge Releases Him

Because federal prohibition agents had not served a search warrant on the right man, United States Commissioner Frazer dismissed a complaint Tuesday afternoon against Earl Reece. Last week the agents secured a John Doe Ferguson search warrant for a house on the Taylor Ferry road in which a large quantity of beer was supposed to be concealed. The agents found Reece and the beer, but Frazer held that inasmuch as the agents intended to arrest Ferguson and only took Reece when they couldn't find Ferguson, Reece should not be held. During the hearing it developed that Reece had been an occupant of the place only two days, Ferguson having just moved off.
