

## SALMON PACKING IS THERE BEFORE BANKERS' MEET

The immense importance of the salmon packing industry from a national standpoint was impressed upon the American Institute of Banking in session at the Peoples theatre by S. F. Stone, president of the Port of Astoria, who spoke this morning before the convention.

Stone pointed to the early beginnings of the industry with the birth of five boys, the Hume brothers, on the banks of the Kennebec river in Maine. All of these brothers became Pacific coast packers.

George W. Hume did his first packing on the Sacramento river in 1851. Then in 1854 he and Andrew S. Haggood packed 2000 cases on this same river. They had difficulty in disposing of what they considered such an immense amount. They moved to the Columbia river in 1855 and built a cannery at Oak Point on the Washington side, where they put up 4000 cases in 1856.

From the obscure beginning on the Sacramento river the industry has spread up the coast to Washington, Oregon, British Columbia, Alaska, Siberia and Japan. And in these waters since 1854 155,470,000 cases have been packed. Since 1878 Alaska has packed 82,000,000 cases, or half of the world's supply.

Stone pointed out that the Columbia river spring-run salmon are the finest grade in the world. The Alaska red salmon is the standard, however. The remarkable instinct of the salmon in returning to the river in which it was spawned was explained to the bankers by the speaker.

Dr. W. J. Hindley, former mayor of Spokane, spoke before the convention this morning on "Scientific Merchandising," and E. G. Crawford, vice president of the United States National Bank, Portland, spoke on "Fundamentals." In the afternoon, following a talk on "Electrical Development and Available Waterpower of the Northwest" by Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland city company, officers were to be elected.

### GREAT QUANTITY OF TIMBER

REMAINS, BANKERS TOLD  
The alarmist need have no fear of the timberless age, confidently stated George S. Long of Tacoma, in speaking before the American Institute of Banking at the Peoples theatre Wednesday afternoon.

"Well enough that the alarmist should direct his thought and energy to the main question of what we have, to the reproduction of forest growth on lands unfit for agriculture and kindred cultivation; to encourage economic conditions that will prevent forest waste; but he need not fear, hesitate to use freely what is needed from the forest, for with the enlarged use of substitutes, the lessening of forest waste, and the practice of forest reproduction, there will be no lack of forest products."

### LESS WASTE NOW

"From the early settlement of our country, until about 1840, the forests on both slopes of the Appalachian mountain range, west to the Atlantic, were largely wasted by the axe and fire, to make room for home and field. Since 1840, but more especially since the Civil war, the forests have been utilized with less waste; but including all that has been wasted in clearing the lands for farming, and all that has been cut for lumber, and other uses, there is still standing and untouched, more forest growth in the United States than all that has been cut into lumber by the man since the landing of the Pilgrims."

"The latest statistics gathered by the federal government, as to the stand of timber in the United States (not including Alaska) was given in a report of the bureau of corporations, in the year 1911, as 2,826,000,000 feet. Of this total 55 per cent is reported as standing in the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana. In the three states of Washington, Oregon and California there is reported to be 1,218,000,000 feet, or 43 per cent of the standing timber in the United States. The Sierra Nevada mountain range in California and the Cascade mountain range in Oregon and Washington are practically one continuous range, traversing the country north and south, distant from the Pacific ocean from 100 to 200 miles."

PER CENT ON COAST  
"Between this range of mountains and the Pacific, from the Canadian line on the north, and as far south as San Francisco in California, there is 1,218,000,000 feet, or 43 per cent of all merchantable timber in the United States."

"The lumber production in the United States has in the past reached the maximum of about 45,000,000,000 feet, but for the past two or three years has been averaging around 35,000,000,000 feet, and somewhere between 35,000,000,000 and 45,000,000,000 feet the probable normal annual production in the United States."

"Within ten years it is safe to assume that the joint production of these two states will be 100 per cent larger than it was in 1920, with the probability that Oregon will take the first rank as a lumber producing state, for the very good reason that within its boundary there is more standing timber than in any state in the Union. Its total stand being estimated at 444,000,000,000 feet, and that of Washington 301,000,000,000 feet."

ers' committee today in regard to the establishment of the employment bureau and commissary department, as follows:

ASK FOR AID  
"This action was hastened by the feeling on the part of the strikers that President Harding is determined to keep the industry busy, and feel that advance precautions will be necessary to combat any similar action of the railroad companies."

Unions outside the railroad are being appealed to for financial assistance. The union of railroad employees not involved in the strike have already commenced contributing. Appeal of the strikers' committee for funds received immediate response from the clerks on Tuesday night, when the express division No. 2210 voted over \$200 out of its treasury as the first contribution, and in addition pledged \$10 per member per month so long as the strike shall last. Clerks lodge No. 413 voted two days' pay per month per member for the duration of the strike, to assist the shopmen.

GROW RESTLESS  
"Sentiment is running very strong among the rank and file of the train and engine men, who are making moral support to the strikers. Maintenance of way men in and around Portland are growing more restless and chafing under the delay in receiving authority to join the striking shopmen. These people claim the men now working, including the firemen and oilers, are fighting the battle for all railroad workers as they characterize it."

The feeling among all railroad workers who are not now on strike is that in contributing their share of financial support at this time, they are performing their minimum duty in making the present strike successful. Albina shops reported a total of 571 men on duty, an increase of 55 per cent over Wednesday and a 55 per cent operation on the system. The S. P. & reported a 45 per cent operation on that system with Portland yard forces filled. The Southern Pacific reported a total working force for the system of 70 per cent with 90 per cent at Brooklyn shops.

take out insurance on their ranch homes and orchards. While this fire is still several miles from the orchard district, the lessons from the fire zone have been learned and they realize that danger is imminent.

The Wyeth fire has now practically burned itself out and all danger to the town is past.

Rangers declare that heavy snows of last winter tore many limbs from trees and no seed in the underbrush, creating ideal fire hazards of a most serious kind.

At the Portland offices of the U. S. forest service no definite information was available as to the condition of the Herman creek fire today. Thomas Sherrard, superintendent of the Oregon national forest, is at the scene of the fire. Subordinates in his office said all they knew of the fire was that orders kept coming to rush more men and supplies.

Attaches of the Portland office were inclined to believe the Boy Scouts camped at Whitum lake were in no danger from the fire. There are three trails leading from the camp, the said-Herman creek, Eagle creek and Lost lake trails. It was considered unlikely that all three trails would be cut off.

MEN FIGHTING FLAMES IN SLASHINGS NEAR SCAPPOOSE  
Another raging fire which broke out Wednesday in slashings back of Scappoose and about half way between that town and the operations of the Nehalem Timber & Logging company, necessitated the sending of 30 fighters to the district by the forces of the patrol association Wednesday night.

This new fire was burning in the old Chapman cutting, but for the present held no menace for green timber in that vicinity.

Other fires in the northwestern section of the state were in better shape today, according to reports made to C. C. Scott, head of the fire patrol association. Scott said that withdrawal of some men from the fires which have been "tied in" has been made possible by the foggy weather of the past two days. These men have been shifted to Timber and Belding, where two fires in these sections are still outside of trails and trenches at some points.

Several points have not reported to Scott, who took the absence of word as an indication that conditions were being held well in hand in the quiet sectors.

Two of the three brush fires which have been burning for the past few days in the hills west of the city have been practically extinguished, according to the fire marshal's office. Engine 15 is still engaged in fighting a blaze which is burning at the end of Sherwood drive. There is little danger at present from the fire. Fires west of Macleay park and west of the Linton road have been put out.

TOWN THREATENED  
Olympia, Wash., July 20.—The town of Tono, in Thurston county, is threatened by a forest fire which has spread to its borders. Miners' dwellings, employees of the Washington Union Coal company, are said by state forestry officials to be imperiled. Fire wardens from Centralia were ordered to the scene. A new fire on the Olympic highway, three miles west of here, is reported to have covered more than 12 acres on either side of the main highway, which leads to Aberdeen.

MUST GET PERMITS  
Eugene, July 20.—Starting Monday, no camp fires may be lighted in the Cascade national forest without a permit from forest officials. Word has been received from the state forester that "existing and impending fire conditions in Oregon warrant immediate inauguration of the campfire permit requirement."

HAD GUN FOR BEAR  
Vancouver, Wash., July 20.—Paul Davis, negro, who arrived in Vancouver from Portland in a drunken condition, was fined \$50 by Judge Vaughan Wednesday on a concealed weapon charge. He said he was going fishing with his gun and needed the weapon to protect him from bears and cougars.
