

JOHNSTOWN BEER FLOOD CONTINUES; NO ARRESTS MADE

Mayor Cauffiel Stands Pat on
Order Permitting Sales in
View of Polluted City Water.

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 19.—(U. P.)—Mayor Cauffiel tonight turned the city of Johnstown into a mirage. Cauffiel, spectacular and ardent supporter of prohibition, thought there was too much bootlegging here. He couldn't interest federal agents in the edging of "home brew" and "hooch." Inspired by three worms he found in his drinking water, the mayor called on all the druggists, saloonkeepers and brewers and issued a public order that they could go ahead and make and sell cold beer, because healthy beer is better than water with worms in it.

MAYOR STANDS PAT

Cauffiel apparently stood pat on his order, for sale of beer began and federal agents, including Assistant Federal Prohibition Commissioner Davis of Philadelphia rushed to stop second "Johnstown flood."

Davis promptly "fired" O. R. Stiffler, local dry agent, and replaced him with E. Sprague, Philadelphia.

But beer with a pre-Volstead kick continued to flow over the bars tonight.

After a half-jan sale caused by an edict from federal prohibition officers, fully 80 per cent of the Johnstown hotels were again dispensing 8 per cent beer with the bars lined with three deep.

NO ARRESTS MADE

There were no arrests, police looking tolerantly on. Headquarters of a party of federal agents are deserted. All were reported out "gathering evidence."

Mayor Joseph Cauffiel refused to take the sale of beer seriously, declaring his fight for years against sale of intoxicating liquors having been won.

Federal authorities, led by Sprague, are expected to close the bars at any time.

Reports were circulated tonight that Prohibition Commissioner Jones of Washington may come here personally and direct a cleanup.

Three Presidents Meet on U. S. Ships To Settle Quarrel

Washington, Aug. 19.—The presidents of Nicaragua, Salvador and El Salvador met today on board the U. S. S. Tacoma off the coast of El Salvador to thresh out matters affecting the mutual interests of the three countries. It was learned at the state department.

Revolutionary activities along the border of the three countries are understood to have brought about a tense situation, and the three presidents signified their desire to meet and settle their difficulties.

The United States accordingly placed the Tacoma at their disposal as a neutral meeting ground.

Bridge That Once Served Portland Proves Expensive

Aberdeen, Wash., Aug. 19.—The West bridge, formerly the old Morrison street bridge in Portland, has come into the limelight once more. The bridge was purchased by A. J. West from the city of Portland for a figure West never made public. After installing it across the harbor and charging tolls for 30 years, making good money out of the investment, he sold it to the city six or seven years ago for \$25,000. Since the city's purchase the bridge has been a continual bill of expense. It has now been overhauled and reinforced and the cost is expected to reach nearly \$50,000.

While West owned it the south span was pushed into the harbor by the steam schooner Norwood. The owners of the Norwood paid the bill, about \$15,000. Since the city owned it the same span was dumped into the harbor by another steamer, which collided with it.

GAPS IN FENCES OF REPUBLICANS ARE POINTED OUT

Tariff Wall Plan, Revenue Bill,
Newberryism, Dilly-Dallying,
Rapped by Democratic Chief.

Washington, Aug. 18.—There are several issues this fall, although perhaps the administration candidates will deny us some of them. The fall elections will be elections and not primaries. Genuine issues are to be contested. Sentiment has already been sounded out.

And prominent among these issues I would list:

First, the Republicans' failure to enact tariff legislation with lower rates. Instead they are building a tariff wall around the country to shut out imports. And if the tariff bill is passed before the fall elections it will be the paramount issue.

If the Republicans are smart, they will keep the tariff bill in conference until after the elections.

Second, the revenue bill, which has reduced the taxes of the rich but has not reduced the taxes of the poor, and the ship subsidy is a corollary of this administration's error. It means more taxation. Certainly the farmers won't stand for it. Realizing this, I think the Republicans would rather let the subsidy subsidize, so far as this session of congress is concerned.

Third, Newberryism. The fight on Senator Newberry and Newberryism is not over. Quite naturally, Republicans would have the incident forgotten. But I am convinced there is still a profound feeling against the seating of the Michigan senator.

Fourth, the dilly-dallying tactics of the administration on economic and industrial problems. This issue will have gained new impetus during the last few days. Here we are in the house, back at the president's request. We have been back four days and there isn't a quorum—even to hear what he wishes us to do, much less to do it. These are the issues.

Events of late in the industrial world have obscured the political undercurrent. People have been compelled to think first in terms of current industrial crises.

Were the administration leaders doing anything to counteract this force, were they doing anything worthy of mention of consideration in the public mind, things would be different.

I hope the fall elections will tell the story. The people are worried about the industrial situation. They want of nothing but crises. Remedies are not forthcoming. The consciousness of this fact will be fully developed by fall, and with it will come the realization that there are real, live political issues.

These issues are products of the general discontent among all classes of voters. In various parts of the country these issues may have different weights, but they are there all the same. The Democrats have plenty of talking points.

The third annual Washington County Prune Chautauqua was held around Forest Grove, Saturday. Prune orchards were visited in the forenoon, where particular methods of some of the growers in using various fertilization and pruning systems were studied.

Places visited included W. E. Haage, where a mature orchard was inspected; M. D. Jamison & Son, at which place cultural practices on a vineyard were explained by the owner; E. A. Rueter and J. F. Forbis at Dilley, where prune, apple and filbert orchards were examined.

At noon a dinner was served at Forest Grove, after which several speakers were heard. D. G. Little, chairman, first called upon W. H. Hollis, president of the Forest Grove Commercial club, who welcomed the guests.

Others on the program included William Schulmerich, president of the Washington county farm bureau; Seneca Pouts, introducing a prune product called Syrup of Prunes; John Rane; Clayton Lee, extension horticulturist of the Oregon Agricultural college; Fred Brocker of the Washington Growers' Packing corporation; and M. J. Newhouse, assistant manager of the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association.

FRANCE TO DELAY SEIZURE OF RUHR UNTIL ELECTION

Hope Expressed U. S. May Elect
Senate Favorable to Plans
for Foreign Debt Cancellation

Paris, Aug. 19.—Although France's intention to occupy the Ruhr district in event of an adverse decision by the reparations commission was officially confirmed today, it is reliably reported that the efforts of Belgium and Italian diplomats to prevent a "European disaster" are expected to be successful.

Poland's government, it is understood, is ready to waive claim to the Rhineland, Ruhr and the forests and mines provided Germany supplies guarantees which the French chamber of deputies may approve as equivalent, thus saving the faces of the statesmen concerned.

WAIT FOR ELECTION
Such action, it is believed, will be a mere effort to kill time and allow diplomats to pass the buck aimlessly along without an open breach before election time in the United States. French statesmen believe a good majority will be provided in the American senate for the cancellation of war debts or at least an acceptance by America of German bonds in full settlement.

It is obvious that if France should occupy the Ruhr now, its chances of being favored by America in regard to war debts would be materially lessened.

LOOK TO WASHINGTON
America, in fact, never occupied such a prominent position in the world as it does today. Europe, despite repeated assurances from Washington that cancellation of war debts is impossible, still insists that the salvation of Europe is solely dependent on Washington legislation.

Should the efforts of the allied diplomats to prevent a quick breaking up of the reparations commission fail, France announces that she will mobilize armed forces sufficient to surround the Ruhr forests within 24 hours.
