

EDGE LAW BANK PROPOSED FOR PACIFIC COAST

Formation of the "Federal Pacific Banking Corporation" as a capitalization of \$2,000,000 to operate under the Edge law passed by congress in June is being projected by Crawford Morrison Bishop of the War-Finance Corporation, who is in Portland today. Plans for the corporation have been laid before bankers and Chamber of Commerce officials of the coast for the first time in Portland, even though Bishop and his associates have chosen San Francisco for the headquarters of the organization with branches in other coast cities.

Charles James Fox, attorney and business organizer of China, will come to Portland in a few days to further discuss the project with Portland business men, according to advice received by the Chamber of Commerce from Bishop.

Edge law banks are authorized to act as fiscal agents and depositories of the government in its financial relations with foreign governments, thus forming a part of the federal financial system. Bishop said that the establishment of such a bank would assist to a tremendous degree in developing ports of the Pacific. "This corporation would offer to Western banks added facilities for conducting their foreign operations and direct representation in foreign countries," said Bishop. "It would assist Western manufacturers in developing foreign markets and in financing their operations, particularly where long term credits are required." The federal reserve board has been asked to authorize the capitalization of \$2,000,000 must be subscribed and one fourth paid before the corporation may be authorized to begin business.

Oregon Stockmen Optimistic; Expect Splendid Market

While the lower country is very dry, the uplands are green in the Deschutes and Ochoco national forests in Central Oregon, and stock is looking fine, says E. N. Kavanagh, assistant district forester in charge of grazing, who has just returned from an inspection of the ranges.

We expect to make more connections in the near future that will give additional variety to the trip."

Deer Season Opens Aug. 20; Ends on Oct. 31, for Oregon

Through the spreading of erroneous reports, hunters of Oregon have been considerably confused regarding the game seasons recently changed by the state game commission, according to a report issued by the commission today.

This report said that the deer season would open August 20 and continue open until October 31, with a limit of two bucks deer for the season to each hunter. The only other game which it will be lawful to kill will be grouse and native pheasants from August 20 to September 20, with a limit of five birds in one day or 10 in any consecutive days.

The season on Chinese pheasants and quail will not open until October 15, to continue until October 31. Numerous hunters have delayed their regular summer vacation until the latter part of August because of the earlier opening of the deer season this year, and the game commission reported an unprecedented number of hunters will be in the mountains Sunday for the opening day of the season.

A. N. Farmer, secretary of the hospital site selection committee, recently visited Oregon and was favorably impressed with several sites offered in the Willamette valley.

CLACKAMAS ROAD PLANS EXTENSIVE

Oregon City, Aug. 17.—The Oswego-Wilsonville road, which will give the west side a loop connection with Portland, through West Linn and over the Pacific highway on one hand and via Yamhill county and Newberg on the other, is to be one of the major improvement projects for 1933, according to D. T. Meldrum, county engineer. The work on the surveys for the coming year's program has been started.

The road is eight miles in length, extending from Oswego to Wilsonville, and of this portion three miles is either graded or under contract. Part of the survey for the remainder has been completed and work is being started on the rest of the engineering. Due to the fact that about half of the work is of hard construction, a 7 per cent grade has been allowed. The roadbed is to be 24 feet.

BONDS TO BE SOLD

Paving of the graded portion and the grading of the remainder are planned in 1933, Meldrum said, permitting completion of paving of the entire road by the following year. Much of the work will be done in cooperation with the road districts, which in the main will levy 10 mill special taxes, the money to be met by an equal amount from the general fund. Bond funds will be used for the paving.

A number of other projects are being outlined for the coming year. Approximately \$10,000 in road funds will be available and more than \$1,000,000 is still to be sold of the bond issue of 1919. The amount which will be allocated is, however, in the hands of the county court and not as yet definitely decided.

Among the surveys in progress at present for the 1933 program are:

PAVEMENT IS GOOD

Extension of the Molalla avenue road from the end of this year's contract, paving of the Damascus-Carver road north from Rock creek bridge pavement; surfacing of the Monitor-Barlow road and the paving of the Barlow road.

All of the pavement being laid in the county is 16 foot concrete of standard highway specification. The county is laying pavement virtually equal to that on the state roads, Meldrum said, the same requirements for grade and curve being observed. In some instances the grades have had to be steeper, owing to the conditions of the terrain. The standard construction has been narrower, due to lack of sufficient funds for extensive improvements. The total mileage of road in the county is about 2500, Meldrum estimates, most of it unsurfaced.

'Soused' Hens Give Clue to Still and Muck Corn Mash

Moral: Don't feed moonshine whiskey mash to your chickens unless you keep them inside the henhouse. Intoxicated hens proved the downfall of John Douflet Wednesday afternoon after prohibition agents were informed he was in the moonshining business.

Early Wednesday afternoon the federal agents inspected Douflet's place, which is on Buckley avenue, near the Bessie road, from the woods which surround his house.

Tipcy chickens cackling suspiciously over a diet of corn mash did not lighten the suspicions of the agents, after they had seen the moonshining business and obtained a sniff of the liquor-laden air.

While one agent concealed himself as a guard, the others hastened back to Portland and obtained a search warrant. Late at night they raided the house and found 100 gallons of corn mash, parts of a copper still and four large barrels.

Douflet was arrested, charged with violating the Volstead act, and in default of \$250 bond placed in the federal corridor of the Multnomah county jail. Bond was set lower than in most liquor cases at the request of Assistant United States Attorney E. J. Baughman, because Douflet has a wife and two children.

Indians Put Out by Anti-Grazing Bars

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 17.—Refusal of cattle and sheep men renting government lands for grazing purposes to allow the Indians to go on the lands and pick huckleberries, as has been the custom, brought Chief Wallabee of the Klickitats to Vancouver for the purpose of enlisting the aid of the local United States land office. The Indians go in large numbers to the huckleberry patches, taking their ponies, and the horses eat the grass, reducing the pasture for the renters. The chief is 70 and crippled with rheumatism, being compelled to use two canes in walking. He is registered at the St. Elmo hotel.

THREE FEDERAL JUDGES United States Marshal Hotchkiss was notified this morning that the three judges comprising the circuit court of appeals for this district would be in Portland about September 24, and that they would probably hold court here on September 22 or 23. This notice was given so the marshal could provide bailiffs and make other necessary arrangements for the court.

WARRANT SIGNED A warrant authorizing the United States marshal to transport Orville C. Giff from the county jail at Toledo, Or., to Portland for trial on an alleged violation of the Volstead act, was signed today by District Judge Bell, acting United States commissioner. Commissioner Frazer is on vacation. Giff was arrested in New-Port last week after he is alleged to have sold a federal prohibition agent a bottle of moonshine.

LOVE MISSILE TO GIRL TYPIST GETS WRITER IN JAIL

Charges of his pretty 18-year-old stenographer proved to be too much for a hunk of a S. Griswold, printer, No. 413 Gerlinger building, who is facing three months on the rock pile because the girl's fraternal parent found love notes and appealed to police.

In the note Griswold questioned whether his new office helper would be "friendly and sympathetic like Bessie" or "cold and unsympathetic." It developed that Bessie had formerly been a stenographer in his employ.

Bessie, according to Griswold, used to kiss him every morning when she came to work. Griswold said it tended to make a cheerful and pleasant atmosphere and helped to wipe out the drudgery of his printing office.

But after months Bessie had to quit. Griswold then employed an attractive girl who proved to be proper in every degree. Although she treated him with every degree of respect and although she was efficient, she at all times refused to kiss him. Again the drudgery of his print shop wore on Griswold and many times he thought of the pleasant mornings when Bessie would walk briskly into the office and smack him on the cheek.

Griswold did not care so much when Bessie played off so he could no longer employ the last girl. For a time business was bad. But when it again picked up he longed to find another girl like Bessie.

His advertisement in a local paper was answered by Ruth Kincart, daughter of a municipal employee. After her survey of the office Griswold loaned her a book to read in which he left his appealing note. It was not until the next day that she found the note in her book and showed it to her father.

Immediately the father appealed to police and a warrant for disorderly conduct was sworn out against Griswold. This morning Municipal Judge Ekwall sentenced him to six months on the rock pile, three months being suspended.

Griswold is 47. He is married but his wife left him some years ago. This morning in jail the printer admitted that he had done wrong and conceded his sentence was just. "But Bessie had been so nice to me I couldn't forget it," he said. "I just wanted some loving."

Committees appointed last night were threshing out a policy to road, preparatory to reports to the convention.

This morning the veterans held a public reception for Vice President Elvin Coolidge, but the afternoon and evening sessions will be devoted to business.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 17.—A two-day conference meeting of Columbia Basin Irrigation League directors, state officials and Frank M. Goodwin, assistant secretary of the interior, will be held in Olympia Friday and Saturday. Goodwin, who has made a preliminary investigation of the Columbia basin project for a report to Albert Fall, secretary of the interior, will go over data and conditions prepared by the state department of conservation and development.

Team Bolts During Storm; Driver Hurt

Goldendale, Wash., Aug. 17.—During a thunder and lightning storm that assumed the proportions of a small cloudburst Tuesday in the High Prairie section of the Klickitat wheat belt near Warlick, James Miller, harvest hand employed by Dick McCoy, wheat grower, was seriously injured when a team hitched to a header box ran away. His arm and several ribs were fractured. Bridges and culverts were washed out by the storm.

"Sucker" Supply in Oregon Is Scant; Land Scheme Nipped

J. Rufus Wallingford and his cohorts are leaving the overworked sucker fields of Texas and Oklahoma to make money grow in the untrammeled wastes of Oregon, according to reports on a number of wild schemes which have been received during the past few days by the state chamber of commerce.

The latest development project laid before the organization has all others best, said J. W. Brewer, secretary of the organization. This plan was for the formation of a company in Portland to encourage settlement in Central Oregon. This company was to purchase 120 acres of desert land in Northern Lake, Harvey or Malheur counties along the line of some mythical railroad project at a cost of about 25 cents an acre.

This company was then to advertise throughout the East and Middle West that lots of one-eighth of an acre would be given away to all applicants in the interest of development. But there was a hitch in the plan. Each lot would have a filing fee of \$3 or a total of \$24 to the acre.

The whole plan is within the law so far as Oregon statutes are concerned, but the chamber officials said that they saved themselves further trouble of discussing the project by literally throwing the get-rich-quick proposition of the plan out of the office.

The chamber officials today were planning laws to prevent other Wallingford from giving Oregon a black eye.

Uniform Course in Foreign Trade and Languages Advised

High schools of the nation should combine in an special program of instructions in languages and foreign trade forms, in the opinion of Dr. Glen Levin Swiggett, specialist in charge of commercial education of the United States bureau of education. This belief was expressed in an address delivered at a dinner in his honor at the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening.

Swiggett advocated the teaching of information to permit high school graduates to have an insight on foreign trade and said that such teachings should be made available to all students instead of left for special college students.

J. F. Elton, principal of the High School of Commerce, presided at the meeting. C. M. Bishop of the War Finance Corporation echoed the opinion of Dr. Swiggett, but said that the teaching of languages should be placed in more competent hands so that students would be able after from two to four years of study to at least know how to ask for something to eat if they ever visited a foreign country.

Warning Given of More Fire Hazards

Bad forest fire weather with continuing warmth and wet humidity until Saturday was the report to the forest service today and warnings are being sent out to the various supervisors and rangers over the district, who have been having a short breathing spell from forest fire fighting since the rains of last week. Since the rains, no new fires have been reported to the district office of the forest service, and those that have been burning have been checked, although no hope of complete extinction was held until the steady rains of autumn set in.

The Portland police were notified Thursday morning of the robbery of a garage belonging to E. J. Lawrence at Sherwood, Or. The robbery took place some time Wednesday night. The robbers, who opened the safe by working the combination, stole \$300 and an automobile belonging to Dr. Frank Rucker of Sherwood.

The trial docket will be called September 15 by Judge Stapleton, who will not be presiding judge from September 1 to January 1.

A total of 250 cases will be set for the fall term. It is estimated the entire time of the six trial judges in the circuit court will be taken up with these cases until the late spring. Circuit Judge Taswell will continue to handle probate matters and default divorces. An average of 25 default divorces have been granted each week this year.

WIDOW STARTS SUIT TO BREAK HUSBAND'S WILL

Undue influence in a suit to break the will of his brother, Will James Taylor, which was filed in the circuit court Wednesday by the widow, Pearl Taylor, Will James Taylor died here June 14, 1932. He left his household goods, except articles formerly owned by his mother, to the widow and the residue of his vast household goods and a sister, Mr. Kate Burtham. In the petition to probate the will the personal property is valued at \$500. A ranch in Alberta, Canada, is not appraised in the petition. The complaint alleges Frank Taylor evidenced an undue interest in the property and associated closely with the deceased during his last illness. The will was made one month before the death.
