Purse Seiners to Face Prosecution

Scoffin's Candy Shop to Move Into Larger Quarters

Scoffin's Chocolate Shop, located for 10 years in the Wilcox building, on Washington, near Sixth, will be moved about August 15 to the building at the southwest corner of Tenth and Morrison streets, according to announcement made today by C. J. Scoffin, owner of the enterprise. The relocation will give the shop four times the floor space now occupied, and the move was made necessary by the increasing demand for the firm's output, Scoffin stated.

The building at Tenth and Morrison is owned by the Corbett heirs and a three-year lease was handled by Leon Buller of the P. E. Taylor company. Alterations, including the installation of a kitchen and restaurant equipment, will be made at a cost of \$20,000. Day and night shifts would be employed, according to Scoffin, and the remodeling during the next two weeks.

DEPUTY J. F. ROY NOT INDICTED ON MURDER CHARGE

Lack of evidence to sustain the charge of murder in the first degree against J. F. Roy, deputy sheriff from Clackamas county, who shot and killed Stewart Johnson during a fight in a Chinese noodle house at Fourth and Everett streets Monday night, resulted today in a not true bill which was returned by the Multnomah county grand jury to Presiding Judge Tucker. Ten men were indicted under true bills returned at the same time.

Roy is still in the custody of county authorities pending the disposition of other charges brought against him in connection with the shooting. It is possible he may be tried on lesser charges as a result of the action of the grand jury in dismissing the charge of murder in the second degree.

Johnson is alleged to have entered the restaurant in a drunken condition and started fighting using abusive language. When Roy remonstrated he, precipitating a fight which forced Roy to draw his revolver in self-protection. Roy said he fired to frighten the man, but in the struggle the shot penetrated Johnson's abdomen. He died the next day at St. Vincent's hospital.

Joseph H. McLane, Arthur A. Stevens and Ernest F. Long were charged in two joint indictments with robbery and being armed with a dangerous weapon, and with robbery by force and violence. They are alleged to have held up and robbed W. H. Roy of \$7.50, July 11, and to have used force and violence to rob Miss Frances Clark of \$85, July 4.

Other indictments returned were: Andrew Kinney, on a charge of forgery a money order for \$50; John Smiltzer, on charges of forgery in two counts, involving a \$50 check and a \$25 check; Earl McKenzie, alias Earl Foreythe and John Watson, alias Andy Ingram, on charges of burglary,

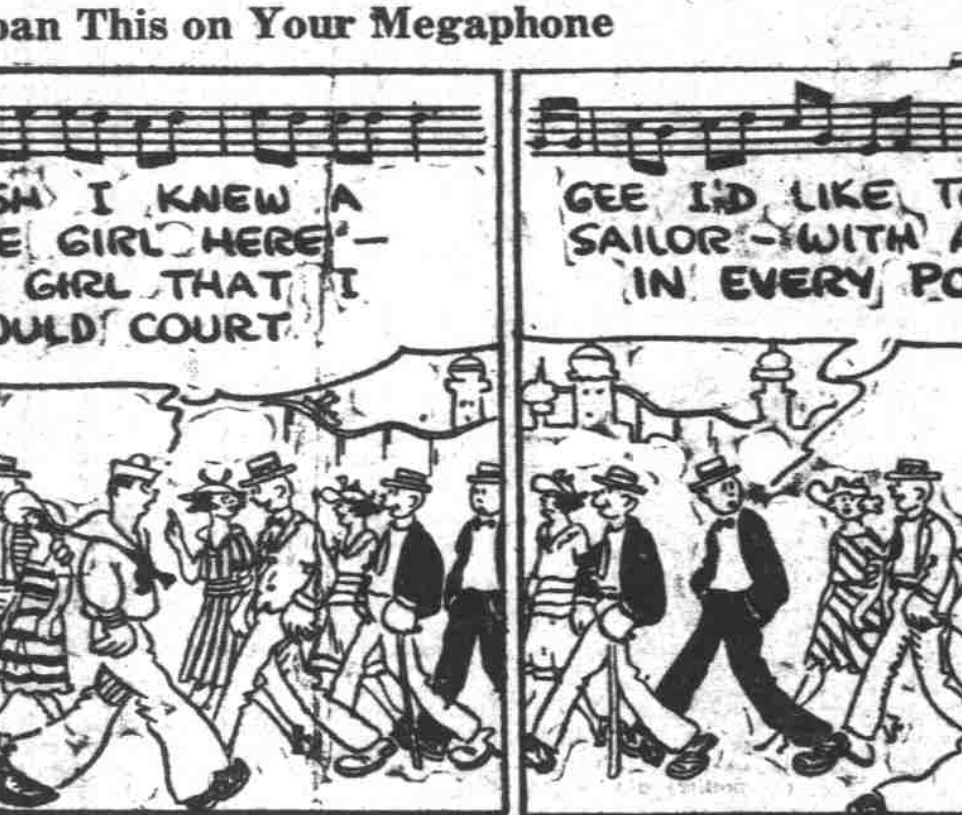
Two Convicted in Counterfeit Case Before Wolverton

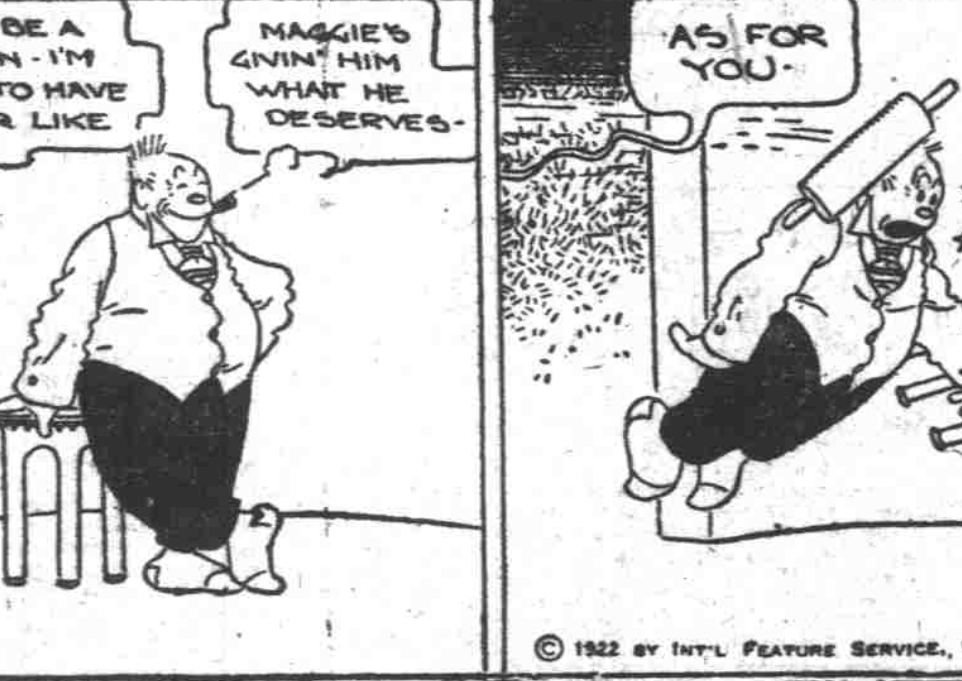

The date for the wedding is set for August 8, the advices stated.

Mrs. Hawley is now in San Francisco, having left Portland about the first of July to visit friends for a few weeks.

Father Sues for \$2500 for Boy's Injury to Finger

Exposed mechanism in a coffee grinder which injured 6-year-old Karl Hartman to insert his hand just as the grinder was being started, causing the end of one finger, is cited in a damage suit filed in circuit court today by Charles Hartman, the boy's father, against the International Sales & Produce Co.

Hartman asks for \$2500 damages. The complaint alleges the boy was permanently disabled by the injury when he was with his stepmother in the store April 30, when the accident happened. The complaint charges negligence in leaving the mechanism exposed.

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
