

Plenty of Excitement Offered Fans at Lacrosse Game—Vernon Wins in 17 Innings

Beavers Tie With Seattle In 2 Games

SEATTLE, Aug. 21.—After Vean Gregg had turned in an 8 to 5 victory over the Portland Beavers in the first game Sunday, our neighbors came back in the second contest and whopped the outlaws. Forde Schupp and George Burger and were only stopped by Joe Finerman after they had clinched the contest, getting seven runs on five hits, walks and two homers by Frank Brazill. The score was 7 to 5, a ninth inning rally being stopped when Jimmy Middleton fanned Ted Wisterall.

It is notable that the three victories of the Seattle club, the six-game series were the result of sou'wester pitching but Schupp, ex-big leaguer who has been knocked out both times he started here, was unable to keep up the good work.

SEATTLE CLINCHES FIRST
Seattle clinched the first game in the first inning when Harry Bismiller, gray wild, walking Lane and Eldred and letting Spence Adams beat out a bunt. With one down and the bases full, Sargent kicked Wisterall's ball and two runs came over. Barney singled to center and filled the cushion up again and Crane unfiled two-thirds of them with an easy fly which fell between Cox and Brazill, which wasn't the first time this week that Brazill has tried to go into the outfield for fly balls.

Lane walked in the second and scored from first base on Spence Adams' sacrifice and Poole's overthrow of third. Doubles by Lane and Hood added another in the fourth. Crane walked and center hit between the first and seventh innings but a succession of lucky singles by Poole, Cox and Sargent allowing the hitting of Bismiller, gave a pair of runs.

Bismiller was out in the eighth after two walks, and Coleman contributed a wild pitch which moved the runners along. Eldred bringing them home with a single to left.

This week's manager, Jim Middleton, who won from Jacobs earlier in the week, started the second game and led the tribe scoreless until the sixth.

McGinn scored in the first on his single, High's single and Poole's, followed by Cox's fly to center. Some boned head base running caused High to get caught in a double play third, when he turned back after Eldred's throw was about to beat him. The ball went through, was recovered by Wisterall and High walked into the third baseman's hands.

Wisterall, Sargent, Eldred, Hott's single to left and Wolfers' sacrifice fly to Eldred added two in the second.

TWO SCORES MADE
Brazill's first homer over the right field fence off Brazill brought in a pair, for Poole was on first at the time. Crane's two base wild throw on Wolfers' ground ball and High's double made the sixth run for Portland in the sixth, and Brazill's second homer in the seventh made the total seven runs.

Eldred hit a home run into the left field bleachers, with Hood on base in the sixth, and Schorr pinching for Tobin started a three-run rally in the ninth by singling across second. Finerman popped to Brazill and Lane doubled to left. Spence Adams singled to right, scoring the pair. Hood forced Adams and came home on Eldred's double. Wisterall and Lane took the punch out of the rally by taking a third strike. Score:

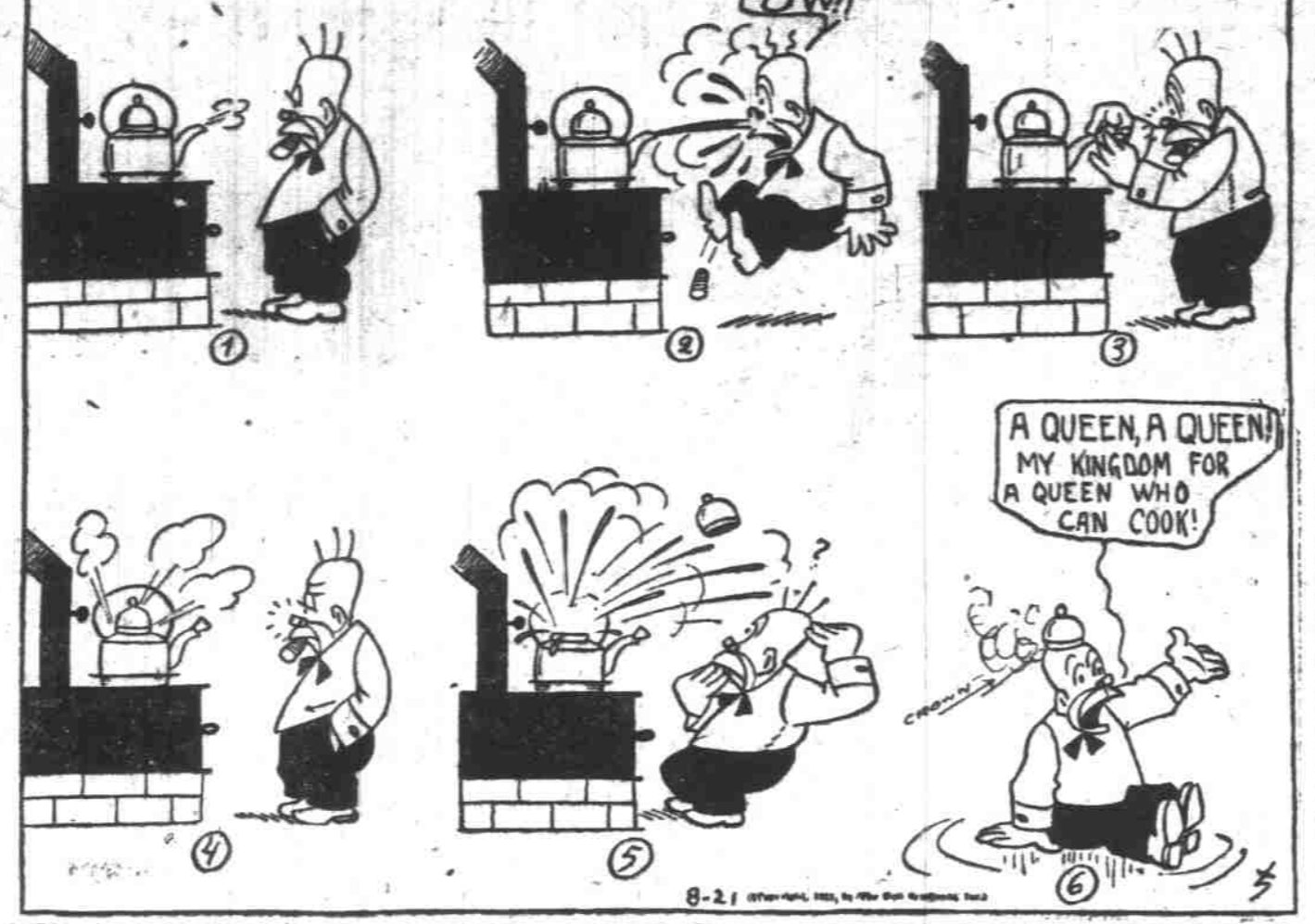

Portland Is Given Taste Of Lacrosse

IN AN exceptionally clean game of lacrosse, Victoria defeated Vancouver, B. C., on the Vaughn street grounds Sunday afternoon, 5 to 5, although it required 30 seconds of overtime to do it.

That is, Canadians, who are used to lacrosse called it clean, but to Portlanders, who have grown accustomed to prize fights and football matches, it looked to be about as rough as any sport that ever percolated through the domes of those who are on their toes on such occasions. Of course, there were no murderous grudges satisfied, for the players always resumed the contest apparently more intent on the play than on the player, even after numerous melees, in which many healthy and vigorous swarms were ministered to first one and then another.

McGregor, who will be identified as wearing No. 12 for Victoria, is known as the hero of the British Columbia Lacrosse association and the 230 pounder, certainly lived up to his reputation Sunday.
