Warning to Housewives—Housewives of Portland were warned by the Better Business bureau of the Portland Ad club and by the Chamber of Commerce today against house to house salesmen of silk hosiery, who falsely claim endorsement of the two bodies mentioned. The method used by the salesmen is to insert the point of a finger nail file between two of the threads and draw the file quickly from heel to top. This test, because the point is smooth, demonstrates little as to the quality of the stocking, declares the Better Business bureau. Any good stocking will withstand the same test. Several complaints have been received from dissatisfied customers and these are under investigation by the bureau.
