

# STREET IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE BY CITY

Proceedings will be started at the session of the city council next Wednesday for the improvement of several streets in connection with the construction of the Northern Pacific terminal company's new terminal in the Guild's Lake district. This is in conformity with the company's agreement to stand the cost of these street improvements pending construction of a permanent overhead viaduct across the terminal yards in North Portland.

The streets to be improved are Johnson street, from Ninth to 10th streets; Lovejoy street, from Ninth to 10th streets; Ninth street, from Johnson to Northrup streets; and Ninth street from Northrup to Front streets.

**WORLD COMPEL RAILWAY TO MAKE REPAIRS IN STREETS**  
Commissioner Barbur will present to the city council next Wednesday a resolution directing the Oregon City Railway company to make repairs in street Class 6 noted as to restore them to a smooth and safe condition for vehicular traffic. The list includes Grand avenue at East Market street, intersection at East 11th and East 12th streets, East 22d and Clinton streets, Carothers street between Ninth and 10th streets, the big 11th and 12th streets, and East Ninth street between Mill and Morrison streets.

**ORDINANCE SOUGHT TO AID ELTON COURT PLANS**  
Recommendation will be made by Commissioner Barbur to the city council Wednesday that it pass an ordinance exempting H. B. Moore, owner of the Elton Court apartment property, at the northeast corner of 11th and Yamhill street, from certain provisions of the building code and granting him a permit to remove the attic story of this structure and rebuild it as a five-story Class 6 hotel building. This property has stood unused since it was gutted by fire in the early part of 1920, when four lives were lost.

**SUMNER STREET PROJECT RECOMMENDED BY BARBUR**  
Commissioner Barbur recommends granting the petition for permanent improvement of Sumner street, from Interstate to Denver avenues. He states that the 55.08 cent of the property within the proposed assessment district is represented on the petition, but that it will be necessary to lay an inch water main and place a fire hydrant, and that the water department objects to having the street paved at this time, as it receives a revenue of only 4.1 per cent on its investment on water service in the street. As the water cannot be done this year, Barbur recommends that proceedings go ahead as the water revenues may be increased sufficiently to pay for the requirements by the time the improvement is actually started.

**CORBERT STREET IMPROVEMENT**  
A resolution providing for the improvement of the macadam section of Corbert street from 100 feet south of Julia avenue to block 11 Terwilliger Homestead tract by the laying of hard-surface pavement will be sent to the city council Wednesday by Raymond R. Shawcross, assistant to Commissioner Barbur of the department of public works. The street is a part of the Pacific highway and has been in bad condition for a long time.

**WILL OPEN BIDS**  
Bids for the grading and seeding of the grounds surrounding the Oregon medical school of the University of Oregon, located adjacent to the new county hospital buildings on Marquam street, will be opened at noon August 31 at the office of Lawrence & Holford, architects, 1021 Chamber of Commerce building.

**CITY HALL BRIEFS**  
The city commissioners have viewed the property on East 39th street between Thompson and Brazee streets, which Mrs. Alice Kelley desires to use as a maternity hospital, it has decided that the application for a permit should be granted. Commissioner Barbur will recommend at Wednesday's session. Adjacent property owners objected to the permit being granted.

**E. L. Lueddellman will be granted a permit by the city council, if it follows Commissioner Barbur's recommendation, for the maintenance of a two-story frame building on College street, between 14th and 15th streets, as a four-family apartment house. He also recommends granting a permit to Strong & McCallister to erect a two-story garage building at the northeast corner of East Eighth and Belmont streets.**

**Favorable report is made by the public works department on the application of Mrs. M. B. McCall for a permit to change a two-story frame residence building on East 15th street, between Belmont and Morrison streets, to a four-family apartment house. The council will act on this application next Wednesday.**

**The Northern Pacific Terminal company has applied to the city council for a permit to construct and maintain a spur track in 15th street, north of Irving street, for the purpose of serving the new warehouse of Meier & Frank. An ordinance granting the permit will be before the council at its session next Wednesday.**

**A resolution providing for the opening of Essex street, from River street to the water's edge of Willamette river, so that it may be used as a fireboat berth, will be introduced by Commissioner Barbur at Wednesday's session.**

# Price Riots Facing Berlin; Banks Fail, In Exchange Crash

Berlin, Aug. 26.—Banks are going to smash, big business houses are failing and medium sized jewelry shops are closing their doors as the result of the sudden drop in the value of German paper money. But establishments like food shops and drug stores, which must go on selling, have doubled their prices in the last 24 hours. The inevitable result is that the people are protesting and the protests are becoming so violent that riots on a large scale may occur any day now.

The question is as to what can be done to remedy the situation. Nobody has yet found a solution to the problem. So serious is the situation in Berlin, a protest that the representative of the powers have asked their governments to send larger military staffs to Berlin merely as a precaution against being mobbed by the unemployed. The French, Italian and Spanish diplomatic and newspaper representatives in particular anticipate trouble soon and are asking their governments for aid and protection. Both the Americans and British remain calm.

**CHURCH IS LOST IN SPRINGFIELD FIRE**  
Eugene, Aug. 26.—The Christian church of Springfield, near here, was destroyed by fire about 11 o'clock this morning, the blaze being caused by an overheated flue. The Frank Smith residence, adjoining, was destroyed, and the C. W. Pettigrove home was badly damaged. The loss will total about \$8000. The church was valued at \$5000 and \$1000 insurance was carried. Both homes were insured.

# SEIZURE OF DATA ON INCOME TAX

Savannah, Ga., Aug. 26.—The right of the income tax bureau of the treasury to practically seize all financial records of individuals and their families probably will be tested in court. At a meeting of well known men and merchants it was decided to send a legal representative to Washington to take the matter up with Secretary Mellon. These men declare they have made proper returns and that the "snooping" plan is unjust.

A representative of the department, named Golding, has been in Savannah for some days. He demanded in the name of the government, that the local banks give him transcripts of the accounts of many prominent citizens. The banks have been unwilling to comply with this demand. Not only were the personal accounts of the men involved affected but also those of their wives and kindred. Among those whose bank accounts are being scrutinized are some of city government departments and prominent members of the bar.

**BOOTLEGGING HINTED AT**  
There are between 50 and 100 cases, all told. What creates so much indignation is not that the government is trying to collect back income taxes, but because of a circumstantial report that an organized effort is being made to connect up officials in some of the national capital with the bootlegging business. Recently the government has had certain well known men under surveillance and it is now intimated that it is hoped to broaden the inquiry.

**Underworld Women Suspects in Murder Of Bootleg 'Agent'**
