

FASHION SHOW AND ROARING CAMP ARE BIGGEST EVENTS

The two most lavish entertainments of Buyers' week, which opened on Monday morning to last until Saturday afternoon, and which is expected to bring 2000 buyers from Portland's trading territory to the city, will be in remarkable and striking contrast to each other.

The order in which they come is also intended to heighten their startling opposites. The first will be the Roaring Camp entertainment at The Auditorium, Tuesday night, and the other will be the fashion show at the same place the following night.

At the first the customs and costumes of '49 in a mining camp will be worn. The second will be a revue of the very latest modes on living models. The fashions of Paris and New York, the cloth and dresses being worn by leaders of society on the continent, will be shown in vivid contrast to the attire of the Old West.

For Roaring camp, the entire basement of The Auditorium will be requisitioned. There will be gambling dens, saloons, jails, general stores, dance halls, miners, cowpunchers and a riot of action. The women will not be admitted during the early hours and men will be admitted only if they are able to produce both badges and tickets. There are things that will happen, but they can't be told. However, it may be said that the vaudeville to be staged for the men is something that shouldn't be missed.

The women will be admitted later and there will be dancing. During the early hours, the women will be at a theatre party and organ recital arranged for them in one of the uptown theatres.

Among the features of the fashion show the next night will be a display of Paris fashions by Lipman, Wolfe & Co., who will have six models at-

tired in the very latest. The fashions of the United States Rubber company will have a bench scene, with bathing girls and everything.

Meier & Frank company is to have a living model draped and redraped on the platform in uncut cloth of fabulous value. For each of these acts and others that are to be staged, extensive special scenery has been made, and some of the scenes will show the most artistic and latest methods of display.

One Dead, Another Dying, Six Injured In Auto Accident

Seattle, Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—As a result of automobile accidents in and around Seattle yesterday one man is dead, a 7-year-old boy is near death, and six others are suffering from more or less serious injuries.

Jack Bedeker, driver of a car that figured in one of the crashes, was held by police today on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

John Pauls, 61, King county road supervisor, dead; Guste Kireson, 7, fractured skull, dying; Mr. and Mrs. George Munter cut and bruised; Mr. and Mrs. Michael F. Vena cut and bruised; A. W. Schuelke, scalp wound; Peter Tetting, 40, broken leg and bruises.

Oxygen Is Given Lord Northcliffe

London, Aug. 8.—(I. N. S.)—Lord Northcliffe, noted British publisher, who is ill of a heart affliction, was weaker early today. It was reported that oxygen has been administered. The attending specialists would say nothing beyond the fact that the patient is in a serious condition.

Although the one-cent-a-mile rate has not been granted as yet, members of the national transportation are of the opinion that the same courtesies extended by the railroads last year during the Kansas City convalescence will be in vogue during the 1922 sessions.

Wife Ready to Die, So Husband Says He Ended Her Life

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 8.—(I. N. S.)—"I killed my wife because she was prepared for salvation. We both thought it was time to do it; that if she continued to live she would do something wrong and be lost. I have no remorse. When I killed her I felt something in me which said that I had done right."

This was the statement made this morning to the police by W. W. Jorganson, 40, who yesterday shot and killed his wife, Mrs. Elsie Jorganson, 30. Notes to his wife written by Jorganson and the story of the deed have led the police to believe that he is insane.

In his story he said his wife was guilty of misconduct last year while he was in Idaho. She had later repented and tried to commit suicide several times. They had talked the

matter over and he had suggested that if she should die while repentant she would be saved. He said his wife had agreed to die by his hand.

"We went to sleep about 9:30 last night," he said. "At 12 o'clock I awoke and decided to kill her."

Jorganson said he married her in Richfield, Utah, in 1919 and that her maiden name was Elsie Rosenthal and that she was a native of Fond du Lac, Wis., where her family is at present.

Woman Who Lived In Poverty Leaves \$1200 in Drawer

Santa Rosa, Cal., Aug. 8.—(I. N. S.) A few days ago Mrs. Mary Mell, 80, died after having lived for years in poverty. Her last days were eased by ministrations of Mrs. E. A. Wilburne, who, for many years, had befriended her. Mrs. Mell left a will bequeathing to Mrs. Wilburne her earthly possessions, which were believed to consist only of a few pieces of time-worn furniture.

Today Mrs. Wilburne went to the humble cottage and found in a drawer a heavy bag. It was found to contain gold and silver aggregating more than \$1200.

Court Order Stays Hecker's Execution

Oregon City, Aug. 8.—Execution of Russell Hecker, 24, convicted slayer of Frank Bowker, was stayed by formal order issued by the trial judge, J. U. Campbell, pending an appeal to the supreme court, formal notice for which was filed by Hecker's three attorneys. Hecker was sentenced to hang September 22. He is quartered in "murderer's row" in the state penitentiary. Hecker's attorneys had been given until September 5 to complete their bill of exceptions.

Hecker was convicted July 5 of murdering Frank Bowker, Portland musician, on Easter Sunday. He pleaded self defense.

Fall of Manila To Be Celebrated In Park Sunday

General order No. 123-321 reads in part: Bring your families to the beautiful Laurelhurst park next Sunday and let's all get acquainted. Also bring the baskets well filled. The picnic dinner is scheduled for 6 o'clock p. m., but come early in the afternoon prepared to have a big time."

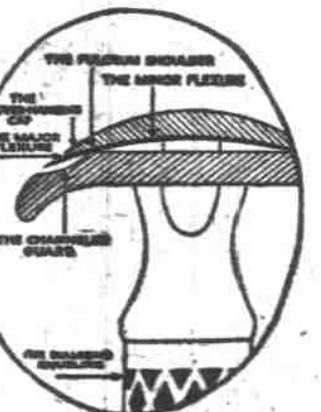
