Camp Lewis, Wash., Aug. 2.—America's future defenders, 572 strong, commenced Monday at the citizens' milltary training camp to learn the rudi-ments of fighting. They have come here from nearly every city and ham-let in the states of Oregon and Washington and are, for the most part, young men between the ages of 17 and 20. They arrived July 27 and will re-

main until August 25.

The war department has provided for a generous ration allowance and the men are receiving a variety of food and plenty of it. Fruits and green vegetables are on every menu. Experienced regular army mess sergeants are doing their best to duplicate mother's cooking.

Four chaplains have been assigned to the camp, and they are looking after the morals and spiritual welfare of the men. They also assist in working out the extensive athletic and entertainment programs.

Athletics will be mixed up generously with the drill program. A part of each afternoon will be devoted to athletics, excepting Saturdays and Sundays. Baseball teams are being or-ganized in each of the seven companies, and a C. M. T. C. league will be established. An all-C. M. T. C. team will be selected and will represent the camp against regular army teams at

ROUTINE OF DAY The schedule calls for drill in the mornings. Reveille sounds at 6:30 every morning except Sunday, when 00 more minutes are allowed for slumbering. The men are all in bed at 10:30 in the evening. Afternoons are devoted for the most part to athletics, conferences and ceremonies.

The students are divided into three courses, Red. White and Blue, depending on their prior military training.
