

OREGON SISTERS CONGRATULATE WOMAN NOMINEE

Women of the Jackson club sent their congratulations to Mrs. Peter Olson, Democratic nominee for United States senator for Minnesota, through a letter ratified by the Jackson club at its meeting last night in Central library hall. The letter was signed by Lillian M. Hackleman, acting secretary of the club; Bertha Slater Smith, vice president, and Mrs. W. S. Bell, Maria L. T. Hidden, Beattie M. The letter sets out that the Democratic women of Oregon, recognizing Mrs. Olson's high qualifications for the office she seeks, wish her success in the November election. At the meeting of the club last night Elton Watkins outlined his position as the Democratic candidate for congress for the Third district. He stated that he was against Newberryism, in favor of a federal hospital for wounded soldiers to be established in Portland; in favor of the bonus, favored the employment of only real American citizens in federal departments; is opposed to child labor; is for the Towner-Sterling educational bill now pending in congress; is for restricted immigration and the use of only English language and is against the ship subsidy.

W. T. Vaughn introduced a resolution endorsing the compulsory school bill, which was tabled after a good deal of heated argument.
