

## GENERAL BRUGHA, IRISH REBEL BOSS, DIES OF WOUNDS

Dublin, July 7.—(U. P.)—General Cathal Brugha (Charles Burgess) rebel leader, died in a hospital here today.

General Brugha was shot by Free State troops as the last fortress of the rebels was stormed. He had refused to surrender and made a dash for liberty.

Free State troops carried the bayonet into Blessington today, smashing up and capturing rebel bands, in a man-hunt for Eamonn DeValera.

Hundreds of insurgents were taken, but the former president of the republic was not among them.

Machine gun batteries and bombs were hurled against the positions at Blessington following a report that DeValera was leading the rebels there.

"Find DeValera," was the order to 2000 Free State troops, deploying southern Irish hills against remaining rebel bands today, following the insurgent chief's deft to the provisional government in the form of a manifesto to the American people.

The former president of the republic declared civil war is on; that the Dail had been suppressed and that Collins heads a military dictatorship, backed by British artillery.

nia gubernatorial nomination; Smith Brookhart, who won the Iowa primary, and Lynn Frazier, who beat Senator McCumber in North Dakota.

The nomination of none of these admittedly, would have been possible in a convention.

### FIGHT WELL ORGANIZED

New and other administration spokesmen declare the anti-primary move is not organized, but in this early stage of the Republican progressive wing as Johnson, California; Borah, Idaho, and Norris, Nebraska, differ with him.

"There is not the slightest doubt but that the campaign against the primary system is highly organized," Borah declared Thursday.

Senator Norris went further. "The old guard inside the White House and out, inside congress and out," he said, "is working to abolish the direct primary. It doesn't need any special organization because the old guard itself is organization enough."

Senator Johnson had but to refer to his statement, issued at the opening of the present administration regime, when he warned that there would be launched an organized effort to do away with the direct primary system.

Resentment of progressive Republicans at the anti-primary campaign, launched by Harding, carried on in different public utterances of Secretary Weeks and finally reaching concert pitch with the promise of defeated administration candidates to start campaigns in the several states for rid-dling politics of the system, was reflected in an interview with Senator Norris, Nebraska, whose words were taken by others among this element.

### NORRIS DEFENDS LAW

"If the people are not fit to vote in the primaries," said Norris, "they are not fit to vote in the elections. As for the convention system we have only to look at the national conventions to see its evils. The present system of nominating presidents is unfair, unjust, tyrannical and often absolutely fraudulent."

"It is true that the present primary system is not ideal. It should be remedied by preventing vast expenditures. Furthermore, the selection of candidates more strictly in the hands of the electorate by making nomination of presidential candidates possible only through direct vote of the people."

Only a few of these were reported to be new men. At the Oregon Electric shops and scattered points in Portland the S. P. & S. system was reported to have 21 out of 59 men on duty.

In Vancouver the S. P. & S. had 69 out of 292 employees at work and about 50 per cent of these were new men.

On the entire S. P. & S. system the total number at work was 210 out of a total of 502. A. J. Davidson, general manager, reported that the vacancies would be filled at a rate of about 25 to 30 a day.

All of the railroads had their employment headquarters busy today checking over new applicants. The dearth of employees was mainly confined to skilled labor.

### ATTACK ON TRAINMASTER THWARTED BY STRIKERS

Pasco, Wash., July 7.—Except for the fact that the Northern Pacific has put on a number of watchmen to guard its property and watch for fires, the strike situation in Pasco remains virtually unchanged. There have been no disorders among the local strikers and none is anticipated.

The nearest thing to a disturbance was caused when a man came over from Walla Walla and announced his intention of organizing a gang and going to Wallula to mob an O. W. R. & N. trainmaster who he alleged was doing the work of strikers. According to statements he was heard to make it was the intention to take the official into the street and beat him up and leave him. These threats reached the ears of P. A. Thomas, president of the strikers' organization.

### PACIFIC DIVISION STRIKE BROKEN, S. P. OFFICIALS SAY

(By United Press)

San Francisco, July 7.—The backbone of the railroad strike is broken on the Pacific division of the Southern Pacific in the belief of J. P. Dyer, general manager, who announced today that 1906 men returned to work. A total of 486 men resumed work in the two general shops located at Sacramento and Los Angeles.

A large number of men are expected to report for work at midnight, the last shift on which the men can return and not lose their pension privilege and seniority.

Traffic is being handled as in normal times, Dyer further announced, as the large number of strikers who returned to work, supplemented by non-union men, has brought the personnel of the various repair shops up to nearly normal.

### TROOPS WANTED TO HELP MOVE CALIFORNIA FRUIT

Sacramento, Cal., July 7.—(U. P.)—Officials of the Pacific Fruit Express company and Sheriff E. H. Gunn have requested Governor William D. Stephens to send troops immediately to Roseville. The request has already been denied, the governor, communicating through his secretary, declaring that Sheriff Gunn has "not yet used all his authority to maintain order."

Fruit can't be moved without troops, the Pacific Fruit Express officials claim, describing the Roseville strike situation as one not permitting the hiring of strikebreakers at all. The only evidence they submitted of strike violence was the attacking of Engineer Joseph Golard, Wednesday night, as he went off shift.

### INJUNCTION HALTS SHOP MEN FROM ESTABLISHING PICKETS

(By United Press)

East St. Louis, Ill., July 7.—The first injunction restraining striking shop men from picketing was granted here Thursday by District Judge English on petition of the Illinois Central railroad.

Attorneys for the road declared that acts of violence had been committed at Mounds, Ill., and were threatened at other points. By the order, shop men are restrained from picketing Illinois Central shops at East St. Louis, Mounds, Mattoon and Centralia.

### JOBS ARE FILLED

Vancouver, Wash., July 7.—Officials at the S. P. & S. shops here announced this morning that they have hired 15 new men to fill the places of striking shopmen, and the situation is improved from the railroad standpoint. Gene Teters, publicity agent for the strikers, reports that the strikers' pickets have been able to turn back men who were inclined to apply for jobs at the shops, and no old men have returned to work.

### HALF CREW AT WORK

Marshfield, July 7.—About half a crew is reported working in the Marshfield shops of the Southern Pacific. Twenty-five men who constituted the regular force quit when the strike was called, and today 12 or 14 men were working and the officials said they expected to secure still more to add to the force.

### REPORTS CONFLICT

Los Angeles, July 7.—(U. P.)—Southern Pacific officials claimed today that 429 striking shopmen had returned to work, while union leaders asserted that there had been no change in the situation.

### STRIKEBREAKERS BEATEN

Albuquerque, N. M., July 7.—(U. P.)—Four strikebreakers were severely beaten by striking shopmen. Police stopped it.
