Habeas Corpus Writ
Plea in Behalf of
Accused Is Refused

George Takis, Greek, didn't get much sympathy from Federal Judge Bean Wednesday, when, through his attorney, Paul Dorfmeister, he applied for a writ of habeas corpus.

Takis is in jail because of his failure to furnish \$1000 bond fixed by the immigration service pending the outcome of deportation proceedings based on charges that he shared in the earnings of immoral women.

Takis' hearing is only partially concluded, and thus far, according to R. P. Bonham, immigration inspector, has resulted in much damaging evidence against him.

Dorfmeister tried to have Takis released from jail without bond before the conclusion of his hearing, declaring the charges "meaningless and immaterial."

Judge Bean declined to interfere with the immigration service's case.

Eight Horses Are
Burned to Death
In Silverton Fire

Silverton, July 13.—Eight dray horses were burned to death early this morning and damages totaling about \$500 resulted from a fire that broke out about 4:30 o'clock in the Lawrey dray line barn on Jersey street. The horses, belonging to the dray company, were valued at \$1100. The barn was destroyed. It belonged to G. I. Barr and was valued at \$1500.

The F. W. Pettyjohn building was damaged about \$500 and the Stiff Furniture company, occupying it, estimated its loss at \$1000, mostly in its rug stock. Damage to the retail lumber yard of the Silver Falls Timber company, was estimated at \$200. Calls were sent to Salem and Mount Angel for assistance in fighting the flames, which threatened the entire business district, but were cancelled as soon as the fire was gotten under control. The fire is believed to have been due to spontaneous combustion in the hay in the livery barn.
