

PERU-CHILEAN PACT DECLARED BIG PEACE MOVE

Washington, July 21.—The protocol signed today at the final session of the Tacna-Arica conference was declared by Secretary of State Hughes to be "the greatest forward step in the interest of peace on this hemisphere which this generation has witnessed."

Addressing the Chilean and Peruvian delegates to the conference and a distinguished diplomatic gathering, Hughes said: "I believe this to be the dawn of a new day in Latin-America. It points to a new era of peace and prosperity, in which friendship may be cultivated and mutual interests and opportunities for cooperation may be safeguarded."

The delegates were brought to Washington at the invitation of President Harding three months ago and had just affixed their signatures to the agreement ending the long standing boundary dispute between Chile and Peru. "It is vindication of the processes of peace," said the secretary.

"It is easy to talk of the prevention of war, but inevitably there will be difficulties and serious controversies and if these are not settled by force, there must be peaceful solutions which can be had only through the efforts of governments which determinedly seek peace and make it possible by providing for the contacts of honorable and reasonably friendly nations."

He declared that the amicable adjustment reached was "the healing which gives promise of better relations throughout Latin America and of the promotion of the growth of sound opinion."

Race for Governor In Nebraska One of Closest on Record

Lincoln, Neb., July 21.—(U. P.)—Probably as close a race for governor as was ever staged in any state, may result in a virtual tie with both aspirants for the Republican nomination hopeful of being acclaimed victor when returns from the official count of Tuesday's votes, which begins today, are in.

Adam McMullen, veteran political leader, early today had 47,468 ballots to his credit as compared with 47,285 for Charles H. Randall, opposing him on a "business man for governor" platform.
A. H. Byrum ran a weak third with 12,216.
McMullen's scant lead of 183 votes out of 1314 precincts, of which only 65 are yet to be reported.
Charles W. Bryan, brother of W. J. Bryan, Democrat, will oppose the winner of the Randall-McMullen controversy in the fall elections.
Senator Gilbert Hitchcock's large plurality indicated he would give a strong race to R. E. Howell, Republican nominee, in the fall elections.

LIQUOR PIRATES SEIZE AND KILL

Miami, Fla., July 21.—(I. N. S.)—Coast guards were searching today for motorboat pirates who late yesterday held up the converted auxiliary schooner William H. Albury, shot her master, Captain Edgecomb, dead, and then fled. The motorboat, containing the pirates was said to have borne the name Falcon.
The Albury, according to harbor authorities, has been engaged in running liquor between Florida Keys and the British Bahamas.
The hold-up was said to have taken place off Gunkey, near this port.

9000 Lots Listed By City in Plan For Cleaning Up

More than 9000 lots have been listed for posting in the present lot-cleaning program already in running. Applications made today by Joseph Roberts, who is in charge of this work.
Many property owners are making prompt response to the demands that they clean up their lot, but others are letting the time limit slide by, and next Monday morning a detail of police officers will be sent out to arrest the delinquents.

"We propose to make arrests without fear or favor, if the property-owners have taken no steps to obey the notices posted in accordance with the city ordinance," said Roberts.
One gratifying feature is the number of requests from non-resident lot owners that the city clean their lots and send them the bills. From 12 to 15 such requests are received daily, says Roberts.
The inspectors are now working in the Belmont, Sellwood, Irvington, Woodlawn and South Portland districts. They have covered the main arteries of travel and will now work out in the side districts.

PASTOR DIES AT AGE OF 76
