

CONTRACTS TO BE LET FOR 5 ROADS

Oregon City, July 11.—With the sale of the necessary bonds to cover approximately \$100,000 in improvements authorized by August 7, the Clackamas county court Monday decided to let contracts for work on five roads to be improved under the bond act and with the further aid of market road money. Bids for the improvement of the roads were opened yesterday and are to be checked over and the contracts awarded July 17.

The bids, according to County Surveyor D. T. Meldrum, are entirely satisfactory in the main, although they have not been checked over with the estimates. They are lower than were expected, he said. The bids provide alternative types of pavement but it is understood that even inch concrete is to be used. "So, if the president or the postmaster general is advised that the mails of the United States, possibly carrying treasure, are liable to be robbed and the mail carriers assaulted and murdered in any particular region of the country, who can doubt the authority of the president or one of the executive departments under him to make an order for the protection of them and of the persons and lives of the carriers by doing exactly what was done

Chick Hutchinson's wonderful performance of yesterday, when he led the first day's qualifiers with a total of 125, may yet be eclipsed, but the opinion prevailed today that the janky Glenview professional had made a bit of golf history when he set the pace in yesterday's play.

While Hutchinson was giving the big opening day crowd its thrills so far as professionals are concerned, Chick Evans, the western champion, provided the spice among the amateurs.

Chick found the going a bit tough and finished with a mark of 151, just two points under the score needed to qualify. Evans and Ira Lecocq, the 17-year-old star of the Glenview club, were the only amateurs to qualify.

Among the stars who failed to qualify were Robert A. Gardner, the former national champion, and Willie Hunter, former British amateur champion. Gardner had a card of 154 and Hunter shot 155.

One hundred and eight players started in yesterday's round and 27 qualified. Another 108 were listed for today's round and one Wednesday balance of the field of 229 will get away. The 72 players with the lowest totals will start the championship flight on Thursday.

With Hutchinson leading yesterday's qualifiers, Mike Brady of Birmingham, Ala., was second with 142, Abe Mitchell of England and James Barnes of Pelham, N. Y., tied for third at 144, and William Creasy of Kansas City bobbed up next with 146.

Drop Is Shown in Fund Needed for Soldier Education

Salem, July 11.—A total of \$802 ex-service men have availed themselves of the benefits of the soldier's educational aid act since its enactment in 1919, according to Secretary of State Koser, and a total of \$1,197,114.43 has been disbursed under the terms of the act. Of this amount \$3,750.19 has been returned to the state by ex-service men participating in the state bonus act.

The disbursements show a gradual but material decrease since the peak was reached in 1930. Disbursements from this fund in 1931 aggregated \$2,077,483.39; 1930, \$1,914,045.89; 1929, \$2,077,483.39; to July 1, 1932, \$1,197,114.43. Secretary of State Koser estimates that one half of the levy of 4 of a mill, created to raise this fund, will be sufficient after this year and that in another year the entire levy may be abolished, resulting in a saving of \$400,000 annually on Oregon's tax budget.

A total of 167 educational institutions of all kinds have been attended by ex-service men participating in the educational aid act.

ELEVATOR TAKES DROP

Oregon City, July 11.—Six passengers in the municipal elevator yesterday were seriously jarred, but none was seriously hurt yesterday afternoon when the municipal cage took a four-foot drop on the way down. The automatic control was being adjusted and the elevator reached the top of the tower, it stuck. The operator, not realizing the car was out of order, on the return trip depended on it to start to descend after the third car had reached the mark four feet from the bottom. Instead the cage continued to drop, striking the rear bumper.

Several women were in the cage. The elevator was closed for temporary repairs.

Barker against Zola Barker was entered, requiring payment of \$40 a month to Mrs. Barker, who was awarded custody of two children. Attorneys' fees of \$250 were allowed.

DIVER'S HEAD INJURED

Oregon City, July 11.—Venon Chandler, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Chandler of Gladstone, is recovering from serious injuries to his head, suffered while diving in the Clackamas river near his home. The boy struck a ledge and his forehead was gashed, but he was able to swim ashore.

Forty Patients Are To Be Transferred

Salem, July 11.—Forty patients at the state hospital here will be transferred to the Eastern Oregon hospital at Pendleton tomorrow. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the institution here, stated this morning. The transfer is being made in an effort to relieve congestion in the Salem institution. With a capacity for 1800 patients, the hospital here has a population of 1870, of whom 1144 are men and 726 women. Dr. J. C. Evans, assistant superintendent of the institution, will be in charge of the transfer, which will be made by means of a special car.

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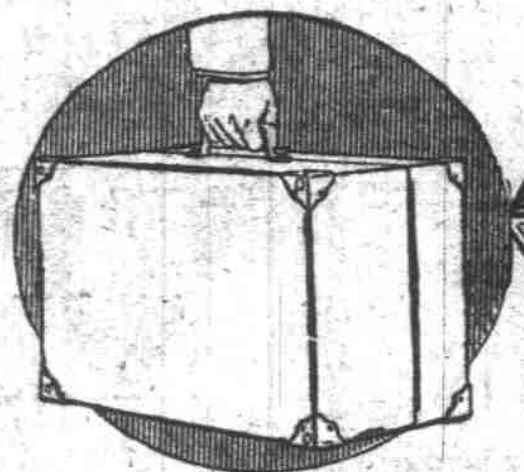
