Five months are yet available to harbor shipping men for establishing a new record in lumber export. Of the 36 ships clearing from the harbor during July, 24 went to Call-fornia ports with 24,000,000 feet, 3 for the Orient with 3,725,445 feet, 7 vessels laden with 15,827,291 feet cleared for the East coast, and 2 went to Hawaii with 1,827,291 feet. The big freighters calling here during the month brought the total of steel ships of 2500 tons and over, calling during the year, to 81.


