SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 2.—Errors spread the undoing of the Portland Beavers Friday. Manager Middleton's charges losing a 14-inning battle to the Seals by a count 6 to 5.

The bout was a humdinger after the two battlers took a couple of rounds to get acquainted again, being that they had not faced each other for a couple of weeks.

The bout started out rather slowly, both being very cautious. There was little action in the first two rounds, although the third brought forth a little more action, Josephs having a slight shade in that round.

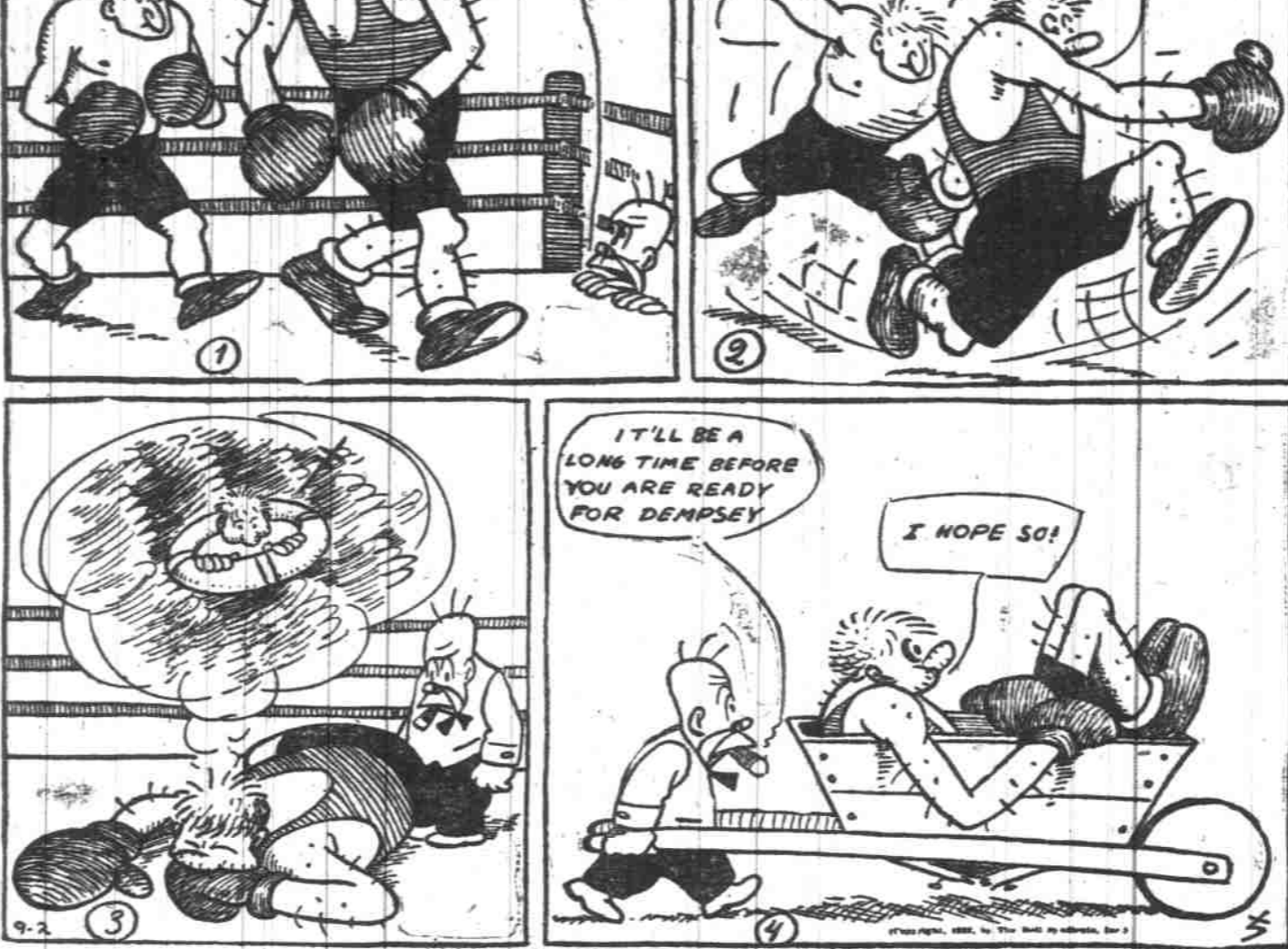
