

JAPAN'S MOVE IN UPPER SIBERIA ONLY TECHNICAL

American Ambassador at Tokio Says Troops Will Be Stationed on Saghalien Island.

(By Universal Service)
Washington, July 15.—Japan's evacuation of Nomonhan province of Upper Siberia will be a technical one only, according to advice received at the state department today from American Ambassador Warren at Tokio. Although the troops will be withdrawn, they will be stationed on the northern half of Saghalien island, directly opposite and virtually a part of the province. It is within easy striking distance of the mainland. The troops were in the province proper as a punitive expedition in revenge for the alleged massacre of Japanese citizens and a consul 18 months ago.

School Districts May Sell Realty On Credit Basis

Olympia, Wash., July 15.—School districts of the second and third classes have the power, upon vote of the electors, to sell real estate for either cash or credit, is the ruling of the supreme court today. The decision reverses the king county court and grants A. N. Sanford and wife, who purchased property from school district 176 of King county on credit terms, to retain possession. The lower court ruled to elect the purchasers on the contention that the transaction was not a cash sale. The high court further ruled that first class district can sell real estate on cash or credit without authority for amounts less than \$2000, but over that must have authority and the terms must be cash.

McCormick Denies Report He Will Be Married to Walska

New York, July 15.—(I. N. S.)—Denying reports that he will marry Mlle. Casimir Walska, Polish grand opera star, as soon as she gets a divorce from Alexander Cochrane, Harold McCormick of Chicago, multi-millionaire head of the United States vester company, sailed for Europe today on the White Star line Olympic. The only statement he would make was that his daughter, Mlle. Walska, who is reported engaged to Max Oser, a Swiss riding master, was not on board the ship. It had been reported from Chicago that she would accompany her father.

Andrew Kinney, Who Lost in Foot Race, To Face Grand Jury

Charged with forgery and larceny, Andrew Kinney, who was arrested Friday night after a spectacular chase along downtown streets, was ordered held for grand jury investigation when he was arraigned before Municipal Court Saturday afternoon. Kinney's attempts to cash a money order stolen from the American Express company's office in Warrenton first aroused suspicion which resulted in his arrest on charges of robbing the company and forging the money orders.

Street Work Bids Will Be Accepted

Commissioner Barbur will recommend to the city council at Wednesday's session that it award contracts for three pieces of street improvement as follows: To Lunstrom & Carlson for the improvement of Forest street from its westerly terminus to Overlook boulevard at a price of \$2752.50, which is \$492.10 under the city engineer's estimate; to the same firm for the improvement of 43d avenue southeast from 42d to 44th at a price of \$19,012, which is \$810 under the city engineer's estimate; and to C. G. Randall for the improvement of East 53d street, from 52d to Tillamook streets, at a price of \$5178, which is \$1435 under the city engineer's estimate.

London, July 15.—A brooch of diamonds and pearls worth \$10,000 was lost by Lady Beatty in her home yesterday during a ball given by Mrs. Marshall Field to her daughter, Gwen. The Prince of Wales and the Duke of York, together with a large number of Americans, attended the ball. Lady Beatty discovered her loss at 3 o'clock in the morning and immediately notified detectives. The brooch was a wedding gift, and an extensive investigation is being made with the hope of recovering it.

FINE PROGRAMS BY RADIO PROMISED

Hawley to Resume Tuesday; 2 Addresses to Be Given at Hallock & Watson Station.

Two addresses, both of them brief, to be broadcast under the auspices of The Journal at the Hallock & Watson Radio Service, and the resumption Tuesday of the Willard P. Hawley Jr. station with additional apparatus which will increase the degree of perfection of modulation of the instruments, will give reason for additional interest this week in radio. The address sponsored by The Journal will be on Tuesday evening at 5:30 o'clock by Harry N. Nelson, adjutant of the American Legion, on the aims and purposes of the Legion; the other will be on Wednesday at the same hour by Marshall N. Dana, who will read a message by Theodore N. Hardee on "The Government's Peace Time Savings Program." Mr. Hardee, who is director of the Twelfth Federal Reserve district of the federal reserve bank, broadcast his message twice while in Los Angeles, at the solicitation of two of the daily papers of that city. Elimination of the two Hawley programs last week put a material damper on the pleasure of radio enthusiasts, but Charles L. Anderson, head of the Northwest Radio Manufacturing company, who made the set, declare that the improvement in the modulation would be ample compensation for foregoing the entertainment.

700 Bankers Disport At Rainier Retreat

Tacoma, Wash., July 15.—Seven hundred bankers of the United States members of the American Institute of Banking, spent Saturday in Rainier National park. The bankers are en route to Portland for their annual convention. Bismarck, N. D., July 15.—(U. P.)—Arthur C. Townley was again given the whip hand in the national Non-Partisan league here tonight. Practically defeated last fall, the league was designated by the special state convention here to take complete charge of reorganization work in the league.

Cyril C. Thompson of Boise has been appointed deputy state auditor for Idaho to succeed A. Clausen, who resigned several weeks ago.

HUGE LIQUOR PLOT INVOLVES HIGHER UPS IN CHICAGO

Former Collector of Internal Revenue Arrested as Leader of Organized Grafters.

Chicago, July 15.—A million dollar liquor plot was revealed tonight in the arrest of Henry W. Mager and Ben M. Mitchell. Mager was formerly collector of internal revenue; Mitchell is a former state representative. Mager was leader of the plot, according to Colonel A. B. Earnshaw, special intelligence officer of the department of justice. Five confessions of graft payments, some as high as \$10,000, were secured by the investigators. It was claimed.

Scores of prominent officials and politicians are said to be involved and facing arrest. Mager, according to Earnshaw's charges, used his official position to obtain money from scores of brewers, distillers, saloonkeepers and cabaret owners. Mitchell was described as the "payoff man." Mager and Mitchell were arraigned before United States Commissioner Louis E. Mason tonight. "Operations of the plotters was to conduct a raid and seize liquor as evidence, according to Earnshaw. Two or three days later the victim would be called on the telephone and be told he could 'see Mitchell and square it.'"

Woman Accused as Hammer Murderess Confesses Identity

Tucson, Ariz., July 15.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Clara Phillips, who since her arrest here on a charge of beating Mrs. Albert Meadows to death with a hammer has insisted her name was "Clara McGuyer," tonight confessed her identity to Sheriff Traeger and John L. Van Buskirk, representing her attorney. Mrs. Phillips also permitted Sheriff Traeger to examine the bandaged finger of her left hand, which showed bruises. Mrs. Sarah Hattick, county jail matron, who examined Mrs. Phillips, said she had scratches on her legs and on the back of her hands. With a face like a graven image, she read a note from her husband in which he urged her to return to Los Angeles. She did not change her expression or make any comment.

Mysterious Woman Of Irvington Is Sought by Police

Members of the dry squad are still searching through the city for a mysterious Mrs. Williams who rented a house in the Irvington district and established a first class distillery. The house at No. 797 Tillamook street was searched Friday and a 40-gallon still, much mash and other necessities in the bootlegging trade were discovered and confiscated. Two women and a man seen about the place a few days before have disappeared. The police learned the house was rented under the name of Mrs. Williams.

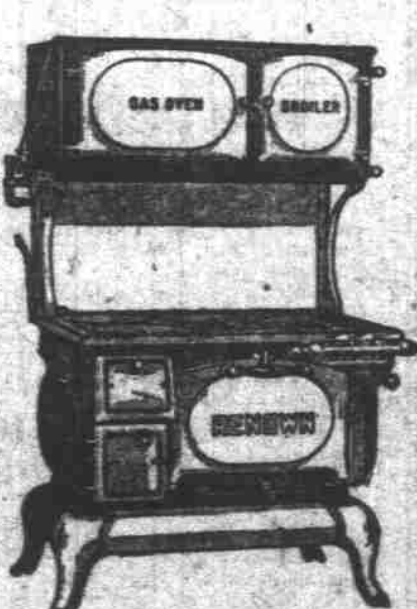

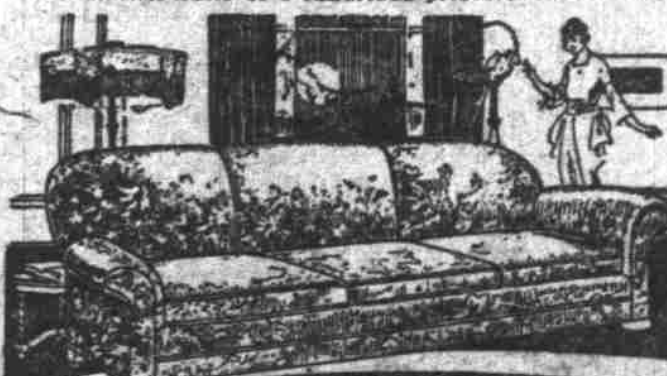
