

G. O. P. CAMPAIGN VEERS; WILL SEEK VOTE OF FARMERS

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Washington, Aug. 10.—As a result of the defection of strong Republican influences from the party in the East, first manifested in attacks upon congress for its tax bill, now aimed at congress for its tariff bill and meantime centering also on President Harding for attempting settlement of the rail strike, complete changes have been made in the party's plans for the fall campaign.

Because of belief that the press and influential interests bearing congress along the Eastern seaboard have combined to make the defeat of many Republican congressmen and some senators virtually certain in this section, the Republican campaign this fall will be directed mainly at the agricultural states of the Middle and Far West.

Following will be the big talking points of the G. O. P. spellbinders:

1. The emergency and permanent tariffs: the first of which they will seek to show has increased prices to the farmer, while the cost of living generally has gone down. The permanent bill is now under sharp attack as well by Democratic newspapers in the East.
2. The farm credits act, which has resulted in extension of credits to agriculture producers in sums never equalled before; this act also has been severely criticized by Eastern banking interests.
3. The packers control bill, designed to meet the wishes of farmers, but which was fought in congress by powerful interests, including many in the East.
4. The arms conference work because of the strong sentiment in the Middle and Far West for peace. The result of the arms conference treaties has been to curtail work in shipyards, reduce naval base outlays and otherwise hurt business interests along the Eastern seaboard particularly.

WEST FIGHTING GROUND
The attitude of many leaders in the Republican party today is to let the Eastern influences who have been hammering the party work in congress and in the White House in their own juice, the big campaign, they say, will be in the West, where already the farmer has learned the value of organizing has become a dominant figure in legislative affairs and will be increasingly so after the next elections.

Republicans can lose only 81 members in the lower branch of congress and still retain control. Including Ohio and westward through the states, 49 seats out of these 81 which are now held by Democrats after either the 1916 or the 1918 elections or both, and were wrested away by the Republican landslide of 1920.

HARD BATTLE PLANNED
Because of the losses threatened both in the house and senate in Eastern states, Republican managers are going to make their big drive to hold these gains and attempt the ousting of Democratic incumbents in all of the Western states. This is the more important, they say, because in the East there are 23 seats now held by Republicans, which after the 1916 or 1918 elections or both, were held by Democrats. These include eight districts in New York, four in Pennsylvania,

four in New Jersey, three in Massachusetts, two in Maryland and one each in Rhode Island and Connecticut.

The house is the great Republican concern now. And if present Republican plans carry through will be every likelihood of the West dominating the party's policies after the fall elections. This, as some Republican leaders claim, will be a fitting rebuke for the Eastern influences whose defections are still interested in home life in spite of flapperdom. Los Angeles, Aug. 10.—(U. P.)—"Big Bill" Hart, two-listed, two-gun man of the movies, has separated from his wife, Winifred Westover, who called him her "cream puff" when they were married last December.

Hailed as one of the real love matches of the celluloid world, it became known today the romance was blasted three months ago, when Bill went back to sister, and Winifred to mother.

The man from the flickering bad lands played true to the role in which he is worshiped by millions of boys in America when he said concerning his charges: "I can now appreciate the feeling of a man accused of murder, and I know in his heart and soul he is innocent." Big Bill fumbled his hat with embarrassment when approached concerning the marital mishap.

Mystery surrounds the charges that Mrs. Hart, herself an actress, has confided to her attorneys and closest friends. She is quoted as saying that, in spite of the fact that she expects to become a mother in September, she could no longer stand life with Hart.

Hart said he had made ample provision for the support of his wife.

"Mrs. Hart and myself separated three months ago," he said in a statement issued by his attorneys, "and a few days later property contracts were executed making ample provision for her maintenance as well as for our unborn child. Whether she contemplates divorce proceedings or not I have no knowledge."

Man Accused of Threat to Kill Gives Himself Up

Kingman, Charged With Mail Robbery, Held for Colorado

J. C. Kingman, charged with robbing the mails at Arapahoe, Colo., on June 7 of 17 letters containing drafts and money orders, was brought to Portland from Roseburg Wednesday night by Deputy United States Marshal Lee Morelock, to await action of the federal court. United States Attorney Humphreys announced today that he would present the petition of Colorado officials for a removal order as soon as the court convenes.

Kingman was arrested several weeks ago by Douglas county authorities, for the alleged robbery of the Southern Pacific depot at Willburg, Or. After blood stains were found on an automobile he was driving, the theory was advanced that he might know something about the murder of an unidentified man near The Dalles on June 30. Later investigation has failed to connect Kingman with the crime. Wasco county officials apparently did not care to have Kingman held in the state for further investigation.

NEW SUIT IS FILED IN PRINTING FIRM DISPUTE
Mrs. Ocean Jolly, who has been contending with E. A. Ratelle through the court here for the control of the Jolly-Ratelle Printing company, filed another cause for action today. The suit is a new complaint that the court order her to be restored as secretary, treasurer and director of the firm.

The charges a secret meeting was held and she was relieved without cause from three executive positions while successors were elected to fill the vacancies. The new complaint is filed against R. W. Otto, the present secretary, and requests the court to order him to return to her all property of the company pertaining to the duties of that office. Ratelle claims she transferred her stock to Joe Loeb, and thereby forfeited her offices in the company.

Relief From Car Shortage in Sight, Rail Official Says
Relief from the car shortage which has been handicapping shippers dependent upon the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, S. P. & S. Oregon Trunk and Oregon Electric lines was in prospect today, in the opinion of W. D. Skinner, vice president and traffic manager of the S. P. & S. system lines, who was advised of improved car deliveries to the Northwest.

Skinner received reports that cars for delivery to grain shippers in the Inland Empire were increasing in volume and that these cars soon would be en route to Western Oregon and Western Washington for unloading and delivery to shippers in this territory. Advice also was received from the East that more cars would soon be en route from the East. The Union Pacific reported a heavier receipt of cars from the East and reported conditions on the Union Pacific lines in Oregon about the same as earlier in the week.

Farmer Takes Own Life After Sending Note to Ex-Wife
Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 10.—Dependancy over family troubles is believed to have been the cause of the suicide of John William Wells, 36, who shot himself dead Wednesday while in the barn at his farm three miles south of the evening.

Early in the day Wells sent a note to the former wife, who lived in the neighborhood, saying that he was going to end his life and asking her to arrange to care for the stock and fruit on the place. Mrs. Wells turned the note over to her attorney, U. B. Apperson of Ridgefield, who telephoned to Sheriff Thompson of the threat.

The sheriff and a deputy went to the Wells farm, arriving at 6 o'clock in the evening. According to Sheriff Thompson, Wells was in the barn when he reached the place. After talking with Wells, Thompson went to telephone Wells' brother to come and look after him. When he returned, he found Wells dead. The body is at Limber's parlors. His divorced wife, four children, six brothers and one sister survive.

No inquest will be held, the coroner's office decided.

British Cabinet Rejects Plan of Premier Poincare
London, Aug. 10.—(I. N. S.)—The British cabinet this afternoon rejected Premier Poincare's proposals for the economic rehabilitation of Europe being considered at the economic conference.

There was a full attendance of cabinet members. Colonial Secretary Churchill flew from Paris by airplane to be present. After the meeting the ministers were pessimistic.

Counter-proposals to take the place of the program of Premier Poincare, with its "productive forfeits," were discussed at length. It was generally agreed the conference would not escape collapse unless the French indemnity program was modified.

Paris, Aug. 10.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Poincare's uncompromising policy of "productive forfeits" against Germany, which is under consideration by the interallied indemnity conference in London, was approved by the French cabinet today.

Laughter Halts Los Angeles Trial Of Ku Klux Klan
Los Angeles, Aug. 10.—(U. P.)—Disruption in the proceedings of the trial of 37 alleged members of the Ku Klux Klan was precipitated today by laughter and disturbances among the courtroom spectators.

Judge Houser, following a prolonged burst of laughter, ordered the courtroom cleared, and in the scene that followed contempt proceedings loomed as attorneys for both sides protested interruptions.

Fidel Eilduayan, Spanish resident of Inglewood, whose horse was said to have been invaded by masked men, was on hand under cross examination at the time.

Unshaken by the insistent questions of the defense counsel, he adhered to his testimony. He spoke through an interpreter.
