

WARRANT FOUND IRREGULAR, BUT CHARGE STANDS

Federal Judge Wolverton found Wednesday that the search warrant used May 5 to raid the house of C. E. Alderdice, No. 574 East Eighth street north, was irregular, but he did not dismiss the indictment against Alderdice because in his opinion the irregularity was not "a fatal mistake."

HOLD CORPORATION SHOULD NOT PRACTICE OPTOMETRY
Oregon laws will not permit a corporation to practice optometry in the state, and therefore the contract which Robert A. Thompson made with the Thompson Optical Institute three years ago is illegal, attorneys for Thompson argued Wednesday in Circuit Judge

Tucker's court. Thompson sold his business here three years ago to the institute, agreeing at the time not to enter into competition for 20 years with the institute. Upon his return to the city recently the institute secured a preliminary injunction, restraining Thompson from practicing optometry. The hearing is on the petition for a permanent injunction.

Beacon Street Best Location for Bridge

Russians Remove Restrictions Upon Letters From U. S.

Washington, June 29. — Americans may now write as many letters to friends in soviet Russia as they please. Until now the soviet government refused to receive more than two pieces of mail per month sent from this country to an individual in Russia. This restriction, the postoffice department announces, has been removed. A new decree promulgated by the soviet provides that clothing shoes, food, printed matter, etc., may be sent

by parcel post from abroad when addressed to individuals in Russia for their personal use, without obtaining permission from the foreign trade department as has been the case heretofore.
