

WEED CUTTING CITY TO BEGIN

Weed cutting on city owned property is to begin Monday morning, when a force of men from the public works department will be put to this task in conformity with the general clean-up campaign. Joseph Roberts, who is in charge of the work of putting lots and notifying others to cut weeds, reported today that more than 400 lots have been posted and that at least 2000 more requiring attention have been located and will be posted during the ensuing week. Owners are given 10 days within which to clean up the lots after the notices are posted. Failure to do so is liable to be followed by arrest and prosecution in the municipal court.

The inspectors are taking the lots along the main arteries of travel first, with the idea that these postings will bring the subject generally into public notice and cause others to get busy before the inspectors arrive, and also because cleaning up of these lots presents a better aspect to the visitors of Portland.

SAUL GOMPERS TAKES HARD RAP AT LABOR BOARD

Washington, July 15.—There are two sides to every question and organized labor, through its spokesman, Samuel Gompers, today discloses its case against the railroad, its case against the United States railroad labor board, its argument against the use of federal troops as strikebreakers and its suggestions as to how the present strike can be brought to an end.

Sitting at the head of a long table in the board room of the American Federation of Labor building, Mr. Gompers, in his characteristically dramatic fashion, explained labor's viewpoint to a group of assembled correspondents and then submitted to cross-examination.

GOMPERS POARS

MAINTENANCE OF WAY MEN
WILL NOT JOIN STRIKERS
Washington, July 15.—(U. P.)—There is no immediate prospect of the 60,000 maintenance of way men joining the strike of the federated shop crafts, it developed here this afternoon after a conference between President Harding and E. F. Cram, head of the maintenance of way men.

At the conclusion of the conference, which was one of the longest the president has had with anyone for months, the White House issued a statement in which it was declared that Grable had brought to President Harding the first direct protest against violation of the railroad labor board's decisions by the railroads themselves.

President Harding informed Grable that congress had set up the railroad labor board to settle disputes between the railroads and their employees, and that each side must respect the board's decisions.

Non-compliance of the railroads had been called to President Harding's attention, it was stated, until after the strike of the federated shop crafts men began.

NORTHWEST SHOPMEN MAY
END STRIKE SEPARATELY
St. Paul, Minn., July 15.—(U. P.)—Whether striking railroad shopmen will agree to a separate settlement with the Northwest was to be determined today.

Executives of the Northwest lines were said to be ready to compromise with the strikers pending a national settlement of the strike.

Among concessions reported to have been conferred was a definite agreement not to "farm out" shop work, to eliminate the practice of running men on the lines, and to reinstate all men with full seniority rights.

The strikers were being asked to immediately return to work at the scale ordered by the United States railroad labor board, pending adjustment.

Belief that the report of separate settlement of the strike controversy in the Northwest was expressed by Fred Ross, chairman of the carmen's union on the S. P. & S. lines. Ross said that he had not been informed of any negotiations and that he would have been if he was in touch with the strikers.

Among those who will address the convention are Rev. Dr. E. Powell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Seattle; Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner, Portland; Professor R. Reiter, Jaxan, and Archdeacon Severance, Spokane today.

BANDITS CONFESS LOCAL ROBBERIES

Confession of the holdup of the Oregon Electric waiting room in the Seward hotel building, July 3, and of the Roy grocery, in East 28th street, July 11, was made by two of three young suspects arrested since midnight, police announced this morning.

J. W. McLane, a steam engineer, living at No. 211 11th street, and E. P. Long, engineer and P. A. Stevens, printer, both living at No. 1435 East 15th street north, are the men in jail charged with the robberies. McLane has made a verbal confession and Long a signed confession, police inspectors said.

The three men this morning waived preliminary hearings before Municipal Judge Ekwall on charges of assault and robbery, being armed with dangerous weapons. Their bonds were fixed at \$2000 each.

A raid on the house at No. 1435 East 15th street north for moonshine liquor, on the night of July 11, by troopers Harms and Nutter, found a suitcase in the house containing three guns, some rope, a flashlight and other articles used by burglars.

Incidentally, they found a 50-gallon and a 20-gallon still, and arrested Charles Daligish, the only man in the house at the time. Daligish was held for the moonshining, but police do not believe he was connected, at least directly, with the robberies.

Discovery of the articles in the suitcase was reported at police headquarters and inspectors Cahill and Shimp were detailed to watch the house last night.

After midnight they picked up Long, who was sleeping in. He was taken to the station, where he is said to have broken down and told of the two robberies. The inspectors learned where to find McLane, and the latter was taken at his home No. 211 11th street, a few minutes later.

McLane also confessed, according to the police, that Stevens was registered at a Washington street hotel under the name of A. B. Barnes. Stevens was captured later in the morning.

NOT RIGHT PERSON
When questioned by Inspector McLaughlin, McLane said he had admitted that he and his partners had planned a holdup of the Southern Pacific street office at Fourth and Stark streets. They gave up the plan, he said, when they discovered that a large safe was in the office, which they believed would hinder their operations.

Stevens turned out to be a man picked up by the police Friday night on suspicion that he was the man who attacked Mrs. E. R. Bush. He was taken to the Bush home, but the victim said he was not the right person. He was immediately turned loose. He was much agitated to be taken into custody again so soon.

According to Long's story to the police, as Mrs. Frances G. Clark, who manages the Oregon Electric waiting room in the Seward hotel, has been in the office the night of July 3 to put the receipts for the day in the Seward hotel safe, he grabbed the money from her and ran. Stevens was outside in an automobile, moving down the street, while McLane, as soon as he saw the work was done, came running across the street from where he had been stationed and jumped into the car at the same time Long did, according to Long's account. They got \$90.

ROBBED GROCERY STORE
"Long said he went through the cash register at the Roy grocery while McLane kept his gun on Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Roy and a customer. Stevens, as before, is said to have waited outside in a machine. They got \$45.

Police still believe that the three men may have staged the hold-up of the C. E. Watkins Drug store, No. 511 Union Avenue, July 12, but the opinion with which they have told the story of the other crimes throws doubt upon this theory.

The capture of Long and the subsequent capture of the other two men were all effected by the first night relief.

CAMAS STORE IS ROBBED
Vancouver, Wash., July 15.—The store of R. W. Camack at Camas was robbed of approximately \$500 worth of goods last night. No one saw the burglars but the authorities believe two men with a machine were involved. Fingerprints were secured.

Airship-Airplane Device Invented; Tests Being Made

(By Universal Service)
Washington, July 15.—Experiments are being conducted near Paris with a monoplane having a hollow wing inflated with gas, combining the main features of the airship and the airplane. It is the invention of Maurice Farman, who has this invention has been received by the headquarters of the army air service from its attaches at Paris, it was announced today.

A special fabric has been devised which can hold gas without leakage. It is called "air skin." It is planned to use helium, the non-inflammable gas, if it can be procured in sufficient quantities from the United States.

The inventor expects to combine the greater speed of the monoplane with the better lifting power of the dirigible.
