Albany, Or., Aug. 2. — August 1 marked the end of the first July in Linn county's history without rain, according to the report of U. Weather Observer F. M. French at Albany. The observer's records show that no rain has fallen in Albany for 52 days, or since June 9, when .04 of an inch of precipitation was recorded. The maximum temperature of the month was 101 degrees above zero, on July 2. During the month all days were recorded as clear but five, and these five were only partly cloudy.
