FARM AMENDMENT CAMPAIGN OPENS IN WHOLE STATE

Under authority granted by a joint meeting of the managing and finance committees of the 1925 exposition, held Tuesday noon, a statewide campaign directed by Mayor Baker will begin today for the constitutional amendment which will permit Portland to tax itself \$3,000,000 for exposition purposes.

While this city proposes to raise the money, it is necessary for the state as a whole to authorize it to do so, through adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment. This is the keynote fact that is to be emphasized in all sections of Oregon during this short campaign before the general election. Mayor Baker says the recent caravan trip in behalf of the exposition disclosed that many people of Oregon are unfamiliar with the general plan, and do not realize that all Portland asks is that it be given the right to go ahead with the financing of the exposition.

It is proposed to provide speakers for all available points, make an extensive use of the newspapers of the state as possible, and to conduct other caravan trips, one of these to go through Eastern Oregon at the time of the Pendleton Round-Up.

The drive for \$3,000,000 to carry on this educational campaign is being begun today, announces Emory Olmstead, chairman of the finance committee. He states that about \$27,000 in subscription money has been received, and nearly \$12,000 more is certain to be pledged within the next few days.

At Tuesday's meeting Mayor Baker reviewed the results accomplished for the exposition and for a better understanding between Oregon communities by the recent 1925 exposition caravan trip. He then outlined the general plan for the educational campaign on the proposed constitutional amendment authorizing Portland to tax itself for the fair, but stated that he did not want to proceed with this work until it had been approved by the joint committees. It was then decided to place him in full charge of the work of this campaign.

Police Officer's Wife Deputized to 'Get' Peeping Tom

Mrs. Lee M. Ackerman, wife of Police Inspector Ackerman, was deputized by her husband late Tuesday night to "go after" a prowler seen in the neighborhood about the inspector's home at 1459 Mississippi avenue. It was thought the prowler might have been the Peninsula "Gorilla."

Mrs. Ackerman called her husband at police headquarters at 10 o'clock and told him a man was seen in the neighborhood peering in windows. His actions and appearance led the neighbors to believe he was the fiend of Peninsula park.

"Where is he now?" Ackerman asked.

"I think he's in the chicken house," the inspector's wife answered.

"Well, you get the gun and go after him."

With that order, the inspector placed the receiver on the hook, and turned to a fellow officer.

FRIDAY IS FIXED FOR HEARING IN PHONE RATE CASE

Presiding Circuit Judge Stapleton Tuesday refused to grant the plea of Charles H. Carey, attorney for the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, for a postponement until next Friday of the hearing on the motion to transfer the telephone rate case to the federal court. After a somewhat heated discussion, the judge allowed both parties until Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock to prepare their arguments, which must be presented then.

The case involves court adjudication of the advanced telephone rates, suit having been filed by Robert G. Duncan as an appeal from the decision of the public service commission.

Carey filed the motion for transfer to the federal court several days ago, alleging that the company does an interstate business and therefore the state court is without jurisdiction.

W. E. Richardson, attorney for Duncan, is retaining the transfer, as the state public service commission is made co-defendant with the telephone company and as only the intra-state rates are under attack.

Carey informed Judge Stapleton that he had conferred with the attorney general, as attorney for the public service commission, and both had agreed to the postponement. Richardson then entered vigorous protest at such tactics, the court sharing the view of the plaintiff at least should have been consulted before any such stipulations were made.

Circuit Judge Evans, who heard the original motion, was not on the bench during Tuesday's controversy.

Cowboys and 35 Indians to "Fight"

Roseburg, Aug. 30.—Thirty-five Tillamook Indians, garbed in war paint and feathers, and opposed by as many cowboys of the olden west, will stage a sham battle on the main street of Roseburg as one of the attractions for Labor Day celebration, sponsored by the Douglas County band and the Roseburg ball club. A parade over a mile long, with floats from every organization in town, will precede the sham battle. A venison barbecue will be held in Laurelvale park at noon, followed by a ball game between Roseburg and Grants Pass. The celebration and games of chance will run all day and a large open air dance pavilion is being constructed. An address will be given in the afternoon by a representative of the labor organizations.

THIEVES FRIGHTENED AWAY

Nehalem, Aug. 30.—Loggers reaching camp at 3 o'clock Sunday morning frightened away thieves, who took with them goods valued at \$500 from the commissary of Brighton Mills camp. The loot was later recovered.
