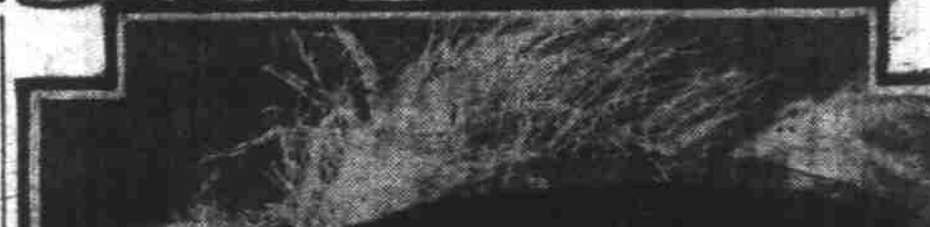
Mrs. Callahan Visits Portland On Way Home
