

PORTLAND BEAVERS MARSHING COAST

Tigers Grab
12-Inning
Victory, 5-4

VERNON triumphed over the Beavers in a thrilling and sensational 12-inning contest on the Vaughn street grounds Saturday afternoon, 5 to 4. The game was the first of a scheduled doubleheader, but the second game was called at the end of two and one half innings on account of a heavy rain, the Tigers leading at the time by the same count that was hung up in the first battle.

The first game was one of the most sensational of the season. The Tigers got away to a two runs lead in the first inning on a walk and three scratch hits, and held a one run advantage until the eighth inning, when Charley High, batting for Emmett McCann, cracked one over the right field wall.

MAT HALTS 'EM
It was a battle from then until the 12th when the Beavers went haywire in fielding, and the Tigers chased three runs over the plate. The Beavers came within one run of tying the count again, although it was up to Jakey May, who relieved "Weiser" Dell in the 11th, to halt the Beavers. Portland had wonderful opportunity to put the game on the winning side of the ledger in the 11th inning when Walter Levens, who opposed Dell in a pitching battle that lasted 10 innings, singled over second and advanced to third on Dell's wide leg to first and a crowd of 100 on him.

GREAT PLAYS MADE
The fans witnessed some wonderful fielding throughout the entire game. In the eighth inning when Schneider on second, Brazill speared a line drive from Smith's bat and down to Pedro off second and in the ninth Chet Chadbourne robbed Cox of a sure double making a running one-hand catch of a long drive from Cox's bat. Ike Woffler made a catch off the left field end of the grandstand of a foul from Schneider's bat in the 11th inning.

Levens and Dell pitched great ball until after the 10th inning. The Beavers' hurler did not allow a single hit in the first nine innings. Dell allowed the Beavers five hits in nine innings.

Manager Demaree threw every possible substitute into the game in an effort to win the game, even using Jimmy Middleton as a pinch hitter for Sargent. Sargent was added with a single that scored a run.

GET EARLY LEAD
The Tigers got away with two runs in the first inning on some scratchy hits. With two down, Smith walked and advanced on Dell's error. Levens and McCann's error. Locker singled to center, scoring Smith and Bodie. Zeider singled, but French ended the inning by striking out.

Portland scored its first run in the second on Poole's double and Brazill's single and McCann's sacrifice fly. High's pinch homer in the eighth tied the count and Charley collected enough to pay his meals for a few days as the result of his smash. In the 11th Smith singled to right and went to third on Bodie's double to left field. On a mixup in signals, Smith was caught between second and third and home, which pulled the Beavers out of a bad spot, as Zeider forced Locker, who had walked, at second for the final out.

Levens did not possibly could to win his own game when he singled over second and advanced to the middle station when Dell, thinking Levens started off first, threw the ball to Locker, who was in no position to recover the ball. Harold Hatton
Is Winner of
MarathonSwim

TOUCHING the finishing float at least 150 feet ahead of his nearest rival, Harold Hatton of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club won the annual Willamette river marathon swim Saturday afternoon. The Winged "M" wearer took the lead from the start at Windemuth baths and he never was headed. His time was 33 minutes 17.5 seconds for the one and one half mile course, which ended at the Favorite bathhouse at the foot of the west approach of the Morrison bridge.

The race last year was won by Miltie Konowloff of Seattle and at that time he established a mark of 36 minutes. The course this year was about 100 feet shorter than the 1921 race and Hatton was in line to break the Seattle merman's efforts by at least two minutes.

Jimmy Egan of the Portland Natatorium finished second 50 yards to the rear, while Ted Alonen of Multnomah was about 100 feet behind Egan. Both honors went to Alvin Kallunki of the Portland Nat, fifth place was won by Rudolph Kempf, also of the Nat, and Otto Ehrensperger, the only unattached swimmer, came in sixth about 250 yards following Hatton.

Gordon Cunningham of the Portland Nat was within 100 feet of the finish when he suffered a cramp in his left leg and he was forced to climb aboard the harbor patrol which was trolling the course.

A remarkable part of the whole race was the performance of Kempf, who used the breast stroke over the entire distance. He seemed to be getting stronger at the finish, in fact none of the contestants saw Cunningham seemed any the worse for the experience. The race was held while several showers were on and it was necessary to postpone the annual women's outdoor city championship events. Both the men's and women's swimming events will be held at Windemuth Saturday afternoon, according to an announcement made by C. F. Werner, in charge.

Louis "Happy" Kuehn, world's Olympic diving champion and Gus "Slim" Carroll, both of Multnomah club, gave an exhibition of fancy diving just before the race ended. The two divers, who were guard rail of the Morrison bridge as a springboard, Kuehn said that it wasn't the water which seemed cold but it was the air. Both Kuehn and Carroll were given much applause for their feats.

SAN MATEO, Cal., Aug. 12.—(U. P.) Construction at Tanforan is going rapidly forward, and plans are under way to make the grounds especially attractive.

Beavers' Enemies Are at Work
Seek to Reopen "Kenny" Case

HAS the Portland baseball club rubbed the fur the wrong way in the Kenworthy case?

Indications are such following the receipt of a telegram from Judge Landis in reply to a message dispatched by The Journal.

Landis' answer was as follows: "Unable to express opinion until matter is presented."

There's no doubt that some of the Pacific Coast league magnates are calling the attention of the high commissioner of baseball to the fact that Kenworthy has been resigned by SEATTLE'S VIEWS.

Whether this is contrary to the orders of the high commissioner of baseball, was not revealed in reply to The Journal's query, but nevertheless the fact that Landis declared he would "express no opinion until matter is presented" gives a hint that something may break and the Kenworthy end of the controversy will be reopened again.

Kenworthy is still the "goat" in the case. He will also be the "goat" while, as a matter of fact, the conditions which surround the case were not created by Kenworthy, although it is admitted that he had a hand in the matter.

Under baseball laws, a free agent can sign with any club that he sees fit. Kenworthy is no different than any other free agent, even though he is disqualified in the Coast league until the season of 1924.

It is the opinion of some baseball men here that Kenworthy could take his end of the case in the civil courts and win a verdict.

Portland has enemies in the Pacific Coast league. This was brought out clearly by the action of Judge Landis in the Al Demaree case.

The quickest and best way to bring about harmony in the Pacific Coast league is the election of a new president. The conditions under which the league is operating at the present time are detrimental to the best interests of the sport and the sooner the change is made the better for baseball on the Pacific coast.

B.C. Lacrosse
Title to Be
Decided Here

PORTLAND'S sport-loving public will have an opportunity to witness what is considered the world's greatest game, in which human endurance and speed are the main factors, next Sunday on the Vaughn street baseball grounds, when the Victoria, B. C., and Vancouver, B. C., teams line up in the final and deciding game of the 1922 season of the British Columbia Lacrosse association.

Lacrosse is a sport which is fast gaining favor in Eastern college circles. Harvard and Yale having adopted the sport. It's a game where endurance is tested, and one in which spectators get thrills a-plenty.

REGULAR LEAGUE GAME
This will be the first lacrosse game played in Portland for many years and it is expected to create considerable interest among the fans. Bobby Rowe, a member of the Seattle Hockey team, and Charles E. Burnett, who managed the Foundation team of Victoria, B. C., at the time the Victorians won the championship in 1919, are responsible for the staging of the contest.

E. Taylor, secretary of the British Columbia Lacrosse association, stated in a letter to Burnett "You have the privilege of advertising the game as a regular scheduled association contest." The two clubs played off the drawn game of a week ago Saturday yesterday in Victoria. The score of that game was 1 to 1, something unusual in hockey, but from reports from the British Columbia towns indicate that the teams are very evenly matched.

FAST PLAYERS ON TEAMS
Included in the line-ups of the two clubs are some of the greatest amateur players in the world, in fact that amateur player has it over the professional stars and their games are more keenly contested.

Dr. Angus McInnis, a graduate of the North Pacific Dental college of Portland, is another player kneeling on the south side of the third base line. The playing field will be about 250 feet long. There is no width to the width of the field, although most of the play is confined to an area of fifty feet on either side of the center line. Play is started in the center of the field and the players are kneeling on one knee and their sticks on the ground. The ball, which is made of hard rubber and about the size of a tennis ball is placed between the two sticks of the referee.

FOUR PERIODS IN THE GAME
There are four periods of twenty minutes each in a game. There is a five minute rest between the first and second and the third and fourth periods and a ten minute rest at half time.

Penalties are inflicted by the referee for cross checking above the shoulders, for tripping, and for unnecessary roughness in body checking. Inflation of penalties is up to the discretion of the referee.

The web sticks used by the players very in length from four to four feet six inches. The players throw the ball with the same accuracy as a baseball is thrown.

The speed of the game comes when a player breaks away from his opponent.

With a number of Canadians in Portland, it is expected that much enthusiasm will be created in the contest.

The Victoria team, present holders of the \$1500 gold trophy, placed in competition ten years ago by Sir Donald Mann, president of the Canadian Northern Railway, has held the trophy for the past three years. Since placed in competition, the Victoria, Vancouver and New Westminster teams have held the cup eight years.

CHANGES OF Charley White, crack Chicago lightweight, showing his boxing wares in Portland on Labor day are brighter than ever. White has shown a willingness to cut his first estimate of the worth of his service, and his latest tentative offer is more in keeping with the boxing commission's views of the monetary value of the Labor day event.

In fact, the only thing which now seems in the way of White's coming to Portland is his prospect of a Labor day match with Champion Benny Leonard. He has wired the commission that he will know within a few days if the Leonard match is on. Should it fall through for Labor day and not be held until October, as seems likely, it is almost a certainty that White will come to Portland to box either Jimmy Sacco or Jack Josephs, providing the latter can and will post a forfeit to make the proper weight.

At any rate, the commission expects to know early next week whether it can proceed with its proposal for a big open-air Labor day show with White as one of the principals. It is the belief that White, with a fit opponent to draw him out, could pack the baseball park.
