

VOTE IN DOUBT ON McNARY RIDER TO BONUS MEASURE

Washington, Aug. 29.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—The senate adjourned late Monday without action on the McNary reclamation amendment to the bonus bill and with the result still in doubt, McNary expects the fate of the amendment to be decided by a few votes either way.

Members of the finance committee who reported the bonus bill have advanced the argument that it should be placed before the president without reclamation or other "complicating" features, and in the cloakroom are said to have made headway by insisting that the president will be embarrassed if he has to veto reclamation along with the bonus.

On the other hand, several opponents of the bonus are reported to have come to the support of McNary's amendment on the theory that this will help to kill the bonus if attached to the bill. Several friends of the McNary bill are absent without pairs and in the confusion there is no certainty as to what will happen when the vote is taken tomorrow.

PARTY LINES OBLITERATED

Speeches strongly supporting the reclamation amendment were divided between the two sides of the aisle. Walsh of Montana, Ransdell of Louisiana and Pittman of Nevada, Democrats, joining with Wadsworth of New York, Sterling of South Dakota and other Republicans in support of the measure.

Wadsworth, opposing the bonus bill as a whole, announced his support for the McNary amendment because, he said, "it proposes to extend the credit of the government for productive enterprise; it is sound, and will bring lasting benefit not only to the soldiers who settle upon the land, but the whole country."

"The safety of the republic depends largely upon the farms, the use of the lands," continued the New York senator, "and any measure such as this, avoiding wildcat and useless extension of credit, will have my support, although I cannot support the bonus bill itself."

BENEFIT FOR SOUTH
Ransdell, speaking from the standpoint of drainage in the South, pointed out that one-third of Louisiana is wet, and that there are 66,000,000 of acres in the South alone susceptible of reclamation. He said the McNary amendment presents a wonderfully good business proposition.

"If this is passed," he said, "I am sure numerous projects will be started in my state, and the success of these 'samples' as I may call them, will, by example, inspire large development by private means. It will encourage small holdings, instead of large ownerships, and that is what we want."

Sterling, like Wadsworth, declared opposition to the bonus, but hearty support of the McNary amendment.

It will help to stop the influx to the cities, he argued, and aid large productive areas that are lying idle.

FUNDS ARE REPAID

Walsh of Montana gave a review of reclamation under existing law, declaring that as a whole this has been wonderfully successful and that it should be enlarged by further extension of the government's credits. He pointed out that repayments on reclamation projects do not begin until after cost of construction is ascertained, which in most cases was after 1915, and that repayments at the end of the last fiscal year equaled practically 86 per cent of the sum then due, which, he asserted, is excellent showing, in view of the agricultural depression of the last few years. The Klamath project in Oregon, he stated, has paid up 99.2 per cent and Umatilla 84.6 per cent.

Fletcher of Florida expressed fear that drainage in the South will be little aided if small farm units are fixed and holders of excess lands required to sell up to 80 or even 40 per cent of excess holdings before a project is formed. He argued for permitting large land holdings.

McNary said he could not assent to amend the bill in this respect, one of the purposes is to provide for intensive settlement and prevent accumulation of profits to a few landholders by reason of increase in values brought about by reclamation.

Urges Parity for Portland Shipments

Washington, Aug. 29.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—In a tentative report made by P. F. Gault, one of its examiners, to interstate commerce commission, it is recommended that carload minimum on redwood tank and silo material from Portland to Eastern points should be placed on a parity with flat minima from California points, on the ground that the existing rules are unduly prejudicial against Portland. The complaint was filed by the Portland traffic and transportation association.

De Valera Is Moving About in Disguise

OREGON CAVES BEING MARRED BY SIGHTSEERS

The garden of paradise, the bacon room, Joaquin Miller's chapel and all other wonders of the Oregon caves are being marred by irresponsible youths who are scratching their initials on

the walls and smoking them with acetylene torches, according to District Forester George H. Cecil, who has just returned from a trip through Southern Oregon. "Each guide takes 15 or 20 persons through the caves at a time," said Cecil, "and he cannot keep an eye on all of them. These are generally some children. While the caves, as a national monument, are protected by act of congress, and it is a penal offense to mar them, we probably would not want to send a man up for a year or two, but we have got to do something. If we had the appropriation from congress for lighting the caves, we would abandon the use of torches, and thus remove some of the incentive for marking the walls." Cecil reports the portion of the road

between Diamond lake and Crater lake, within the Uniquus national forest, complete and in good shape. The forest service is building the road around the lake, and has finished the stretch on the east side, and is pushing north toward the summit and Crescent lake. Fifteen out of the total 30 miles between Diamond and Crescent lakes will be complete this fall, unless weather conditions prevent. This road is a link in the future Skyline highway.

"Road work around Bend is progressing steadily with the use of graders and heavy tractors," said Cecil. "Through the lodgepole pine country the forest service is building roads at a cost of \$400 a mile."

PLANS ROAD

Commenting upon the Oregon Sky-

line, Cecil stated that next year he expected to start upon the section between the McKenna highway and the Santiam road, and to finish the section on the south from Crescent lake to Odell lake. This will leave only the Mount Jefferson country and the region west of the Three Sisters without roads in the entire Skyline route from Mount Hood to Crater lake. The Walden lake section of the Skyline will not have been built, but it will be possible to connect up Odell lake with Elk lake by means of the Century drive on the east side of the range.

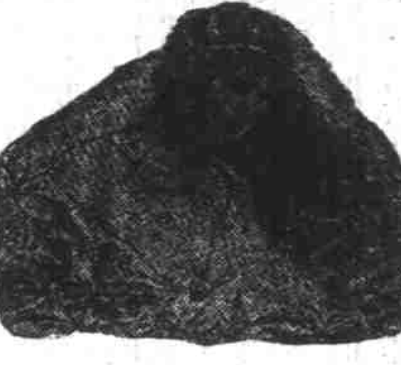
Hires 20 Cooks, Then Lands in Jail
