

POLICE REDUCE MOTOR ACCIDENTS

Results of the campaign against traffic law violators launched by Lieutenant Frank Ervin of the police motorcycle squad were shown in a report issued Monday by Ervin.

During the week of July 16-22 inclusive, during which no special efforts were made to check offenders, there were 297 traffic accidents in the city. During the following week, when Lieutenant Ervin's men were attacking violators from all angles, only 214 accidents were reported, a decrease of 83 from the foregoing week. Police records show that similar results are obtained each time an intensive campaign is carried out by the motorcycle men.

Lieutenant Ervin's report shows there were 485 arrests made during July netting \$2,480 in fines. Jail sentences amounting to 207 days were levied against offenders arrested by the six members of the squad.

Patrolmen Kelley led the list in the number of arrests and fines obtained with 145 being taken into custody resulting in \$803 in fines. Patrolman Shaylor was second with 127 arrests and fines of \$644. Patrolman Glasgwyn, who was injured last week, obtained jail sentences amounting 185 days, which was the record for the month.

Big Salmon Hauls Reported Monday In Lower River

Astoria, Aug. 1.—Fishing showed a vast improvement in the catch of Chinook salmon in the lower Columbia district Monday. One catch was reported to be 85 salmon, weighing more than 2500 pounds. Other catches were reported to have ranged between 500 and 1700 pounds.

Many fishermen are of the opinion that the catch Sunday night was the best thus far this year.

Last year 60 per cent of the pack was caught in the month of August and if the present run continues good there is hope that the same will be true again. The fish taken Sunday night were of a high quality and of average size.

Victim of Traffic Mishap Identified

Salem, Aug. 1.—A stranger, 65 years of age, who died at a local hospital July 24 from injuries received the night previous when he was struck while on the Pacific highway near Gervais by an automobile driven by O. M. Pulley of New Era, Monday was identified by a nephew as W. H. Copeland, a former resident of Vancouver, Wash.

CONSIDER MAKING BEER PAY BONUS

Washington, Aug. 5.—An amendment to the soldier bonus bill authorizing the making of 3 per cent beer and subjecting it to a tax sufficient to raise the amount of the bonus is being seriously considered in the senate, it became known today.

Senator Calder of New York announced that he has been studying the question and may offer such an amendment when the bonus bill comes before the senate for consideration.

The senator pointed to the recent polls on the beer and wine question as evidence that such a change in the Volstead law might be popular throughout the country.

Roseburg, Aug. 1.—Many forest fires are reported in Douglas county, and the situation is rapidly becoming worse, according to the Douglas county fire patrol. The largest fire is burning over 30 acres of timber on Olman creek, near Oakland, and is not yet under control. There are many other fires, all small.

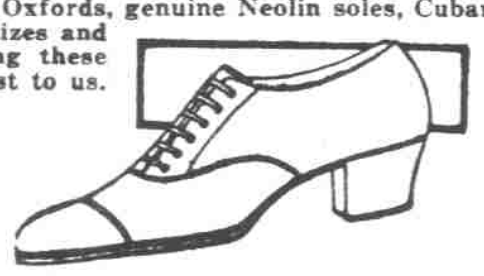

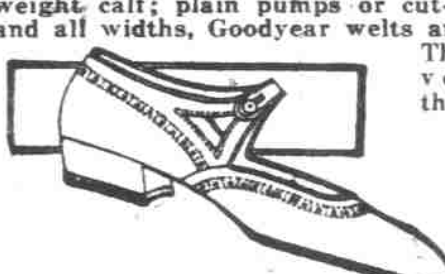

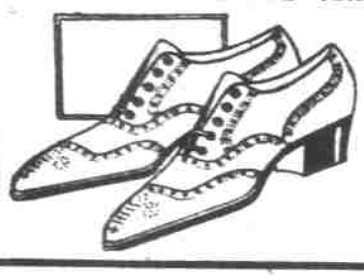
