

TWO SENTENCED TO COUNTY JAIL ON THEFT CHARGE

After pleading guilty to charges of larceny from a dwelling, Victor Gould and Lester Hooper were sentenced to six months in the county jail today by Presiding Judge Tazewell. Gould and Hooper admitted robbing the home of Mrs. C. E. Alkin, No. 921 Couch street, June 5.

They entered the house in the daytime and forced Mrs. Alkin to retire to the bathroom while they ransacked the house, taking \$8 in cash.

Several other indictments for alleged theft at other places about the same time were dismissed on condition they plead guilty to this charge.

ASKS \$5000 DAMAGES

A rotten piece of rope which broke and landed a load of tea on the back of A. Grovning while he was working as a longshoreman loading the Bralberg, July 5, is cited in a complaint filed today in the circuit court as the cause of action against the Portland Stevedoring company. Grovning claims the failure of the company to provide good rope caused the accident, which resulted in great bodily injury. He asks for \$5000 damages.

DRIVER ACQUITTED

A jury in District Judge Bell's court Thursday night returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of R. M. Johnson, charged with driving while intoxicated. Johnson was arrested July 16 after a collision between his automobile and an automobile driven by Edgar Wedin on the Base Line road. The jury deliberated from 1:30 to 7 p. m. Witnesses testified they smelled liquor on Johnson's breath immediately after the accident, but there was no direct testimony that he had been drinking.

Two Murderers of Business Man Hang

Vancouver, B. C., July 28.—(L. N. S.)—Alan Robinson, who shot and killed W. B. Salisbury Jr., a prominent business man of Vancouver, in this city early in April of last year, and his confederate, Alexander Paulson, were hanged here this morning. "Tell all the boys to go straight—time does not pay," were Robinson's last words, as he smilingly mounted the scaffold. Paulson looked very ill and merely murmured goodbyes.

La Grande Votes to Back Union Pacific

La Grande, July 28.—The railroad squabble now on between the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific for the control of the Central Pacific was thrashed out at a mass meeting here attended by business men and professional men from La Grande and other parts of Union county, a resolution being unanimously passed supporting the Union Pacific side of the controversy. Among the speakers at the meeting were William Hanley of Ontario, former Governor Oswald West, J. W. McCulloch of Ontario and W. H. Doolittle of Baker.

Woman Says Mate Made Setting Hen 'Work Overtime'

Cruel and inhuman treatment to a hen which was forced to work overtime when newly-hatched chickens were stolen from the nest and a new setting of eggs substituted, thus keeping the faithful and expectant mother on the job through a long and continuous period, is cited among other allegations in the divorce complaint of Agnes Ann Delk, who asks legal separation from J. T. Delk. The Delks were married in Vancouver January 7, 1921. Mrs. Delk charges her husband chewed tobacco in bed and refused to buy any clothing. He was so stingy, she says, she even had to buy the wedding ring with her own money. She requests \$20 a month permanent alimony. Complaint was filed today in the circuit court.

Elaborate Fashion Show to Be Staged During Buyers' Week

An elaborate fashion show at which suits, gowns, finished furs and other wearing apparel valued at approximately \$500,000 will be displayed, will be one of the features of the 10th annual Buyers' week convention which will be held here August 7 to 12.

The fashion show will be held in the Auditorium and elaborate settings are now being made for the stage under the direction of John Stark, decorator and designer. Latest styles from Paris and London will have their first showing on the Pacific coast, together with creations of local design.

For the most part the finery will be displayed on living models, 50 having been selected already from local establishments.

These models also will be draped with uncut cloth and a fashion parade will be held. In addition a demonstration of the methods of draping and decorating store windows will be given for the visiting buyers.

Senator Garland To Make Race on Democratic Ticket

Albany, Or., July 28.—Announcement was made Thursday by Samuel L. Garland, formerly state senator from Lin county, that he will seek to be returned to the senate at the election next fall. He will oppose L. M. Curl, Republican candidate.

Former Senator Garland received the greatest number of votes in the Democratic primary last May for the office he now seeks, though his name was not on the ballot. He had not accepted the nomination, however, until he made his announcement Thursday.

Members of both parties had been urging the former senator to enter the race, but he had declined, he said, because of the doubtful condition of his health, which is now improved.

BLOWTORCH STARTS FIRE
Painters using a blowtorch set fire to a flat building at No. 214 Wheeler street, at 10 o'clock this morning, and before firemen had extinguished the flames a major portion of the roof was destroyed. Damage was estimated at \$300.

Elm Leaf Beetle Spraying Campaign Of City Nears End

The third annual campaign in Portland against the elm leaf beetle, begun this season on May 5 by A. W. Nussebaumer, city arboriculturist, will be concluded within the next 10 days. During much of this time a double shift has been working, running the spraying equipment 16 hours a day. The leaves of the elm trees are sprayed with a solution of arsenate of lead and the results are said to have been highly successful. More than 10,000 trees have been sprayed this season on street parkings, in city parks, and in some instances on private property. In the latter cases the property owners will be billed for the expense.

Missing Wenatchee Broker Discovered

Wenatchee, Wash., July 28.—Harry Benteen, missing fruit broker, who was discovered at Chico, Cal., yesterday clerking in a hotel, left Wenatchee about two years ago. Shortly after his disappearance his family left for Berkeley, where they are now residing. Benteen left this city for Portland, where he abandoned his baggage at the railroad station, C. M. Denison, real estate man, said today that Benteen was supposed to have left for California when he disappeared from here. Denison went to Chico a year ago in search of Benteen, but was unable to find him.

Mazamas Plan Trip To Vancouver Lake

Mazamas will spend Sunday at Vancouver lake, leaving Broadway and Washington streets at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. They will hike four miles to the lake, where they will camp. Swimming, boating and campfire sessions will be features, with a short hike on Sunday. Those who have signed up for the annual outing to the Three Sisters are requested especially to attend, since final instructions will be given out by the outing committee. The return will be made at 5 o'clock Sunday.

Seventh Member of Family Is Stricken

Frank Moresco, No. 804 East 29th street, head of the family where the mother and all of the six children have been victims of diphtheria, has developed a positive case of this disease, according to report made to the city health department today. The family has been kept in its own home and the character of the disease has not been so serious that the members have not been able to take care of each other. All of the other members of the family are making a good recovery.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT
Community development work was discussed at the monthly conference of the Chamber of Commerce held Thursday evening in the green room of the Oregon building. Present at the conference were members of the board of directors, members of the staff and chairmen of the various committees.

MAYOR INDORSES W. C. T. U. DRIVE TO PREVENT WAR

Mayor Baker has given his official indorsement to the movement of the Women's Christian Temperance union for a general demonstration in favor of abolition of all wars. He has issued a statement to the public in which he says:

"The people of various nations will unite in a 'No-More-War' demonstration on July 29 and 30, the purpose being to develop international sentiment in favor of eliminating the causes of such disastrous wars as that from which we are just now beginning to recover."

"It is the purpose of the people enlisted in this campaign to cause the various nations to devote to peaceful development the vast outlays of resources and funds formerly applied to preparations for war."

"Disarmament by all nations and not solely by one nation is a cause worthy of the support of all peace loving people and this is the purpose of the present international campaign."

"The people of Portland are urged to cooperate in the movement and to participate in the demonstrations which are to be held locally along with international demonstrations to create sentiment throughout the world against future wars."

URGE SPECIAL CREDIT

FOR EX-SERVICE MEN
The municipal civil service board went on record Thursday as being in favor of getting into the new city charter a provision authorizing the granting of special credits to ex-service men when taking examinations for municipal positions. The board has arbitrarily granted a certain number

of credits to ex-service men heretofore under the heading of "experience," but it wants the legal authority, so to do. Commissioner Harvey Wells has been designated to go before the charter revision commission next Monday night to ask that this change be provided for.

CITY HALL BRIEFS

Property owners within the assessment district for the extension of 75th street southeast, from 40th to 45th avenues southeast, were notified by City Auditor Funk today that the total assessment of \$242,850 is now due and payable. Unpaid assessments will become delinquent and bear interest after August 5, and if not paid by August 27, the delinquent properties will be sold by the city.

Richard C. Lee, a former newspaper man of Portland, but for a long time past connected with the license department of the city, has been granted a six months' leave of absence by the city council because of his continued ill health.

Out of the hard earned money which the taxpayers turn into the city coffers comes \$250 for the purchase of narcotics. How come? The purpose is to obtain evidence to convict violators of the anti-narcotic ordinance. The city council has just made this appropriation for the police department. H. L. Stanton, former member of the police department, who was dismissed for intoxication, applied to the civil service board Thursday for reinstatement. The board declared it had no authority to reinstate him.

There are eight vacancies in the corps of topographical draftsmen at the city hall, and just eight men took the civil service examination for this position held this week. Because of the need of men the board waived the requirement of six months' residence in Portland.

CONVICTED; FINED \$250

After a visit to the premises, it took the second jury in the case of Bramlett Jaynes, charged with manufacturing moonshine, only 10 minutes to return a verdict on which the first jury, after being out all one night, could not agree. A verdict of guilty was rendered and Jaynes was fined \$250. His place of operation was at 14th and Pettysgrove streets.

Permits to Build Fires Should Be Had From Rangers

Permits to build campfires in the national forests of Oregon should be obtained from the local ranger or supervisor, and not from the Portland district office of the United States forest service.

Since the adoption of the campfire permit regulation, the office of the Oregon national forest, which comprises the Mount Hood region alone, has been besieged by requests for permits for fires all over Oregon. Persons going to Crater Lake, on the McKenna river or on the Rogue, have gone to the Oregon forest office, confusing the name of one particular forest with those of the entire state.

"We can only issue permits for campfires in the Mount Hood region," said M. V. Livingston, senior clerk, in the office this morning, "but even these had better be obtained from the rangers at Zig Zag, Estacada, Cascade Locks, and other points where rangers are stationed, since it enables the ranger to know just who is in the forest."

PROFESSOR MAUER GUEST

City Engineer Laursgaard has had as his guests this week Professor E. R. Maurer of the University of Wisconsin, Wis., and wife. They were taken over the Columbia highway and shown points of scenic beauty in Portland. Professor Maurer holds the chair of mechanics and hydraulics in the University of Wisconsin, and Laursgaard was a student under his instructions 20 years ago.
